


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

The National Opinion Research Center of the University of Chicago made a survey in order to find out. Supreme Court justices came first, followed by physicians. Then followed state governors, governmental scientists, cabinet members, diplomats and so on down the list.

The Center made a similar study 17 years ago. And it is significant that then, as now, the justices and the physicians held a firm grip on first and second places. But, in the intervening years between the two surveys, most government jobs have slipped. Their image clearly has become tarnished. One can draw his own moral from that.

A question many homemakers have in the summer is "How do you judge ripeness in melons" in selecting melons there is no sure guide for determining ripeness and quality, but some indicators are fairly dependable. In judging cantaloupe, there should be no trace of a stem at the blossom end. If the netting covers the melon thickly and stands out like a whipcord, it is generally glod. Apparent softness at the blossom end is not a sure indication of maturity as repeated pressure from handling will produce this condition. When fully ripe, honeydew melon has a distinct and pleasing fragrance and should be creamy white or pale yellow, even on the underside. It is hard to determine the ripeness of watermelon unless it is plugged. Court Decision Needed on Partisan Legislature Issue

LINCOLN — The courts will be asked to decide whether voters should have an opportunity of balloting this November on the issue of a partisian Legislature. After the secretary of state's office announced that a recent petition drive to place the issue on the general election ballot had fallon short supporting of the

petition drive to place the issue on the general election ballot had fallen short, supporters of the drive confirmed there would be a court test.

The secretary of state's office said those seeking to put the question to a vote garnered 46,303 valid signatures — just 156 sily of the number needed under the law to fulfill the goal of 10 per cent of the total vote for governor in the preceding general election.

A total of 2,499 signatures were disallowed.

Former Gov., Val Peterson, Hastings, who was among those confirming that a court test was in the offing, said some of the technicalities on which some of the 2,499 signatures were invalidated will be challenged.

Inder the appeal procedure

the 2,449 signatures were invalidated will be challenged.
Under the appeal procedure in a case of this kind, the circulators had 10 days in which to fife a writ of mandamus in Lancaster County Distrist Court. The court must put the suit on the docket immediately and rule as soon as possible on the writ. Either side in the suit would then have 10 days during which to carry an appeal to the Nebraska Supreme Court.
Under the statutes, the official notice of amendments proposed by initiative petition must be published by Aug. 3. This means the matter will have to juicated in a matter of days.

The proposal to charge the Unicameral into a partisan body had the official blessing of both the Democratic and Republican parties. Governor Morrison, however, was opposed to the change.
Clarence Davis, a Lincoln at-

cver, was opposed to the change. Clarence Davis, a Lincoln at-tomer, will file the 'friendly' suit in behalf of those who spean-headed the petition drive. Davis said the suit will be filed "not only to clear up the immediate situation, but all future initiative petition drives".

The State Board of Education recently approved a rule which will be ban the broadcasting, televising or photographing of public hearings conducted by the board.

Miller said the board felt it was within its rights in imposing the limitation and added that the attorney general's office had advised the board it had this right. had this right.

Sunday Closing Law

It hardly came as a surprise when the Nebraska Supreme Court declared recently that the Sunday closing law enacted by the 1963 Legislature was uncon-stitutional.

In listing reasons for its decision, the high court labeled the controversial law "discriminatory, arbitrary, unreasonable and unconstitutional."

In a supplementary opinion, Associate Justice Edward Car-ter even questioned whether it was possible to draft a constitu-tional Sunday closing law.

was possible to draft a constitutional Sunday closing law.

He said the "real purpose of the Sunday closing law is not to protect religious worship, or to provide a uniform day of rest, or to provide family unity. Its real purpose is to enlist the power of the state to protect narrow commercial interests, influenced by the fiere competition between the discount store and the downtown merchants."

The majority opinion held, however, that it is within the state's police power to enact valid legislation of this type but noted that it must apply uniformly to illumerchants—with no exceptions.

tions.

The majority opinion said the law before it—LB710—denied the plaintiff the equal protection of the law "and deprives it of its property without due process of the law, all in violation of its rights under the constitution of the state of Nebraska and the 14th amendment of the constitution of the United States."

in holding the law invalid, the-court sustained a Scotts Bluff County district court decision in favor of a Terry Carpenter, Inc. The court said the listing of 65 commodities, which could not be sold on Sunday was, obvious class, legislation. It also described the

laws 'mama-pape to bitrary.

This clause made it possible for small stores, with not more than two full time employees, and one part-time helper, to remain open seven days a week. This part of the law was clearly discriminatory, the Supreme Court said.

Fishing Dispute Resolved
The Nebraska and South Dakota game department officials have finally reached agreement regarding fishing and boating rights in the tail-waters of Gavins Point Dam.

A recent pact calls for Nebraska fishing and boating regulations to be in effect in an area from a cable spanning the tail-waters upstream to the dam proper. When sportsmen use that area, a Nebraska fishing permit will be required—as well as compliance with Nebraska fish and bag regulations.

Be Sure Your Freezer Is Ready
Before you homemakers fill the
food freezer with summer garden
produce, it is a good idea to give
it a thorough defrosting and
cleaning. Here are some helps
to riake your work easier:
Remove all food packages and
disconnect the freezer. Place
packages as compactly as possible, on trays or in baskets that
have been chilled in the freezer.
Cover them with cold blankets or
newspapers.

Strape as much frost as pos-sible from the freezer surfaces.

If the freezer has a drain, run cold water over the refrigerated surfaces and hasten the melting. Hot water should never be used, as refrigerant pressure will build up in the evaporator and cause difficulty in starting the compres-sor. An electric fan placed so it will blow room air into the freezer and cold air out will help melt the ice. Do not chip it off with an ice pick or other sharp tool that might damage the colls.
