Wakefield to Vote Again On School Bond Election

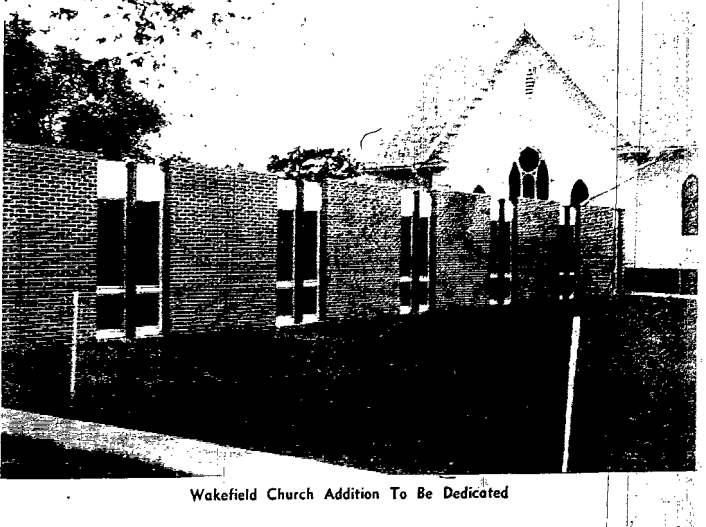

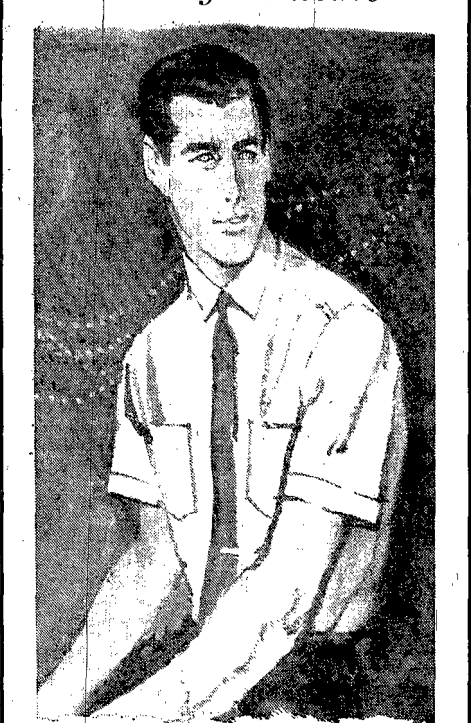

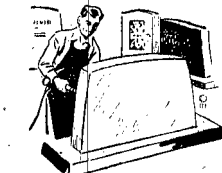

Hastings ranked third with 25 followed by Peru State with 28, Doane with 34 and Chadron State with 40.

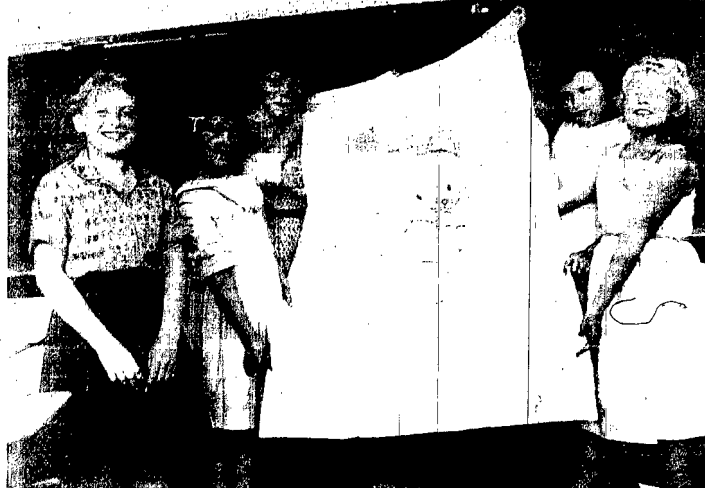

## Social Security Cautions Against Rule Violations

District manager of the Social Security Administration at Norfolk, Nebr., stated if you are receiving social security checks, you must notify the social security office if you move to a new home, or a beneficiary under age 72 must give notice if he expects to earn over \$1200 per year.  
Beneficiaries must also notify the social security office of other events affecting benefits, such as death, marriage, divorce, adoption, or a child leaving his mother's care. The social security office also needs to know if a beneficiary is unable to handle his own benefits.  
If you do not live up to these responsibilities, it might delay your social security checks or in some instances you may be penalized one month's benefit.  
If there is a criminal violation of laws affecting social security, it could mean a fine and imprisonment. The director called attention to a sentence imposed in Des Moines on a social security beneficiary who did not report that she had remarried.  
A lady who was receiving social security payments on the account of her deceased husband, remarried. She did not report this to the Social Security Administration, as the law requires, but continued to receive and cash her checks.  
The case was brought before the Federal District Court at Des Moines by the U. S. Attorney. As a result, this remarried widow served 30 days in jail and was released on condition that she pay \$50.00 per month for 36 months into the Social Security Trust Fund.  
If you are receiving social security checks and have any questions regarding the reporting of any events that would stop your checks, feel free to call or write your social security office at Norfolk, Nebr., or see your social security representative when he visits your area.

