Soil Survey Underway In Sherman Precinct

A block soil survey of Wayne county has been started in Sherman precinct. This is part of the national cooperative soil survey of the Soil Conservation Service which hopes to get all of the United States surveyed.

Don Kerl, of the local SCS office, says in making soil surveys, a scientist studies the soils, vegetation and other features of the landscape. He classifies kinds of soil and records boundaries on an aerial photo. Soils are named by comparing characteristics with those of similar soils already named. If the soil is unlike any others named, it is given a new name.

Kerl stated that if more information is gathered about our soils, the better system of management we can aim for. Maximum yields can be obtained by knowing the soil and proper treatment and use of the soil.

Kerl noted that he is trying to contact farmers during the course of the survey. However, at times one is at home, so don't be too surprised to see him digging holes on the hillside.

Buy Vitamin-Mineral Mixes Separately

When buying vitamin and mineral premixes they should be bought in separate premixes, according to Leo Lucas, University of Nebraska Extension Swine Specialist.

Some of the vitamins, particularly Vitamin A, are destroyed when in the presence of minerals over a prolonged period, he explained. Therefore, when buying vitamins and minerals it is preferable that you buy separate premixes. If the vitamins and minerals are purchased in one premix they should be used within a 30-day period, he said.

For further information on vitamins, obtain a copy of Swine Range Suggestions EC 64-210 from your county agent, Lucas advises.

Dr. Robert W. Casper Embarks on Second Half Century in Dentistry



Dr. Robert W. Casper ... Retire? Never!

It's not too unusual to read, "Dentist retires after 50 years of service," but that is definitely not the case with Dr. Robert W. Casper, Wayne dentist.

Dr. Casper began his second half century June 1, 1964. He has been practicing at the same address, 103 East Third, since coming to Wayne 38 years ago.

He was born Dec. 26, 1890, in Cedar Rapids, Neb., where he was graduated from high school. He attended Lincoln Dental College, which was privately owned, but was affiliated with the University of Nebraska. Dr. Casper remarked that when he went to dental school, there were very few colleges for dentistry and most of them were privately owned. The Lincoln dental college was later purchased by the University.

In June of 1914, Dr. Casper bought a practice in St. Edward, Neb. He worked there until June 24, 1926, when he came to Wayne. As he remembers, Wayne had a population of about 2,800 at that time. He opened for business June 28, 1926. He had an office upstairs for nine years before moving to the ground floor.

He was married April 29, 1916, to Edna Belle Cawl of Aurora. They have one daughter, Dorothy Jean, now Mrs. Bob Harrison, Blair, and two grandchildren, Mark, 13, and Scott, 6.

He suffered a severe heart attack in 1954 and had to close his office six months. The illness may have curtailed some of his more strenuous activities, but in his reporter's opinion, it did not dampen his splendid sense of humor and his enthusiasm for living.

Speaking of retirement, Dr. Casper said, "What! Me retire? I should say not, for what in the world would I do? I don't believe anyone should retire no matter how old and decrepit they become."

The doctor has always been active and interested in all community affairs. He is a member of the Presbyterian church where he has served on all the boards; Kiwanis, Chamber of Commerce, Eastern Star Patron 13 years; and was a member of the City Library board nearly 20 years.

When asked about hobbies, Dr. Casper said, "Well I like to work in the garden, with flowers and the yard and such. I used to play golf, but I had to give that up after my heart attack."

He went on, "Nope. I wouldn't think of retiring. My practice isn't as heavy as it used to be, but I make expenses and I have a place here for the boys to come in and rest."

Right at that moment one of the "boys," a businessman, came in the office. The conversation soon turned to the old days in Wayne — lots of old buildings destroyed by fire — we had some whopping big fires in those days — mud streets — no parking problems, not too many cars — swampland where Wilcox Bowl is now. Wayne has changed in 38 years.

Dr. Casper's 50 years of service to the public have managed to sharpen his sparkling wit and have given him added zest for living. His second 50 years ought to be a snap.

