

Busy Program Scheduled For Summer Music Camp

Music and Art Camp opens again Sunday at Wayne State College — for the 20th year.

Director Russel Anderson, a moving spirit of the camp since its origin, reported 160 registrations early this week, more coming. Enrollment in art camp, in its third year, shows a gain in full-time students.

The program for both musicians and artists follows the general plan of previous years, and it keeps everybody busy day and night.

An unusual feature comes Friday night at 7:30 when WSC graduate Dr. Frank Gamble and family will present a concert with their recorder instruments. An old instrument recently regaining vogue, the recorder is an end-blown flute, usually made of wood. The Gambles play all the recorders from the high-pitched soprano to the great bass. With a growing repertoire, they have performed frequently in the Northwest. Dr. Gamble is on the University of Vancouver faculty.

The public is invited to join campers at the Gambles' concert in the Administration building auditorium.

The camp band will provide musical starting at 8:30 a. m. for the 9 a. m. college commencement Saturday, Aug. 1. Band, orchestra and chorus will present their traditional concert Sunday, Aug. 2, at 2:30 in Rice auditorium (public invited).

Art campers meanwhile will prepare their own public demonstration for exhibit at Rice Sunday, 11 a. m. to 4 a. m.

The usual Saturday night dance, with music by the camp stage band, will have its highlight when the camp king and queen are crowned.

Doctors Advise on Rabies Procedures

Several cases of rabies in animals have been reported in the Wayne area. Most recent was the case of a call in the Wakefield vicinity. At least one person is undergoing the series of rabies vaccinations as a result of the scare.

Doctors and veterinarians caution residents to first of all stay away from strange animals. If bitten by a domestic animal it should be isolated and observed for a period of at least 10 days. Under no circumstances should the animal be destroyed. A veterinarian should be consulted.

Skunks are the most common carrier of the disease. A natural nocturnal animal, any skunk seen during the day time should be suspected. If killed, care should be taken not to damage the brain. The head should be preserved and a veterinarian contacted immediately.

Haylage Advantage Told by Scientists

There are several advantages to harvesting hay as low moisture silage or haylage (30 to 60 percent moisture). University of Nebraska animal scientist Paul O. Guyer told the feeders Day crowd at the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station.

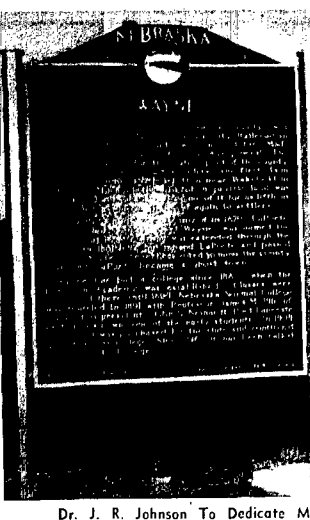
Advantages he cited include:

1. The operation can be highly mechanized from field to bunk.
2. Haylage mixes well with other components to provide a complete roughage ration.
3. Harvest and storage losses should be low.
4. Haylage has a high feed value per pound of dry matter harvested.
5. It can be stored in both stand and lower or air-tight silos.
6. The high investment in silos.
7. The danger of silo obsolescence as a result of new developments.

Some disadvantages he cited are:

1. Walter Tolman, beef nutritionist at the Station, said the protein content of each year's corn crop can apparently affect the amount of protein supplements it is necessary to add to a corn and alfalfa ration.
2. Corn fed last year analyzed over 10 percent protein, he said, and extra protein gave no favorable response.
3. Corn fed this year analyzed about 7 percent protein and the addition of a high protein supplement increased gains.

Yank outlined services available for Nebraskans with sight problems including vocational rehabilitation, home teaching, enterprises and talking book machines.

His job is public relations for his office which includes job placement and formal education, such as the one student currently enrolled at Wayne State College.

