Horse Races to Highlight Afternoon Fair Activities

Afternoon entertainment at the Wayne County fair this year will be provided by horse races, fair secretary Al Bahre announced today. Jerry Ehlberg is in charge of the events.

Entry day will be Thursday, August 13. Persons interested in entering the races are asked to enter at the fair office any time after 1 p.m. on the 13th.

Six races will be held each day, Friday and Saturday. Purses range from \$300 for the two afternoon races. The program will start each day with sheldahl pony races; there will be two pony races at 2:30 and 2:45 p.m. Youngsters five to ten years old will race at 2:30 and children ten to 15 at 2:45. Money will be awarded in amounts of \$5, \$3 and \$2 for the first three places.

Horses will begin at three p.m. Four will be held each day. The \$40 purse will be divided at \$25, \$10, and \$5 for three place winners.

An all-girl race will be held each day with a \$40 purse. A finale race will be held on Saturday, August 15 with a \$50 purse. Winners from the previous five races (Friday and Saturday) but not the girl winners must enter the final race and second place winners may enter if they desire.

Chairman Ehlberg says that he already has contracts from Pierce as well as the immediate Wayne County area and expects two time at terms of racing.

Twelve-Year-Old Saves Three-Year-Old Brother

Danny Roman, 12, is a hero in the eyes of his family, the Gene Romans, Phoenix, Ariz. Last week he saved his three-year-old brother, Joe, from death by drowning.

Ann Roman, 11, discovered her brother Joe floating in the family swimming pool. She was not able to swim, so she summoned her mother. Mrs. Romah also could not swim and could not reach her son. Danny, who was just walking in the driveway after a scouting trip, jumped in and pulled his brother out of the water. It took 15-minutes of mouth to mouth resuscitation before Joe was out of danger.

The Romans lived in Wayne about six years ago and operated Gene's Cafe.

Salaries Increased For City Employees

Tuesday evening the City Council approved salary increases for all city employees, including light, water, street, sewer and auditorium departments. Increases range from \$10 to \$25 per month.

Bids were opened for the sewer district and water main extensions. Apparent low bidder, out of eight bids for the sewer district, was Neely and Askwith, Tilden, for \$30,003.06. Engineer's estimate was \$42,000.00.

Neely and Askwith also submitted the low bid for the water main extension, \$38,438.40. Engineer's estimate was \$53,000. Eleven contractors submitted bids. Contracts will be awarded after further study by the council.

In other business, the council passed a resolution creating 15 minute parking stalls on Main Street near the alley intersections between First and Second and between Third and Fourth. The stalls were created for the convenience of shoppers who want to make a brief stop.

Summer Commencement Saturday; H. Ley, Seniors Will Share Honors

Wayne banker Henry E. Ley and seven seniors will share the honors Saturday at Wayne State's summer commencement.

The ceremonial procession of graduates will start at 9 a.m. heading toward the Willow Grove Art Camp. All seats in the amphitheater are reserved for participants. The band is preparing a pre- commencement concert starting at 8:30.

Ley will receive Wayne State's Distinguished Service Award, the seventh such citation to Wayne graduates or former students who have contributed much to education and public service.

Though Ley did not graduate from WSC (he attended from 1923 to 1923, then graduated from the University of Nebraska), he has maintained a long and close association with the college. In 1948, he continued a family tradition for his father attended the old Nebraska Normal College, and his grandfather was one of the prime movers and an original trustee in that institution.

Wayne State alumni will gather for their annual reunion following commencement Saturday. A 12:30 lunch will be held in the Student Center Birch room, honoring especially the silver anniversary class of 1949. One of the 39-year Dr. Frank Gamble, will entertain with his recorder instruments. Friday night he and his family - wife and three daughters - will play a concert on the Music-Art Camp program.

Agronomist Reports Borers Infesting Area Farms Heavily

"Corn larval infestation in early planted corn is running between 75 and 100 percent this year."

This was the report by Ulverd Alexander, agronomist at the University of Nebraska, Northeast Nebraska Experiment Farm at Concord, last week.

The borer is now in the damaging larva stage of development and at the moment there is nothing that can be done. But the borer larva of the present is in the first brood, and there is another brood to come about which precautions can be taken.

During its lifetime, the borer goes through four stages of development: egg, larva (borer), pupa (resting stage) and moth. The succession of these four stages constitutes a brood.