ASCS Announces Grain Sorghum Price Supports

Prices for 1964 crop grain sorghum will be supported in Wayne County through loans and purchases at \$1.76 per hundredweight for grain sorghum grading No. 2 or better, John H. Mohr, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. This compares with the average county loan rate of \$1.70 per hundredweight for the 1963 grain sorghum crop.

Mohr pointed out that the total national support for the 1964 grain sorghum is unchanged from the 1963-crop level of \$2 per hundredweight. However, the 1964-crop support reflects an average loan rate of \$1.77 per hundredweight, with a payment in-kind of 23 cents, compared with 1963-crop rates of \$1.71 for loans and 29 cents for payment-in-kind.

Farmers wishing to store their price-support grain sorghum in a terminal warehouse may obtain terminal rates from the ASCS County office. The 1964 county and terminal rates reflect the 6-cent increases in the loan portion of the support above the 1963 level. An additional upward adjustment of 1 cent — for a total of 7 cents per hundredweight — has been made in the Kansas City and related terminal and county rates because of the relationship between support prices and historical prices received by farmers in the area indicates the need for such an upward adjustment.

Mohr reminded growers that the price support on the 1964 crop will be available to those grain sorghum producers who participate in the 1964 feed grain program by diverting at least 20 percent of their total grain sorghum, barley, or corn acreage to conserving uses and meeting other provisions of the program.

Price support will be carried out through farm-and-warehouse-stored loans and purchases. Support will be available from time of harvest through January 31, 1965. Grain sorghum price-support loans will mature March 31, 1965.

Scouts Are Injured By Lightning Bolt

Some badly burned Boy Scouts and their leader are recuperating in various homes and Wayne Hospital this week after a harrowing experience that could have been much more disastrous Friday night.

The Scouts, Gary Munson, Rocci Marr, Bob Penn, Joe Manley and their leader, Dick Manley, were struck by lightning while camping at the Isaac Walton Leguee lake Friday.

The group had done some fishing and bedded down about 10 p.m. at the south end of the lake. Some sprinkles started falling and Manley had gotten up to cover some of the boys with a tarpaulin when the lightning struck at 11:30 precisely.

Reason for the "accapally" determining time of the strike was that Munson's watch was ruined by the bolt and stopped at this

hour. He suffered severe burns about the arm under the watch. In addition to the wrist burns, his left arm had third degree burns. He was in his sleeping bag when the strike occurred and the bag caught fire.

Rocci Marr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Marr, performed the first heroic of the evening. Not badly struck by the lightning, he saw the blazing sleeping bag and beat out the flames with his bare hands. This act caused his severest burns. Leader Manley credits Rocci with possibly saving Gary's life.

Girl Scouts and their leaders Mrs. John Schulte, Mrs. Dick Kern and Mrs. Al Ehlers were camping on the opposite end of the lake. The rain had disturbed them too and they were preparing to move when the accident occurred. Manley said that some of the girls' fathers were coming to the camp site because of the storm about that time and aided the stricken

group. In addition to the third degree burns on his wrists and upper left arm, Munson suffered lesser burns on the right hip and legs. Even the bottoms of his feet were burned.

Joe Manley remains in the hospital. He received flash burns about the face and a retinal burn on one eye. Contrary to some belief the flash burn is not a disfiguring burn but is more like a severe sunburn his father said.

Besides the damage to his hand from beating out the fire in Munson's sleeping bag, Marr's burns were slight. Penn escaped serious injury.

Manley said that the action taken by the Scouts, the Girl Scouts and their leaders and the parents who arrived on the scene was marvelous. Doctors were summoned and arrived almost immediately. Everyone's help in the affair undoubtedly kept damage from turning to disaster, Manley said.

Tells Story of Vietnamese Village After Its Recapture

Editors Note: Colonel H. B. Lane, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mines, has been the senior advisor to the Vietnamese Army since December 19. Recently he sent the following clipping to the Mines' from the SAIGON POST.

