EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

The Ultimate Tragedy

Writing in the Register, a publication issued by the Catholic Press Society, Inc., Frank Morriss reaches the heart of the issue that was involved in the traigistrike of Belgian doctors against the Relgian government recently: "I write to remind those who care to listen that the medical profession is an ancient and free one. It is nearly as ancient as priesthood, and, in fact, in some areas seems to mell in origin into that profession... For a doctor to, allow anything extraneous to his own conscience and skill to dictate to him how to function as a doctor would be as inmoval as for a writer to allow anything beyond his own conscientious beliefs to dictate to him what to put down as truth... I am not saying, mind you, that doctors or any others should be above laws for protection of the common good. I am saying that the professionals much by beyond the dictation of the government in the exercise. from of the government in the exercise of their professions. . . . Those of other professions . . . Those of other professions, trades, and skills may stand

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given earful thought to an important problem and the territer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

by unconcerned while this tragedy takes place. But they should take heed from the words of the poet and preacher John Donne. The bell that tolls the death of free medicine is also tolling the death of free religion, free justice, free press, All the excuses of the common good that apply to medicine apply in different degrees to these other professions... What diminishes the freedom of my doctor takes from me, too."

When any group becomes a tool of bureaucracy as the doctors are threatened with under state medicine, the end result can not be other than tragic.

There are 190 million Americans, and to serve each 1,000 of us there are 1,2 doctors, 4.1 lawyers and judges, 4 gas station operators, 4 telephone workers; and to serve each 1,000 of us there are 13 Federal civilian employees. Uncle Sam's helpers are many.



linked to a massive fish kill in

He said "live years later we are
still spraying these poisons
across Nobraska and they are
now showing up in high levels in

Spray Starch

Do you or don't you use spray starch? Should you or shouldn't you use spray starch?

It all depends on your and the starch!

With an old fashioned dry starch it costs less than one tenth of a cent to starch a shirt. The cost is higher; if you use spray starch. This cost difference is largely the packaging, which is an aerosol can, plus an expensive advertising campaign.

Spray starches are not as easy to use as the TV commercials might lead you to believe.

The beginner must master a technique to get an even spray. And if the can is tilted too far during spraying, the propollent escapes, making it impossible to use all the contents of the can. Tilting the can too far also causes the spray to clog and sputter.

Uneven spraying affects ironing results. Spray starches dampen as they spray, so that a steam iron is generally not necessary. An iron that is too hot will scored any starch, particularly a heavy film of it.

To avoid heavy build-up when heavy starching is needed, most manufacturers recommend a light application of starch, followed by ironing, then another light application, and so on. Spray starches serve host for light touch-up jobs, for spot starching and for small items. Thrifty homemakers may prefer the conventional starch for the heavy starching of big things. Starching instructions are given on some "casy care" or "wash'n wear" fabries and garments. Occasionally the label will state DO NOT STARCH. Homemakers should always read the labels or hang lags and follow the manufacturer's instructions.

By following these rules, you can avoid unfavorable soil conditions; conserve fertilizer; reduce disease, insect, and weed problems; and improve the quality of the turf.

Grass roots use most of their waler from a depth of 9 to 15 in thes.

The length of for water the depth will depend upon the soil texture in your lawn. Sands absorb water about three times as fast as a clay soil.

tr about three times as fast as a clay soil.

Leave the sprinkler on one spot until the water has penetrated to a depth of about 12 inches. Depth of penetration can be determined by pushing a blunt steel rod into the soil. The rod will go into the soil quite easily to a depth of the water penetration.

Watering to a depth of 12 inches will take approximately 1 to 2 hours on a sandy soil and four to five hours on a clay soil. The time will vary according to the application rate of the sprinkler and the dryness of the soil at the beginning of the watering. Check with a rod to be sure of the penetration depth.