The eggs of the first brood are laid around the last of May or first of June. The eggs take approximately a month to hatch and will appear in mid-June to early July, depending upon the weather. This is when control measures must be taken. See CORN BORER - Page 2



Callan Concludes Election Institute

Clair Callan, Democratic candidate for first district congressman, last Thursday declared himself favoring federal involvement in agriculture, education, welfare, civil rights and foreign—but with limits.

Addressing the Wayne State College Summer Election Institute, Callan stated a moderate political philosophy perhaps summed up by his comment, "Conservation is not bad unless it becomes obstructionism."

Answering a question about beef industry problems, he opposed import limits—even though imports have hurt cattle prices, he said—because the United States cannot restrict imports while trying to export meat products.

Stricker agriculture needs federal help, Callan said, but on the voluntary basis of farm programs in recent years—voluntary if possible.

Corn Borer —

Should one spray before the majority of the eggs are hatched the control will be little, and should the spraying take place after most of the larvae begun boring, this too will offer little control.

The borer enters from the larva stage to the pupa stage in July and emerges as a moth sometime in July or August (again depending on the weather) and lays its eggs.
This year, the eggs were laid around mid-July, and the larvae should begin to emerge around the 15th of August. What should one do when the larvae begin to emerge?

Spray! For corn to be used for grain only, DDT 10% granules. Corn to be cut for silage only, Sevin or Diazinon granules. The applications for the second brood will have to be made by aerial application because of the height of the corn. Ground applicators are usable for first brood borers.

A good year for corn is also a good year for borers, but this year is an unusual one for the pest. The first brood ran a little ahead of itself, because of the hot weather early this summer, and then laid dormant during the two-week raining spell, putting the second brood slightly behind.

Corn rootworms are a second pest to farmers, but this year corn where treated was very lightly infested. In a recent inspection by the Experiment Farm agronomists, it was noted that in treated areas infestation ran perhaps one or two rootworms to a stalk. However in untreated fields, as high as fifty worms to a stalk was not uncommon.

The treatment referred to here is with organic phosphates. The chlorinated hydrocarbons which used to offer good control have become ineffective because of an immunity built up towards it by the worms.

Organic Phosphates have shown the best results thus far. No chemical or treatment as yet offers 100% control.



Former Resident Prominent Judge, Dies in Missouri

Funeral services for Judge Leslie A. Welch, 74, were held July 17 at Kansas City, Mo. Judge Welch died the previous Wednesday after suffering a heart attack at the Kansas City country club where he had played nine holes of golf.

Leslie A. Welch, son of Judge and Mrs. A. A. Welch, was born in Wayne, and was graduated in 1914 from the University of Nebraska with bachelor of arts and law degrees. He went to Kansas City where he became associated with the law firm of White, Hackney and Lyons, and in 1920 became a partner in the firm of Hackney and Welch.

A Republican Judge Welch worked for the GOP party in Nebraska and Kansas City before his appointment to the probate bench by Gov. Forrest C. Donnell in 1943. In a tribute to Welch July 17, the Kansas City Times reports, "His greatest achievement as probate judge was the general revision of the Missouri probate code in 1955, of which he was principal mover, and on which he spent nearly five years work before it was passed by the Missouri Legislature."

In World War I the judge was an officer in the Army air corps, serving as instructor in balloon and airplane divisions.

Welch was a member of the Kansas City and American Bar Associations and the Lawyers Association of Kansas City. He was a past president of the Missouri Probate Judges Association, and a former chairman of the probate laws revision committee of the Missouri Bar Association.

He was a trustee of the Second Presbyterian church, a Mason, a member of Delta Upsilon, the Kansas City country club, University club, Mercury club, and Sons of the American Revolution. Surviving Judge Welch are his widow, Mrs. Georgia Berkshire Welch; sons, Leslie A. Jr., Kansas City, and G. Berkshire, Darlington, Conn.; a sister, Mrs. Florence Armstrong, Seal Beach, Calif., and three grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a brother, Herbert A. Wayne.

A balanced federal budget is desirable "over the long pull," but balance is not the prime consideration. Deficits may be necessary to stabilize the economy; otherwise there should be some surplus.

"In the South it is a problem of civil rights, but in the North a problem of economic rights."