It tells the story of the tiny village of Vinh Kim which the Vietnamese forces have recaptured from the Communist-backed forces. Col. Lane said he had visited the area on the day the Viet Cong had captured the village. A picture carried in conjunction with the article showed a group of happy children at Vinh Kim playing in the sun again as peace returned to their village. Remarks in the margin of the article by Col. Lane said "Thought you might be interested in this. Something so sad about their valiant but shabby attempts." The article is reprinted below.

During the action widespread damage was done to the village. Over 400 family houses were destroyed. Schools, bridges, the information hall, the market place, the health station and village headquarters were either completely destroyed or heavily damaged. The 4.2 kilometers of the road into

the area was cut in 104 different places with some sections four to five hundred meters long having been completely removed of roadbed.

Lt. Col. Do Kiem Hieu, the recently appointed province chief, found the village all but deserted. However, he decided to move Long Dinh District headquarters to the town and rebuild, and to assure the people that the government was determined to remain and develop what was left, a potentially economically rich area.

By the 30th of April, only 38 families of an estimated 1,200 had returned. But the word had spread. By the 5th day of May, 116 families, totaling 544 people had returned. In groups, 114 more families returned the following week.

The government's response toward rehabilitation "proved the government is prepared here to respond to the needs of the people" Rural Affairs Officer Hatcher James reported.

As the people continued to return, plans were set in motion to help these already trying to piece together homes and lives. Major Vong, Chief of Civil Affairs and the USOM Rural Affairs representatives came quickly to Saigon.

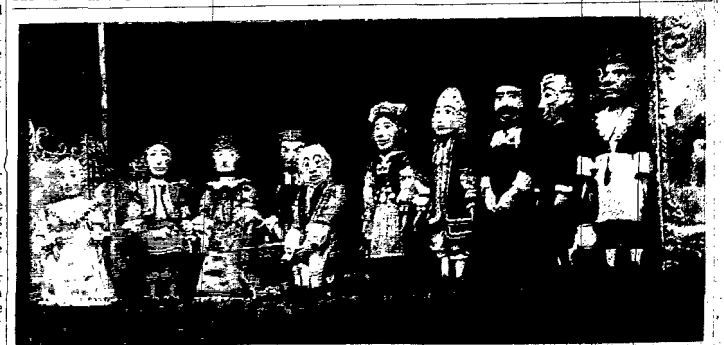
Going to the Secretary of State for Social Welfare, Mr. Tran Quang Thuan, assistance was immediately put into being. Within one day, the Province was issued eight tons of rice, 400 mosquito nets, 400 blankets, and ample clothing for some 400 families, which averages five persons generally. Total value of this assistance came to about 172,000 piasters.

In addition, the Secretary of State is to pay one third of the cost of wood necessary to rebuild the destroyed 400 houses in Vinh Kim. USOM will provide roofing and cement brought in under the aid program. The credit agency of the Ministry of Rural Affairs is providing loans to the people to help with the balance of construction costs.

"Of course this is just the beginning," James reports. "Now that the village is secure, we can begin our across-the-board agricultural, medical and educational improvements and reforms."

Such will include the distribution of improved rice seed, use now-payer later fertilizer under sponsorship, the supplying and restructuring of the health station and educational facilities.

The hope is that the people of Vinh Kim can now live in peace.

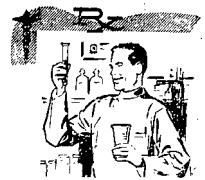
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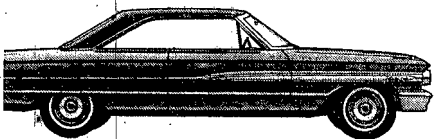


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DIXON ... Darrel Rahn Selected for Grant at Nebraska Wesleyan

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EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Cattle Crisis

What's wrong with the cattle industry? Ask 100 people and you are liable to get 100 answers, or at least 100 variations of the same answers.

