

## State Aeronautics Board Approves Runway Paving

Wayne Municipal airport will have a new paved runway in 1965. This is a result of a hearing held by the State department of aeronautics in Lincoln last Friday.

Appearing in behalf of the Wayne project were city councilmen Kent Hall, Arnie Reeg and Lyle Seymour, planning commissioner Alan Kramer, city clerk Howard Witt and airport manager Don Johnson.

Engineer's estimate for the job was \$60,000. Of this total, half the cost will be borne by Federal government, and the State and City will divide the remaining cost at 25 per cent each. Total cost to Wayne will be \$15,000.

Improvements included in the package will be paving (black top) 2,900 feet, 50 feet wide; 75 foot lift around areas at each end of the runway, and widening of the paving around the gas pumps.

# Hahn High Closes Tuesday; Marks End of 54 Years at WS

The last group of Wayne State's elementary students left the campus Tuesday, and the Hahn Campus school, which has thrived along with the college for the past 54 years, went out of existence.

Elementary students will again occupy the building this fall, but they will be attending classes of the Wayne City school system, which has the use of the two lower floors for the next two years.

The decision to close the Hahn school, along with similar schools at Kearney State college and Chadron State college, was announced by the Board of Education for State Normal schools last fall. The reason given by the Board was one of economy, since the appropriation granted by the 1963 Legislature to the state colleges was not sufficient to permit continued operation of these schools.

The campus school at Peru State college, which will remain open, is the only one available to the public in that district, and is supported partially by local taxes. The schools being closed have been financed entirely by state appropriations.

The Campus High school at Wayne was closed by the Board in May, 1962, for similar reasons.

Since the high school was closed, college students preparing for secondary teaching have done their directed teaching in public high schools in Nebraska and Iowa towns. With the closing of the elementary school, similar arrangements will be made for elementary preparatory students.

The Hahn Campus school is an outgrowth of the old Model school, which was part of the college when it opened in 1910. With a faculty of two, Edith Stocking, primary critic, and Rachel Fairchild, grammar critic, it was used, as it is now, by teacher-preparatory students for observation and practice teaching.

A year later a kindergarten critic was added, and by the time it was established in its own building (the present Art-Commerce building) in 1916, it consisted of a kindergarten and eight grades with A. F. Gulliver as principal.

At that time ninth and tenth graders were known as "preparatory students" and were part of the college; and the eleventh and twelfth graders were its "freshmen" and "sophomores."

By the time the training school was ready to move into its present building in 1926, the college was offering a bachelor's degree in addition to the two-year diploma, but students above the diploma level were called "graduates."

Shortly after the new building was opened, however, a high school was added to the training school, and the "preparatory students" and others were absorbed into it, and the four collegiate classes became the freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors.

The Model school was first housed in the old Ward building, located south of the campus on Main street, and later moved to the "Administration building" (the present Art-Commerce building). Here it occupied one end of the ground-floor gymnasium, but the demands of the physical education classes forced it across the street into East Hall, which it shared with the men students living there. It went back to the gymnasium in 1912 and to the main college building in 1913. When this building was razed, the Model school journeyed back down Main street to the Ward school. When the new Administration building was opened in 1915, the Model school returned to the old building, thereafter known as the Training School, where it remained until the present building was opened in 1926.

In 1922, at the instigation of alumni and friends of the college, the training school was re-named the Hahn Campus School, in honor of Dean Henry H. Hahn, long-time director of the teacher-education program at Wayne State.

## Driver's Ed. Class Attracts 35 Students

Thirty-five Wayne City high school students, under the direction of Anton Netherda and Donald Lauda, are currently enrolled for the summer driver education program.

Two dual-control training cars, donated by Coryell Auto Co., are being used for the behind-the-wheel phase of the instruction. A minimum of 30 class hours will be devoted to a study of the physical and psychological aspects of highway driving with emphasis on safety and the conservation of lives and property on our nation's streets and highways.

Included as a part of the classroom work has been the presentation of a safety program by Trooper O'Dell of the Nebraska Safety Patrol.

Each student will be required to satisfactorily complete six or more hours of actual driving behind-the-wheel until skill and proficiency in the basic fundamentals of safe operation of the automobile have been acquired.

The course will terminate in July.