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. Even then the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Confusing the Confusion

There is little doubt that the attitude of the American people toward foreign aid as now constituted has been changing and hardening. This does not mean that the nation is going isolationist; it does mean that there is more and more reasoned doubt that the mere spending of limitless billions will really add to the strength and influence of this nation abroad, and there is an equally reasoned feeling that the many countries on the receiving end of aid are sitting on their hands and doing very little to help solve their own problems.

This attitude certainly applies to aid for military assistance as well as for economic development and related purposes.

Moreover, the overall aid program seems to have gotten almost completely

out of hand. According to Representative Passman, chairman of the Foreign Operations Subcommittee on Appropriations, 26 federal agencies are now dispensing some type of foreign aid and the total for this fiscal year may exceed \$7 billion, not including interest on borrowed money. He adds: "It is fantastic but true that our government will be dispensing funds during Fiscal 1965 in 99 nations and nine territories. Furthermore, this uncontrolled and apparently uncontrollable program now has 71,416 people, including participants, on its payroll. It has reached such proportions that even the confusion is confused."

Foreign aid — in scope, and dollars — is destined to be a major politico-economic issue in this country — an issue which soars beyond mere partisan considerations.

Capitol News . . .

1965 Legislature to Tackle Reapportionment Problem

LINCOLN — For the third time in three sessions, the 1965 legislature will tackle the explosive problem of reapportionment.

Two sessions ago, the lawmakers fought before they voted to place a proposed constitutional amendment on the ballot providing that 20 to 30 per cent weight could be given to area in redistricting the Unicameral.

After voters gave the proposal a strong majority in the polling places, the legislators implemented the amendment by enacting the redistricting bill of 1963.

Subsequently the U. S. Supreme Court ruled that representation in state legislatures — even those with two houses — had to be based solely on population. Following this guideline, a panel of three federal judges ruled that Nebraska's 1963 redistricting amendment was invalid and that the 1965 lawmakers would have to remedy the situation.

If they don't, the federal panel warned, it would again step into the case. The panel did allow the forthcoming election of state senators to proceed, even though the candidates will be running in districts formed while the lawmakers were implementing an invalid constitutional amendment.

Nebraska Attorney General Clarence Meyer has asked the U. S. Supreme Court for an injunction to stop Iowa from attempting to take title to some lands along the Missouri River for recreational purposes.

W. N. Bump, Iowa solicitor general, says his state is seeking only to block poachers and has no desire to take property from any rightful owner.

Said Bump: "Certain persons have attempted to take possession of this land by merely moving onto it. These are the occurrences that have been challenged by the state of Iowa."

Meyer has charged that members of the Iowa Conservation Commission have suddenly decided to break the 1943 Iowa-Nebraska Boundary Compact upon which citizens of both states have relied. Meyer said certain Iowa officials are trying to take land "which our evidence shows belong rightfully to individual citizens of Nebraska and Iowa."

He estimated more than 15,000 acres, valued at several million dollars, is involved.

Will Seek Repeal

Governor Morrison has served notice that he will ask the next legislature to repeal a 1963 law allowing state political conventions to select delegates to the national conventions of the parties.

Morrison vetoed the bill when it came to his desk for his signature. But the lawmakers passed it despite the veto.

The governor recalled recently that he felt the bill "contravened public policy of effect of the bill." He added that he feels the law takes from the citizens a "direct voice" in the selection of their presidential delegates.

Delegates were selected by the voters prior to passage of the 1963

The State Health Department plans to make some tests in the North Platte River from the Wyoming line to Bridgeport in an effort to determine if chemical waste from a Torrington, Wyo. sugar beet plant is killing fish in the stream.

The tests will be conducted before and following the sugar refining season, which begins late in September.

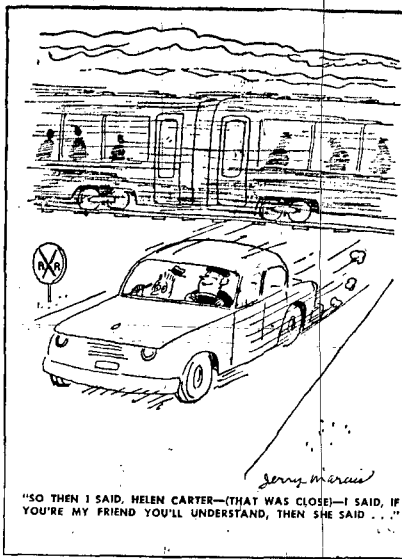

N.E. Extension Notes

County fair dates are cominging closer and closer. Fair exhibitors are upstirring in the minds of many 4-H'ers as they hurry to finish clothing projects. Don't let last minute haste result in a poorer quality garment.