The USDA recently presented an analysis of the cattle situation in which it was reported that compared to a year earlier the price of cattle is down about \$3.70 per hundredweight. Of this amount, they estimate that about 20 cents was due to increased supplies of poultry and pork; about 50 cents was due to the increased volume of imports and about \$3.00 due to the increased production of domestic beef.

On the other hand this explanation of the situation is pretty hard to sell to Charlie Berg of Chokio, Minn. Last year Berg lost nearly \$17,000 on 500 head of choice yearlings. Berg told the Minneapolis Tribune his ideas last week.

And like most of the nation's cattlemen, he's dead certain that cheaper imports — which last year climbed to record heights — can claim 50 per cent of that loss.

Who's right? A din of controversy is boiling up around that question right now and is reverberating all the way from the Corn Belt to Congress.

As stated earlier the USDA and most upper Midwest farm economists pin much of the blame on the producer himself.

Cheaper Imports

But the National Livestock Feeders Association, spokesman for thousands of Charlie Bergs across the nation, points instead to the flood of beef imports. Last year, said association executive secretary Don Magdanz of Omaha, beef imports reached 1.7 billion pounds — a level approximating 11 per cent of domestic production.

The impact of this in the eyes of the cattlemen, was best illustrated by Congressman E. Y. Berry of South Dakota in a recent letter to a South Dakota newspaper:

"If you fill a glass with water, one added drop will make it overflow," he wrote. "Pour in an additional 11 per cent and you spill water all over the place."

The effect is as disastrous, Berry said, when you dump an extra 11 per cent supply on an already saturated cattle market.

But this reasoning assumes that "beef is beef" — and it is around this question that the present controversy revolves.

The largest percentage of imports is made up of low quality, or processing beef — which, economists argue, would compete most directly with domestic cow and bull beef.

And the present price crisis, they say, is centered on the fat cattle market, from which the housewife's primal beef cuts are drawn.

For months, the nation's cattlemen have been hammering away at this argument, contending that beef competes with beef, no matter what the grade.

Grocers Blamed

Recently, supermarkets and grocers have been blamed for the current depressed livestock price situation. Charges have been made that the producers' surplus beef problem was compounded through unfair buying practices and maintaining high retail prices despite lower cattle and wholesale beef prices.

To the contrary, actual figures show that grocers have reduced their prices materially and have aggressively promoted beef. Tonnage handled by one chain alone has increased by 16 per cent in the early months of this year over the comparable period of last year.

Another USDA report in mid-May stated that although the spread between cattle prices and consumer beef prices has widened substantially in the past decade, profits per sales dollar for packers and retailers who market beef have been large compared with other industries.

The report said profits per dollar of beef sales reported by packers and retailers "have not been large in recent years" despite an expanding margin between farm and retail prices. Profit rates have not changed much in the past 15 years and have been "in the low range compared to other industries."

The report added that retailers seem to have changed their policy in charging overhead costs. Beef appears to be carrying more of the retail overhead than it did 10 years ago, while pork appears to be carrying less.

health authorities. Filipi said he considers installation of new water wells as "major improvements."

Reapportionment Issue

The Nebraska legislative reapportionment issue was brought back into the news when the U. S. Supreme Court ruled recently that representation in state legislative bodies must be based on population only.

The nation's highest court said that "legislatures represent people, not trees or acres."

There was almost immediate comment in some Nebraska legal circles that the reasoning of the Supreme Court would also apply to Nebraska, if Nebraska's re-districting law were tested.

The law, implementing a constitutional amendment, provides that the state may give some weight to area and the remainder to population when it reapportions the Legislature. This law was used last year when the Unicameral gave 20 percent weight to area in redrawing the boundaries of legislative districts.

A lawsuit challenging the area constitutional amendment and the reapportionment law stemming from it is on file in the federal court in Lincoln. A panel of three judges announced some months ago it would not make a ruling in the case until after the U. S. high court gave it more guidelines.