## Cooling Unit Can Utilize Heating Line

Cooling engineers have developed a variety of systems so that air conditioning can be installed in any type of house, regardless of the type of heating system used.

A combination hydronic system uses heating cooling convectors units installed in each room of the house. The central power source—a boiler and water chiller—is usually located in the basement.  
Hot water and chilled water are circulated to the units through a common tubing system. Each convector unit has a fan, filter, cooling-heating coil and a thermostat for room by room temperature control.

Same Ducts Used  
Combination warm air systems use a furnace and cooling unit, usually located in the basement as the power source. Warm air and cool air are circulated through the same duct system. It's important, however, that ducts be accurately sized. Cooling requires larger ducts than those used for heating alone. If ducts are sized for heating only, the cooling system may not operate efficiently.

Combination heating-cooling systems are not always more economical to install than separate heating and cooling systems. In certain

types of construction, for instance, a separate hot water baseboard heating system with a separate cooling system may be more economical than a combination heating cooling duct system.  
To combine cooling equipment with a heating system at a later time, special provisions for air conditioning must be made when the house is constructed. If these provisions are not made, then a separate cooling system may be required.

Some cooling equipment is especially designed for installation independently of the heating system. This equipment also can be installed during construction or later.  
For instance, a separate chilled air unit can be used with any type heating system since it functions independently of the heating system. This central cooling system is suitable for modernization in small or medium-size houses.

Unit Placement  
The cooling unit can be installed in unused space in the attic, garage, hall or closet. Cooling registers, or outlets, are usually located near the ceiling of each room.  
A separate chilled water unit can also be used with any type of heating system. It also functions independently of the heating system, and is easily installed in

homes located in regions not requiring heating. This unit is suitable for central cooling for new construction or modernization, but especially for multi-story or rambling designs in which zone control is necessary for best results.  
This system contains a single cooling unit, remotely located in the basement, which sends chilled water through small tubing to several heavy-duty convectors which have individual temperature controls.

## THESE TIPS WILL PROMOTE SAFETY IN FAMILY POOL

- 1. Whether you now own a swimming pool or hope to build one some day, knowing the rules of swimming pool safety may make a vital difference to you and your family.
- 2. Here are some protective pointers:  
1. Arrange for an adult to be present whenever the children are in for a swim. In the case of neighborhood kids, make an informal rule that no small children will be allowed unless accompanied by an adult.
- 3. Be sure that swimmers stay out of the pool for at least an hour after meals.
- 4. Have a life preserver handy

—an inflated inner tube is fine.  
4. A high fence around the pool will prevent wandering tots—and possibly save you from negligence charges. Keep the gate closed whenever the pool is not in use.  
5. Electric lights in the pool area make night swimming safer, help prevent falls into the pool.  
6. Filters should be run so that pool water is completely filtered every 18-24 hours.  
7. Filters must be cleaned every 3 to 10 days.  
8. Keep water well chlorinated to fight the growth of algae and bacteria.  
9. During the off-season, pool should be constantly covered with a plastic or canvas top strong enough to support the weight of a person who might fall on top of it.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Feeder Says Industry Overproducing

Editor's Note: The cattle industry — a vital segment of Northeast Nebraska's economy has been taking a beating for the last 20 months. The "why" of the crisis has been the subject of speculation by politicians, editors and commentators, bankers and businessmen. They have attempted to place the blame on excessive imports of beef, monopolistic buying practice of grocery stores and overproduction for the current depressed market.

In the next few weeks it will be our intent to examine this cattle crisis. Not as experts for we haven't the experience to comment intelligently on so complicated a business.

Rather, it is our intent to quote experts themselves. Economists, men engaged in the retail meat industry, government officials and feeders themselves all have definite opinions on the reasons for the declining prices of beef cattle. Our series will quote these men. We then believe the readers should form their own opinions.

Kenneth Monfort, a partner in the largest cattle feeding concern in the world, expressed his opinion at a meeting in Fort Collins, Colorado recently. He blames himself and other cattle feeders. His comments were carried in the Greeley Tribune.

"The whole industry is overproducing for its market," Monfort asserts. "Feeders must quit feeding cattle past their best market weights and finish and must become highly realistic about the prices they pay for feeder cattle."