4-H leaders and mothers should encourage girls to take a final critical look at their garments before entering them in the county fair. Here are some things to check:

1. Press the garment well, making sure darts and seams are pressed correctly.
2. Trim thread ends from seams and darts so the inside of the garment is neat.
3. Remove all basting threads. Stay stitching on curved seams need not be removed.
4. Make certain buttons are stitched on neatly, securely, and in the proper position.
5. If the garment has been worn, be sure it is spotlessly clean when exhibited.
6. When entering the exhibit, fasten parts of an outfit together securely. This prevents loss of small items, such as ties, belts, etc.

County fair judges do notice little things which might seem unimportant to 4-H'ers. A careful look at the garment can help 4-H'ers make their best exhibits better.

Perspiration Stains

Perspiration stains that have yellowed and set by aging frequently can be removed by simple methods such as rubbing a detergent into the spot before washing the garment. On washable white or color-fast fabrics, these stains can sometimes be removed with a mild bleach treatment.

One method is to sprinkle sodium perborate, or a powdered bleach containing it, directly on stain. Then dip the stained area in very hot or boiling water. The stain should disappear in a few minutes. Rinse well and launder the garment as usual.

Do not use this method on wool or silk.

Farm Gasoline Tax Refunds

Again this summer the Internal Revenue Service is mailing claim form 2240 to all farmers who filed claims last year. This reminds the farmers that he has 90 days, or until September 30, to file a federal tax refund on gasoline used between July 1, 1963 and June 30, 1964.

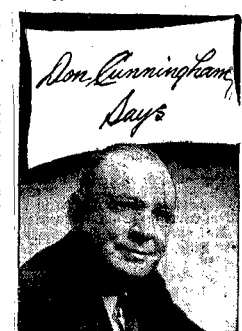
Crossbreeding in Sheep

Crossbreeding is a good practice to produce market lambs from the farm flock of sheep.

In general the most useful cross is dark-face rams and white-face ewes. In Nebraska this could be Shropshire, Hampshire, Suffolk or Oxford rams on white-face western ewes on their order of Corriedale, Columbia, Targhee or smooth Rambouillet ewes.

The breed of dark-faced ram is not so important as the particular ram within the breed. Good size, good muscling, good conformation and good inheritance are essentials to look for in selecting the ram.

The white-face western ewe is selected for the base of the farm flock to be crossed with dark-face rams because of the importance of the wool produced. She will produce good wool as long as she is producing lambs.

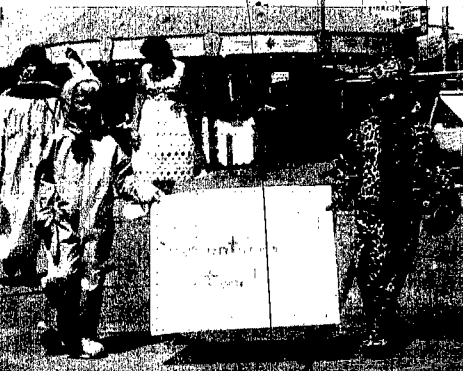

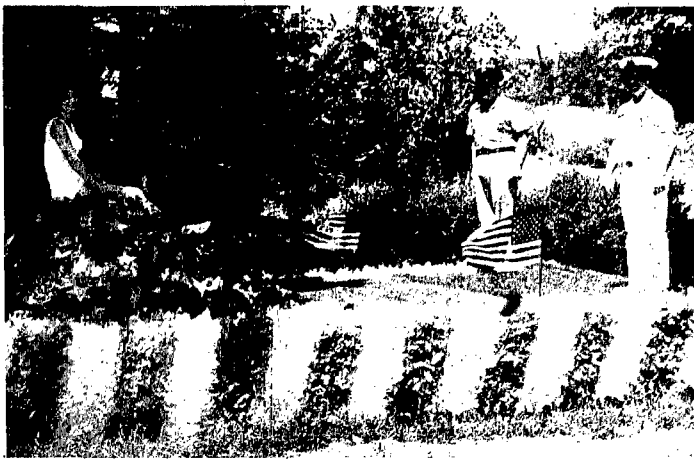