The detonator is mounted on the front bumper. Two blank cartridges, loaded with yellow marking powder, are inserted into the two miniature gun barrels which point downward toward the pavement. The explosion shoots the yellow marking powder to the pavement. After the student has braked the car to a quick, smooth stop, the marks are measured to compute the student's reaction time distance, braking distance and stopping distance.


## "Hey, Dad, WHAT DOES THE 4th of JULY Mean?"

# Control of New Pest Is Explained by Co. Agent



"It used to be years ago that a farmer and his family would spend some time taking care of the details around his farm. Now, as farming gets bigger, more and more attention is being paid to the larger, more urgent items such as crops and livestock, and less and less to the details. Among these details is the musk thistle."

This is one of the reasons given by Harold Ingalls, Wayne County Agricultural Agent, for the spreading of musk thistle.

"Musk thistle" is the name given to this weed species relatively new to Nebraska. It was first found in Nebraska in 1940 in Richardson county, and since that time has taken over thousands of acres of Nebraska pastureland. By 1959 it became such a nuisance that the Nebraska Legislature declared it a noxious weed.

There are two main reasons for the undesirable nature of musk thistle: (1) it reduces forage yields by robbing moisture and plant food from palatable grasses, and (2) livestock refuse to walk through fields heavily stubbled by the weed.

One might ask "Why?" to the second above-reason, but a short trip through a pasture filled with the spiny, prickling plants is answer enough. And how does one find musk thistle? Just a name agreed upon for a plant recognizable by nearly every farmer since it may be found in almost all grazing land. It can be easily spotted by its deep reddish purple flowers when in bloom. It's in bloom now in pastures throughout Nebraska.

#### Spring treatment of the thistle

(with 2,4-D) should be done sometime between April 25 and May 10. This is the period just before the stalk of the thistle begins to grow.

If the first application does not give 100% results, the process must be repeated the following season, and so forth. And if the pasture is already infested by a large number of the adult plants, the best method of control is to drop a plow into the field and keep a close eye on the spot for any sign of the plant growth.  
"All the Extension Service can do is warn of the danger in the spread of musk thistle and prescribe control procedures," stated Ingalls. "The rest is up to the farmers."

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## Cattle Crisis

The nation's food retailers, recognizing the more than normal beef supplies available in the country, spent at least \$100 million advertising and promoting beef sales during 1963. This information was given at an Iowa Bankers Association group meeting held recently by Cecil E. Hellbusch, a farm and livestock consultant for one of the nation's chain stores.

The per capita consumption of beef increased from 89 pounds in 1962 to 93 pounds in 1963. This is an indication that retail beef prices are in line with wholesale costs because consumers would switch to other meat products if they felt beef was not priced competitively. Hellbusch told the group.

He stated that cattle breeders and feeders are at the controls when it comes to providing retailers with the most desirable carcasses of beef. These carcasses range from 500 to 700 pounds for steers and from 450 to 575 pounds for heifers.

Hellbusch urged cattle feeders to market their cattle at desirable weights and help eliminate the extra pounds of fat that were marketed last year.

"The cattle industry is plagued with extra numbers and when 30 to 50 pounds of extra weight is added to each animal sold, the situation becomes doubly bad. Retailers hope to get from 73 to 74 per cent consumer cuts from each carcass, but when it drops 68 per cent or lower, with the balance being fat, bone and waste, it becomes very costly for the retailers to handle beef," he said.

Dr. Herroll DeGraff, a food economist from Cornell University had this to say about the situation.

"In all earlier cattle cycles it has been true that when beef supplies reached a high level of about 65 pounds per capita, or a little more, the cattle cycle turned around and per capita supplies declined. When the per capita supplies reached a low point of 55 pounds, or a little less, the cycle turned again and supplies began to increase. A decade ago the picture changed. Supply and consumption broke out of the previous range on the up side. In 1954 consumption rose to the unprecedented figure of 80 pounds. All through the late 50's it was between 80 and 85 pounds. In 1962, it was just shy of 90 pounds — last year it hit the remarkable figure of 93 pounds.

From a 24 million in beef cow numbers in 1958, they have increased to 31.8 million head. There has been a one-third increase in six years. Today even dairy cows are producing steers for the feed lot.

"Annual beef production per cow has been trending sharply up — an increase of 16 per cent in beef production per cow per year in just the last ten years — so that even the increase in cow numbers does not fully measure our increased beef production.