Monfort is generally pessimistic about the next three or four years, but contends, "I honestly believe that in the not too distant future, we will be hard pressed to produce all the beef that our growing and affluent population will desire and demand."

## Future Prosperity

"I believe that those of us that can survive the next three or four years, whether we be rancher or feeder may look forward to greater prosperity," Monfort said. "We have seen a decline in choice cattle prices in the past months of over 30 per cent."

"Most cattle feeders have suffered consecutive losses on two or three crops of fed cattle. Cattle feeders have lost the bulk of their equity. Many are being forced to quit feeding. Many others are mortgaging their real estate in an effort to stay in the business or even to pay off current borrowings. The banks in every case taking a long hard look at the industry."

Monfort charges that politicians are having a field day with the cattle situation. "Each and every one of them is busy proving to the cattle industry that he is its staunchest supporter. Six months ago these elected officials didn't know a steer from a heifer but now they have become experts on the entire beef business," he continued.

"We must make changes to exist," Monfort asserts. "These changes don't involve import quota or chain store investigations. They involve us, the cattle feeders, who must look at our own industry."

Monfort asserts that foreign imports are not the cause of current problems. He points out that in 1962, a bumper year for cattle feeders, imports were also so at an all-time high.

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## Capitol News

### "State Navy" Commissions Will Be Given Sparingly

LINCOLN — The nationally prominent athlete stepped forward on the speaker's platform at a recent dinner in Lincoln and was presented a cylindrical-shaped container with a scroll advising he and all that he had just become an admiral in the Great Navy of the State of Nebraska.

The athlete sat down mightily puzzled. Maybe he was — at least until similar admiral certificates were handed out to other guests of honor. Only then, it appeared, did he know for sure that he had not been the victim of some kind of joke.

While commissions in the Nebraska Navy have been presented to thousands, it is understandable when a stranger shows a bit of incredulity when "commissioned" in the Navy of a state better known for its cowboys, Indians, beefsteaks, hogs, corn and wheat.

The commissioning of persons in the Nebraska Navy has been witnessed by some persons scores of times. The awarding of the certificates has become a very common occurrence.

This situation is going to change — in fact the change has already been placed into effect. Gora Budig, amiable young administrative assistant to Governor Morrison, said a "strict quota" of 20 admiral commissions per week has been instituted. "I asked why the sudden depar-

## Export Picture

"Another factor in the very important picture that is seldom mentioned is that of our exports. Very little beef is exported. However, large amounts of beef byproducts are exported. The dollar value of these beef exports, I admit, is not as large as the value of our beef imports.

"However, I honestly believe that the net effect of imports and exports upon the cattle industry is a plus. The loss of our export market in hides alone would cost an estimated \$4. per animal. A similar loss of market on other items such as tallow, livers and ox-tails would undoubtedly be great. I just cannot possibly believe that beef imports have hurt us that much," he declared.

Monfort said the industry would be naive to believe that imports of one item could be drastically reduced without eventually causing a curtailment of other export items.

About wholesale buying practices, Monfort said "I think it best that we understand that basically the grocer is indeed on the side of the producer."

## Feels Stores Fair

Monfort said he feels a chain store investigation will prove that most stores operate in the best interests of the industry and the nation.

"My fear of such an investigation is that in being handled in the wrong way, it might easily make the American people think that they were being 'taken' when they buy beef. This would be a disaster for our business.

"I also question the morality of such an investigation without some proof of possible market fixing or collusion. I know that I would have been highly irritated if in October 1962 the government had investigated our industry for making too much money and creating beef that was too costly," Monfort pointed out.

What can the cattleman do to better his lot? Monfort thinks it should be made less appealing for the rancher to build up tremendous cow numbers. He suggests doing away with capital gains on cows that have already been depreciated.

## Aid Not Immoral

"Let the cow business revert to the hands of the true producer and take it out of the hands of the tax gimmick people," he urged.

Monfort also favors types of government aid. "A large portion of our industry believes that any government help is immoral. To me, government help was established to help its citizens when they cannot help themselves. I believe this is the situation we are rapidly approaching.

"Assistance from the government can take many forms. I have mentioned repeal of capital gains on cows. There is also room for other tax revisions that might be beneficial. Beef buying programs for the armed forces and school lunch programs should be funded and ready for immediate expansion.

"Perhaps there is room for a large scale beef program in connection with the announced war on poverty. Perhaps we should take an extensive new look at our beef grading," he said.