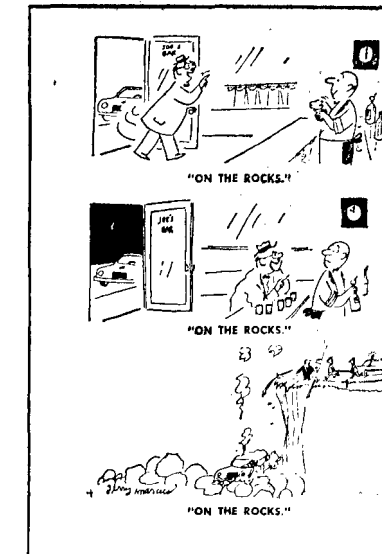
Governor Morrison said he would not think of calling a special legislative session until after the three judges rule.

Our homes can literally be considered kegs of dynamite when it is recognized how many explosive materials are stored or used within the household.

Some water-repellent products for sealing basements and other similar structures are explosive. One of these products which has been banned from the market has an explosive range between that

of gasoline and ether.

Adhesives for applying tiles or counter tops also can be explosive and have caused many fires as a result of misuse. When selecting tile adhesives, it is best to check with a reliable dealer and make sure that you are buying one that is not explosive. Both kinds are sold and it is up to the buyer to make sure he is buying the non-explosive type.

Products such as hair spray, paints and other similar materials that are stored in pressurized cans can be dangerous. Any of these products sprayed in the vicinity of an open flame can explode with violent results.

Persons who store every-day products such as gasoline in glass jars or who use this material as a solvent or cleaning agent are flirting with danger.

Many of these products have no place in the home. Those that are used, such as hair sprays, and spray paints, demand extreme caution. As a further safeguard, it would be wise when using these products to make sure that all pilot lights are extinguished.

Seems that in spite of all we have tried to do, and are trying to do, we are less appreciated than if we had gone serenely on our own way. So some doubts arise in my mind. I wonder if we wouldn't have been better off to have kept our own counsel, and concentrated on just what was good for us alone. I have these doubts, and so do you.

must be determined enough and strong enough to withstand all of the vilification that may be leveled upon it. Big enough and strong enough to recover from any mistakes it may make.

Right now opinion is divided as to whether or not we are making some mistakes. Of one thing though, I am dead sure. There should be no division of opinion or effort as to our support of the policies, even though some doubt may exist in our minds.

We might be making, as I say, some mistakes, but those mistakes will not be half as big as the one we would make, if we were to present anything less than a solid unified front to the world. We may have some reservations in regard to all these policies, but certainly we should defend them with all our heart and strength. After all, you know they are **our** policies.

Farm Records Important

Farmers trying to salvage something from buildings and machinery damaged in storms and severe weather will find adequate records especially important.

Good records and pictures, where possible, will be valuable in getting income tax and insurance adjustments.

Proof of ownership also will be useful in some cases.

To obtain tax adjustments next winter, farmers will need to be able to substitute the following:

1. The nature and date of the casualty.
2. That the loss was a direct result of the casualty.
3. That the property was owned by the taxpayer.

Both personal and business property may qualify.

4. The original cost of the property.

5. Depreciation taken in former years, if any.

6. Value before and after the casualty.

7. The amount of insurance or other compensation received.

Much of this information may be harder to recall or prove next winter than it is now. A complete list of damaged and destroyed items should be recorded now rather than waiting until the information is needed and relying on memory alone.

Details on the handling of casualty losses may be obtained through a Treasury Department Internal Revenue Service Publication (IRS Document No. 5174 (9-60) titled "How the Federal Income Tax Applies to Hurricanes, Floods, Tornadoes, Other Disasters, Thefts and Condemnations."

Rules For Farm Investing
Heavy dollar investments and slender profit margins require that farmers think twice before they invest in new buildings and equipment.

Although each individual farm must be analyzed individually, the decision might well depend on whether or not the owner can recover the original investment as well as some profit over a ten-year period—or during the useful life of the machine or facility.

Plan Farm Shop
Farm shops need not be a place where all construction, repair and maintenance work can be done.