"When the price of calves is good the decision is to keep the cow for the one more calf she might produce. When cow prices are down, the decision apparently is to keep her because she is not worth much in the market.

"In recent years we have been very rapidly building up our beef producing potential. Moreover, price behavior since 1959 has indicated that we have

been putting into the market about all the beef that consumers would take without risking a decline in cattle prices. From 1959 through 1962 was not a time of soft prices but marketings were about as high as possible without price softness developing.

"In the second quarter of 1961 we did have a temporary price break, brought about by bunched marketings. This straightened out and prices again stabilized through practically all of 1962. The heavier marketings of 1963 DID bring on the price break.

"Everything in the history of the cattle business tells us that we cannot go on year after year with slaughter rates well below the level of production. I am fearful that we are about to see the patterns of the mid-50's all over again. The very success — fantastic success — of the beef in the consumer market in recent years has of itself, built up much of the trouble the industry is now facing.

"In addition, good prices for cattle and beef in this country have made the American market more effective than any other in the world — and thus a magnet to the exporting countries. In 1963, with a population of 190 million people we had a domestic production of 2.8 billion pounds of cow and bull meat — or 14 pounds per capita — almost 50 per cent decline on a per capita basis from 1955.

"Even with 1.5 billion pounds of manufacturing-type beef imported last year, we still had an aggregate supply (domestic plus imported) of five billion pounds LESS than the aggregate in 1955 — and 15 per cent less per person of our population. In all the discussion of the import question, I have not seen this figure presented or an explanation of what would have happened to our supplies of manufactured meat products without the imports that have come to us from other countries.

"Economic changes have occurred in the cattle business. One of these changes is the growth of the cattle feeding industry — and especially the increasing number of commercial feeders with large fixed investments in feed lot facilities.

"I see a marked parallel between these feeders and meat packing industry. They get large fixed investments in 'blue silos', paved feed lots, feed mills and other facilities — and they simply cannot sit still and look at an empty lot.

"The farmer-feeder historically has been a highly flexible operator. He did not HAVE the cattle, and he fed in proportion to his own feed supplies and the market prospects as he saw them. The commercial feeder is less flexible. Like the meat packer, his fixed costs go on whether he operates or not — in consequence of which he strives to grind out more and more fed beef to justify his 'sunk capital investment.'

"I ask, if the commercial feeder with his large committed capital is not pushing toward an ever-rising volume of beef output, and whether this may not be leading toward (1) a new tune of domestic beef industry and (2) less flexibility in our domestic beef production.

"I have a disturbing feeling that the beef business, under this influence is getting to be like the chicken business — always pressuring for volume even though price takes a beating."



does amass a bit of a competence and finally shuffles off this mortal coil, the inheritance tax takes such a bite out of it that his surviving dependents are hard put, in these days of mounting living costs and dwindling dollar values, to scratch out enough to live on.

Then, too, there is the chap who incurs obligations, in trying to make for his future security. By the time he gets done paying his taxes, there isn't much left for him to apply on his indebtedness. The more he makes off his investment, the more he pays for the privilege of making it, and the less he has to apply on his capital debt.

Sure, I know that if we dance, we must pay the fiddler. It costs to run a government, and that money has to come from practically one source, the taxpayer. We are willing to assume that obligation.

Somehow though, most of us would assume it, with much more grace, if we could be assured that as much thought and concern was being evidenced, as to the future security and soundness of our government, as we display in our personal futures.

You know that there are some guide posts for government and government economies that have been set up, and to the average man on the street, they look pretty sensible. For instance, Bernard Baruch has given some pretty sound advice. The Hoover Commission has done a wonderful job, in specifically pin-pointing courses of procedure, that would have immeasurable resultant benefits. Mind you, this Commission's work was not just a voluntary offering, but was the

result of being established by the Government, to make specific recommendations as to streamlining government procedures and cutting government expenditures. What became of their sound findings and recommendations? Practically nothing. They have been relegated to the background. Instead of following some of the suggestions set forth, each Department head seems to feel that most certainly these reforms must have been meant for some other Department, and that in his own particular instance, it is vital for his Bureau to expand, rather than to contract.

What do we end up with? A country plumb full of Federal job holders most of them more intent on hanging onto the public teat and making their job look necessary, than they are of being of any value to you and me. As they used to say in the army, "They are looking for sergeants."

