This does not mean that the nation is going isolationist; it does mean/that there is more and more reasoned doubt that the mere spending of limitless billions will really aid to the strength and influence of this nation abroad, and there is an equally reasoned feeling that the many countries on the receiving end of aid are sitting on their hands and doing very little to help solve their own problems. This attitude certainly applies to aid for military assistance as well as for conomic development and related purposes.

Moreover, the overall aid program seems to have gotten almost completely




