



The USDA recently presented an analysis of the cattle situation in which it was reported that compared to a year earlier the price of cattle is down about \$3.70 per hundredweight. Of this amount, they estimate that about 20 couts was due to increased supplies of poulfry and pork; about 50 cents was due to the increased volume of imports and about \$3.00 due to the increased production of domestic beef.

On the other hand this explanation of the situation is pretty hard to sell to Charlie Berg of Chokio, Minn, Last year Berg lost marly \$17,000 on 500 head-of choice yearlings. Berg told the Mincapolis Tribune his ideas has week.

The largest percentage of imports is The largest percentage of imports is made up of low quality, or processing beef — which, economists argue, would compete most directly with domestic cow and bull beef.

And the present price crisis, they say, is centered on the fat cattle market, from which the housewife's primal beef cuts are drawn.

For months, the nation's cattlemen have been hammering away at this argument, contending that beef competes with beef, no matters what the grade.

Grocers Blamed

Recently, supermarkets and grocers have been blamed for the current depressed livestock price situation. Charges have been made that the producers surplus beef problem was compounded through unfair buying practices and maintaining high retail prices despite lower cattle and wholesale beef prices.

To the contrary, actual figures show that grocers have reduced their prices materially and have aggressively promoted beef. Tonnage handled by one chain alone has increased by 16 per cent in the early months of this year over the comparable period of last year.


Another USDA report in mid-May stated that although the spread between cattle prices and consumer beef prices has widened substantially in the past decade, profits per sales dollar for packers and retailers who market beef have been large compared with other industries.

The report said profits per dollar of

been large compared with other industries.

The report said profits per dollar of beef sales reported by packers and retailers "have not been large in recent years" despite an expanding margin between farm and retail prices. Profit rates have not changed much in the past 15 years and have been "in the low range compared to other industries."

The report added that retailers seem to have changed their policy in charging overhead costs. Beef appears to be carrying more of the retail overhead than it did 10 years ago, while pork appears to be carrying less.

LINCOLN — The federal Bureau of the Budget has cleared away final roadblocks for the eventual development of a multimilion-dollar livestock research center near Clay Center. Invelved is the transfer of 10,000 acres of the Naval Amminition Storage Depot to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Governor Morrison has expressed the belief the station will develop into the hatien's leading research center. The depot facilities include 48,000 acres of land. It is expected that the USDA will have various types of research units, including the bed station at Fort Robinson. Pressent plans also call for 45 scientists assisted by another 150 staffers, A major laboratory building

tists assisted by another 150 staffers,

A major laboratory building will be erected along with other buildings. The edst has been estimated at \$4 million. It is expected the animals at the research center will include approximately 5,000 calute, 10,000 sheep and 3,500 hogs.

Morrison, obviously elated over the developments, said divestock will continue to be Nebraska's number one industry. He said the range land at Fort Robinson could either revert to private ownership or be maintained as a range research project. But Morrison said he hopes the real estate around the Fort Robinson military area can be preserved by the state for historical, recreational and sofentific potential.

The State Gaine Commission has already made application to the federal government for land for a "major state park development.

The high court said the law—which covers state employees not included in earlier retirement plans—is valid in every respect. Prior to the 1963 legislative session there had been numerous bills introduced for certain segments of state workers who wanted retirement benefits. The law-makers said it would be much more equitable to enact one law which would take care of all employees not already covered. An employee of the State Aeronautics Department had challenged the law, arguing that it was unconstitutional in some respects. The Supreme Court did not agree.

A lawsuit challenging the area constitutional amendment and the reapportionment law stemming from it is on file in the federal court in Lincoln. A panel of three judges announced some months ago it would not make a ruling in the case until after the U.S. high court gave it more guidelines.