Yank has a B.F.A. degree in music from Omaha University. Although he and his wife are both blind, they have a five-year-old daughter with normal vision. He travels alone on public conveyances and "sees" his way to do a great deal of good for the seeing and unseeing.

Callan at Institute Thursday; Morrison Featured Last Week

Wayne State's Election Institute will present its fourth scheduled speaker Thursday, Clair Callan, Democratic candidate for first district congressman.

He will speak twice, at 10:45 a. m. and at 4 p. m., both times in the Student Center south dining room. The public is welcome to attend. Questions from the audience in the afternoon will provide Callan's vehicle of comment.

Between the two appearances, Callan will tape a television interview with members of the social science faculty, for telecast by Station KTVI Sunday afternoon. The time is not certain yet.

Last week's TV interview featuring Gov. Frank Morrison is scheduled for airing at noon (standard time) Saturday.

One more Institute session is possible next week, probably Tuesday, if Congressman Ralph Beermann is able to leave his duties in Congress.

Last Thursday Governor Morrison fielded a host of questions by Wayne State students attending the institute.

Though the questions ranged over all phases of government — federal, state and local — the Democratic candidate for reelection wove two threads of continuity into his answers: one, his favorite theme of pride in improving Nebraska; the other, his belief in broader federal aid, co-operating with state and local governments.

Numerous questions dealt with Nebraska tax structure.

Q. Is the state's property tax unfair to some taxpayers and does it inhibit new industry?

A. Yes, it probably is unfair to some, but not generally burdensome, though the property tax cannot continually be raised. No, the tax structure does not keep new industry out. The tax system is favorable to industry.

Q. What about broadening the tax base?

A. A sales or income tax, under the limits of the Duis Amendment, might do more harm than good because it would relieve only the state property tax, whereas the great need for more funds is at

the local level, to improve education. The state must examine its school structure to find ways to achieve this improvement. Among the ways: better use of school facilities during the three idle months. A sales tax would do no good unless it could be channeled into education.

Questions on education:

Q. How about federal aid?

A. We have it already. Many educational programs would go out of existence without federal aid. The only question is where to expand it.

Q. Do you favor school consolidation? A county level or smaller?

A. Consolidation is advisable, but the people must decide locally the degree of consolidation. There is an optimum size for a school district, depending on conditions. Counties are not necessarily logical divisions for school districts. "I prefer a smaller unit than the county."

Q. How about the problem of adequate roads with school consolidation?

A. A federal road program in

relation to schools is needed.

Q. Do you favor electing the state superintendent of schools (as proposed in a constitutional amendment on the November ballot)?

A. "I don't think it matters much whether he is elected or appointed." However, there is a tendency for people to vote for names rather than qualifications.

Question on the beef industry:

Q. What about limiting imports?

A. At the state level there are several desirable actions: The College of Agriculture can speed its methods of research and reporting on conditions in livestock growing and feeding; closer observations can reveal trends in livestock and retail prices; avenues for selling more meat products can be explored.

The governor reported his requests to Congress and the Department of Agriculture for investigation into the effect of beef imports were denied for lack of funds. He said that while imports influenced domestic beef prices, the effect was exaggerated.

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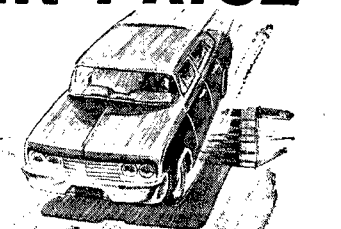
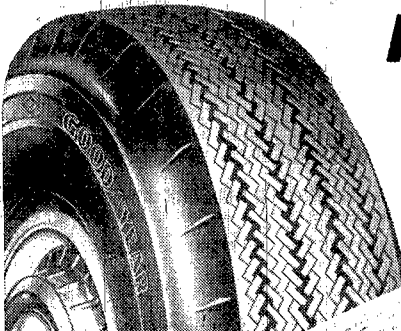