Primary use of a farm shop is to provide a place where you can do a large portion of the minor repair and maintenance jobs that do not require specialization, says Delbert Lane, University of Nebraska Extension agricultural engineer.

When planning a shop, he said, consider these factors: 1. Make it big enough to store and use all your shop tools and equipment. 2. Is there enough room for you to work on most of your farm equipment and can it be kept clean and orderly? 3. Is there storage or supplies as well as spare parts, bolts and other equipment.

Size of the building will vary according to your needs, Lane said, but special consideration should be given to the size of doors. Doors should be big enough to admit the biggest machine you may want to repair. The shop should have a good concrete floor and provisions made for heating and ventilating, since much of the work in the shop will be done during bad weather, Lane advised.

Benches, lightning, storage and equipment arrangement are all important parts of this work center. Before you design your shop visit several in the area. Incorporate the best ideas into the one that you are planning, he concluded.

Capitol News Livestock Research Center Scheduled at Clay Center

LINCOLN — The federal Bureau of the Budget has cleared away final roadblocks for the \$10-million-dollar livestock research center near Clay Center.

Involved is the transfer of 10,000 acres of the Naval Ammunition Storage Depot to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Governor Morrison has expressed the belief the station will develop into the nation's leading research center. The depot facilities include 48,000 acres of land. It is expected that the USDA will have various types of research units, including the beef station at Fort Robinson. Present plans also call for 45 scientists assisted by another 150 staffers.

A major laboratory building will be erected along with other buildings. The cost has been estimated at \$4 million. It is expected the animals at the research center will include approximately 5,000 cattle, 10,000 sheep and 3,000 hogs.

Morrison, who justly elated over the developments, said livestock will continue to be Nebraska's number one industry. He said the range land at Fort Robinson could either revert to private ownership or be maintained as a range research project. But Morrison said he hopes the real estate around the Fort Robinson military area can be preserved by the state for historical, recreational and scientific potential.

The State Game Commission has already made application to the federal government for land for a major state park development.

Tax Hearing

The language turned hot during the most recent meeting of Senator Terry Carpenter's tax study subcommittee.

Voicing vigorous objections to the subcommittee chairman's subpoena issued to him was Dr. P. E. Getscher, Lincoln. The subpoena was issued after the doctor said it was the only method by which the subcommittee was going to get any detailed financial information from him.

It turned out that the doctor did not have all the information Carpenter had demanded in the subpoena. He was given until Aug. 1 to supply the data. Carpenter warned that if the

information requested is not made available, the senator will start contempt proceedings in district court.

Dr. Getscher's complaint was that of all the citizens in the state, he was singled out to make a complete report of his private business affairs.

He described the subcommittee's hearing as a "carnival" and added that only over "my dead body" would the subcommittee get access to his private patient's records. At the same time he said all members of the full tax study committee should reveal publicly their own financial affairs "and subject yourselves to the same questions you are about to ask me."

Another suggestion was that the senators clarify tax laws and eliminate errors on assessor's guides and stop immediately any more hearings such as the one he was ordered to attend.

Retirement Law Valid

The State Supreme Court has laid to rest any lingering doubts about the validity of the retirement law enacted by the 1963 Legislature.

The high court said the law—which covers state employees not included in earlier retirement plans—is valid in every respect.

Prior to the 1963 legislative session there had been numerous bills introduced for certain segments of state workers who wanted retirement benefits. The lawmakers said it would be much more equitable to enact one law which would take care of all employees not already covered. An employee of the State Aeronautics Department had challenged the law, arguing that it was unconstitutional in some respects. The Supreme Court did not agree.

Contaminated Water

T. A. Filipi, State Health Department sanitation division director says summer campers at the Girl Scout Camp at Nebraska City and the Franklin County 4-H Camp almost drank contaminated water this season.

He told the State Health Board it has been increasingly difficult to get many of the 80 camps in the state to observe state laws. He noted that the statutes provided that when major improvements are made permission must first be obtained from the state