What do we get for all of it? Just more government in business, more regulation and a lot of just plain snooping. If you want to be brutally frank about it, there is very definitely a "glorified relief" program, cloaked with the disguise of Government, which adds an air of respectability to the acceptance of public pay. Meantime, you and I are paying the bill, along with helping to build up a pension fund for the security of the job holder, the expense of our own, and our family's future security.

## Capitol News . . . Present Bookkeeping System O.K. According to Johnson

LINCOLN — State Auditor Ray Johnson is urging voters to turn down proposed constitutional amendments for revising the state's bookkeeping system.

Johnson claims the changes "are no good and should not be approved by the people." He said it would eliminate the traditional check on state expenditures presently existing between the state auditor and state treasurer's offices.

The changes were suggested by an accounting firm from Chicago employed by the last Legislature to conduct a comprehensive study of Nebraska's accounting system. After considering the proposals, the lawmakers agreed to submit the issue to the voters in the form of a constitutional amendment.

Johnson says the changes would transfer the responsibility for approving all state expenditures from the state treasurer and the auditor's office to the state tax commissioner. The treasurer and auditor are elected and the tax commissioner is appointed by the governor.

The state auditor fears that transfer of such responsibility to the tax commissioner might result in approval of many expenditures which might otherwise be rejected. He says approval of the expenditures should remain with an independent department.

"One where the man directly responsible is elected by the people and is responsible to those people."

Furthermore, Johnson said that no department in state government is currently operated as economically and efficiently as the state auditor's.

Dunleavy Named Governor Morrison has appointed James Dunleavy, 31, Lincoln, as his special assistant, succeeding John Kelley who resigned last March to take a position with a Lincoln insurance company.

Dunleavy, a recent graduate of Nebraska College of Law and night news editor of the Lincoln Star, will receive \$7,500 a year. He was formerly news director for radio station KPOR, Lincoln and had previous news experience with newspapers and radio stations in Galesburg, Ill.

Morrison said Dunleavy's first job will be coordination of the governor's efforts to establish a Midwest voting bloc in Congress. The governor said factoring heavily in Dunleavy's selection was the fact that he is a lawyer. "We badly need a lawyer on the governor's staff," Morrison commented.

The appointment becomes effective July 1.

Selective Service Exams Local boards for the Nebraska Selective Service will start ordering 18-year-old registrants to report for complete examinations.

Lt. Gov. Guy N. Henninger, Nebraska Selective Service director, said, however, the examinations do not mean the registrants face induction in the "immediate future." The order, he explained, is in line with President Johnson's program calling for examination of 18-year-old youths who have not been deferred for other reasons.

Henninger said in Nebraska the average age of those inducted involuntarily into the armed forces is about 21 years and nine months.

Replies to Criticism State Engineer John Hossack has said it would be ridiculous to build a five-mile scenic route from Nebraska Highway 98 west to Weigand Basin at Lewis and Clark Lake without hard-surfacing the highway from Crofton, north.

ever, Hossack says it would be "silly" to spend a quarter of a million dollars for an access road from the basin and then dump motorists onto graveled Highway 98.

Opponents of the Highway Department proposal claim the department cannot legally use access road funds for improvement of existing state highways. The money for access roads is realized from a 50-cent increase in the motor vehicle registration fee approved by the 1963 Legislature.

The Weigand Basin project has been given first priority in use of the funds with construction slated to start this year. Hossack said that the Highway Department may delay action on Highway 98 until differences have been ironed out.

## Co. Agent's Column

Urges Restraint The Federal Reserve bank of Kansas City urges restraint in any action to curb imports of beef.

An article in the "Monthly Review" titled "The Beef Industry in Perspective" presents an encouraging outlook in the long run.

The concluding paragraphs which follow are worth consideration: Increased imports have been an additional burden on cattle prices, but the major factor has been the sharply increased domestic production. For the long-run good of the beef industry, feeding systems need to be emphasized that will reduce slaughter weights, and the rate of expansion in beef cow numbers needs to be slowed.

All available evidence indicates that demand for beef is continuing to increase on a per capita basis as well as because of population growth. American consumers generally prefer beef that is lean, tender, tasty, and from cattle fed in such a way as to yield light carcasses.

On the other hand, economic principles cannot operate effectively if trade is restrained. One need not put forth much