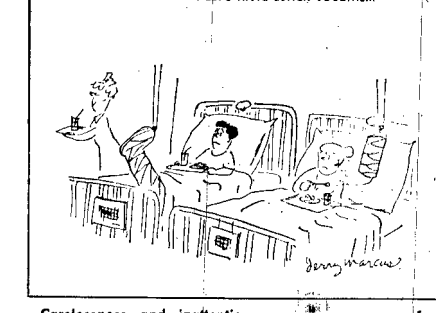
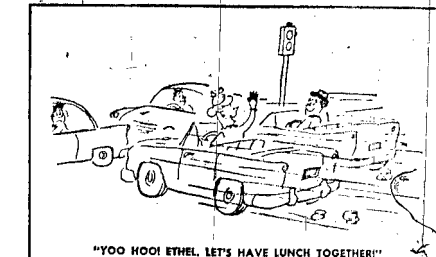
Under the new setup of issuing commissions, some is given out without the prior approval of Budig's office. "This hasn't been the case in the past," he said.

In addition to establishing a quota, Budig would also like to have some specific requirements for eligibility. "In other words," he added, "We would like to restore some meaning and prestige to the commissions. Back in Governor Griswold's time, it was an event worthy of good newspaper coverage when someone was made an admiral. In those days they were quite selective and when someone was commissioned, it had much more meaning and impact."

The Griswold system contrasted sharply with those employed by some succeeding governors. During one two-month period, Budig said, the late governor Anderson issued 599 admiral certificates. Since 1931 when the Great Navy was conceived, the commissions have gone to persons in almost every imaginable line of work or activity. The list includes farmers, statesmen, teachers, generals, actors, visiting dignitaries, and many, many others from scores of fields and occupation.

"What we would like to see," Budig said, "is to have our commissions of a par with being made a Kentucky Colonel. I've been advised that Kentucky gives out only a few colonel certificates annually but receiving one of them has a lot of meaning.

Iowa also has honorary colonels, but awards only a few annually, compared to the number of Nebraska commissions." The Great Nebraska Navy was the brainchild of Lt. Gov. Ted Metzger, Omaha. He came up with the idea once while acting

governor in the absence of Gov. Charles Bryan.

Even though Nebraska is just about as far removed from the Atlantic and Pacific oceans as it is possible for one state to be, the idea of being commissioned an admiral in the prairie state's non-existent Navy caught on immediately.

Perhaps the thought of belonging to the Navy of a state whose best known "vessel" was the prairie schooner helped add spice to the appeal. And there has to be some sort of prestige in being an admiral in anybody's Navy—even if it doesn't have any ships.

At any rate, the applications for membership have snowballed to the point where Budig said the brakes had to be applied.

He acknowledged the certificates can be "very effective" as a public relations and promotional gimmick. He said many senators and congressmen from the Midwest area have commissions "and they display them proudly. Oddly, the greatest demand comes from out of the state. We get a lot of requests from Washington, D.C.

But he reiterated that regardless of where the requests come from, the number of commissions issued in the future will be limited strictly to 20 per week or less. "The average in recent weeks has been running about 16," he said somewhat proudly.

"After the first of the year we'd like to cut the number to 10 a week," he said.

Budig seemed to mean it when he said that the matter of issuing admiral's certificates "we've become real stingy."

Control Weeds

The chemical 4(2,4-DB) will control broad leaf weeds and Delaphon will control grassy weeds in new alfalfa, according to John Furrer, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist.

The weeds should be small — less than 1 1/2 inches high. Manufacturers recommend a 24(2,4-DB) should be followed and the 4(2,4-DB) not confused with ordinary forms of 2,4-D. Legumes show little effect from 4(2,4-DB), but are killed by 2,4-D.

Weeds convert the 4(2,4-DB) to ordinary 2,4-D and are killed, the explained. Alfalfa can't make the same conversion, so it is safe.

## How To Save Hay

No one would seriously consider throwing away 35 percent of his hay crop, yet that is precisely what happens when a hay is raked and baled when it is too dry.

A gonomist at the University of California report that raking hay with the dew on it and baling dry results in only a 4 percent drop in yield. Raking dry and baling at the proper moisture level resulted in a 25 percent yield loss, but both raking and baling dry caused a whopping 35 percent loss.

In addition, the protein was even higher than this since most of it is stored in the leaves.

## Systemics Kill

Use of a systemic insecticide, ronnel, proved more effective in controlling cattle grubs than did other systemics which were applied to the backs of the animals.

In experiments at Texas A & M, a salt and mineral mixture containing 5.5 percent ronnel was fed to range cattle on a free choice basis in either block or granular form. A 92 percent control of grubs was achieved with the mixture. Best results were obtained, says Texas researchers, if the mixture is fed at least 75 consecutive days between May 1 and Sept. 1.
