### Patio Becomes Attractive Haven for Relaxing and Outdoor Entertaining

One of the easiest and most economical ways to add both comfort and value to your home is to build a patio.

A patio can be as simple or as complex as you want to make it. By using wood, it's possible for a weekend carpenter, using simple tools, to do the whole job himself.

**Wood for Harmony**  
Flagstones are frequently used for patios, but in some cases, wood will harmonize better with the color and styling of your home. The deck should simply be laid on a framework of naturally durable or preservative-treated 2 x 4s partly imbedded in the ground. It's a good idea to put a layer of sand between the ground and the underside of the decking.

Before embarking on the construction job, though, plan the patio carefully. Decide first of all what it will be used for—sun-bathing, reading? Patios also serve, of course, as children's play areas and make ideal settings for summer parties.

Some patios have built-in storage areas which are used for such things as gardening tools and outdoor furniture.

If the family is going to be using the patio at night, you'll probably want to install electric outlets and screening. Sun-bathing calls for a patio with a western or eastern exposure. If very young children will be playing in the area, you may want to make it easily visible from the kitchen. Another point to remember in picking a location is that existing walls and fences can provide part or all of the enclosure needed.

If an additional enclosure is desired, it can be built in a number of ways, since one of the big advantages of wood is that it provides almost infinite design variation. You can cut it to satisfy any set of dimensions, shape it or assemble it into a variety of attractive patterns and obtain additional variety through the use of the natural grain by applying paint or stain.

**Decking Placement**  
Whether or not the decking is to be placed directly on the ground or raised is another question that depends largely upon the general lay of the land. It may be constructed either way, but if the yard slopes appreciably, it would be better to raise the decking on posts. Solid lumber is ideally suited to this type of construction.

Some very interesting patio enclosures can be built by forming an open lattice of horizontal and vertical 2x4s spaced 6 to 12 inches apart. Another idea is to build a framework of 2x4s and then panel it on one or both sides.

A patio or sundeck might be free-standing, attached to the house or detached but connected via a series of protected decking walkways. Whichever it is to be, consideration must be given to the existing landscaping, property lines and the direction of the sun's rays and the prevailing winds.

And when selecting the actual design of the structure, these factors must be taken into account. That is, the functional must be considered as well as the aesthetic.

Perhaps, for example, the windward side of the patio, deck or pool ought to be sheltered. Such protection can be achieved by incorporating a distinctive solid lumber screen along the windward side. By using a lattice-work design, vertical louvers or a basket weave design for the screen, protection can be achieved without cutting off the supply of light and air completely.

Wood is also easily available and economical. A lumber yard or building materials dealer is probably only a short distance away from where you are right now.

(Continued from page 1) members and 200 baptized members to the present membership of 420 communicate members and more than 600 baptized members.

In 1941 Pastor Hilpert suffered

several heart attacks but made a complete recovery. In 1941 he supervised the organization of Immanuel Lutheran church, Laurel, where he served 14 months as vacancy pastor.

In 1947 after the death of Pastor Walter Brackensick, he served as vacancy pastor of Grace Lutheran church, Wayne, about 11 months. He served as vacancy pastor at St. Paul's church, Carroll, about 10 years.

In 1952 he supervised the construction of the new \$135,000 St. Paul's Lutheran church, which was dedicated Oct. 21, 1956. Construction of the new \$30,000 parsonage was begun in August, 1963, and it was dedicated Sunday in conjunction with the observance of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Hilpert. 40 years of service.

During his 40 years at Winfield, Pastor Hilpert has baptized 508 children and adults; confirmed 354 children and adults; performed 125 marriages and laid to rest 148 members of his parish. 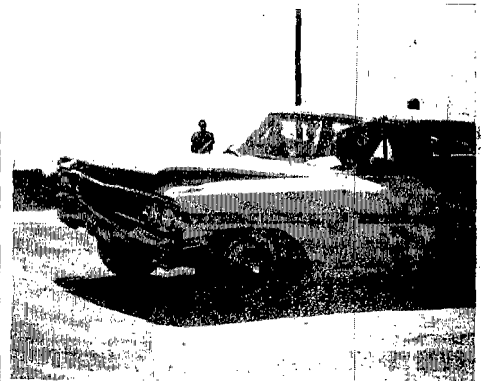

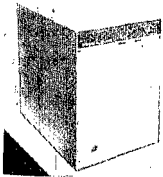

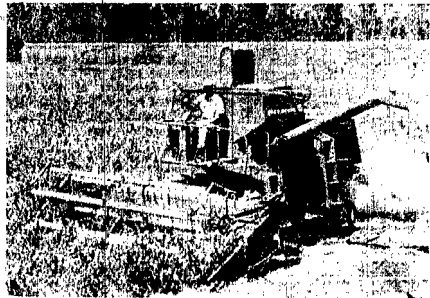

## TRY KABOBS FOR OUTDOOR MEALS

It's the season for a backyard barbecue — the kind of a meal that puts everyone in good spirits. One of the most fun things you can choose to grill over the coals is the "meat on a stick" — kabobs. Everyone can join in by threading and grilling his own.

So many combinations of meat cubes, vegetables and fruits are possible when cooking kabobs. Set out the makings, and each person can take his choice.

Marinated lamb cubes would be delicious as the meat, in fact, back in ancient days in the Near East, lamb was the first meat ever cooked in this manner.

The extra marinade may be brushed on the kabobs while grilling. Reba Staggs, meat cookery authority, reminds you to select a meat that is tender enough to cook by dry heat when grilling kabobs.

**Lamb Kabobs**  
2 pounds homeless lamb shoulder, cut in 1 1/2-inch cubes  
1/2 cup salad oil  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/2 teaspoon thyme  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
3 medium tomatoes  
1 medium green pepper  
1 jar (16 ounces) small whole onions  
6 12-inch metal skewers  
Blend salad oil, vinegar, lemon juice, dry mustard, thyme, salt, pepper and chopped onion. Add lamb cubes and let stand several hours or overnight in the refrigerator. Drain, reserving marinade. Cut tomatoes in quarters and green pepper in 1-inch squares. Thread lamb cubes, tomato wedges, green pepper squares and onions alternately on skewers. Brush with marinade and grill 3 inches from the heat 13 to 15 minutes, turning occasionally, until browned on all sides. Brush with marinade while grilling. 6 servings.

Much of the responsibility for the operation, care and safe use of this equipment rests with the homemaker. Selection of the right equipment for the job determines how successful the homemakers meet these responsibilities.

Since attending this session, Miss Anderson feels she can more adequately answer "homemaker's" questions in regard to household equipment. She is willing to present related programs in the area upon request.
