## Attendance Zones For City Elementary Schools

Superintendent of Wayne City schools, F. R. Haun announced the proposed attendance zones for Wayne elementary schools.

The proposed zone for Northeast grade school (Hahn Campus School) is as follows: pupils east of Lincoln street and north of Seventh street will attend the Northeast school, located on Wayne State College campus. Some changes in assignments will be made in order to equalize class enrollment. Parents involved will be contacted. Transportation to the lunch room in the west elementary building will be furnished by the school district.

A vacancy in the faculty was caused by the resignation of Mrs. Mary Ellen Davis. Mrs. Davis, who resigned because of poor health, was a third grade teacher. Recently hired were JoAnn Hoeck, Ponca, junior high social studies; Ronald Carnes, Bruning, girl's physical education and freshman football and basketball; and Marie Skokan, Wayne, sixth grade.

All Wayne public schools will open Aug. 31. High school will be in session seven periods a day, instead of the usual six. Classes will commence at 8:50 a.m. with dismissal at 4 p.m. Two lunch periods are planned at noon.

Elementary schools will begin at 8:50 a.m. with classes staggered for noon dismissal. Dismissal time will begin at 3:30 p.m. with five minute intervals between classes.

Hot lunch prices will remain \$1.50 for a weekly ticket or 35c per ticket.

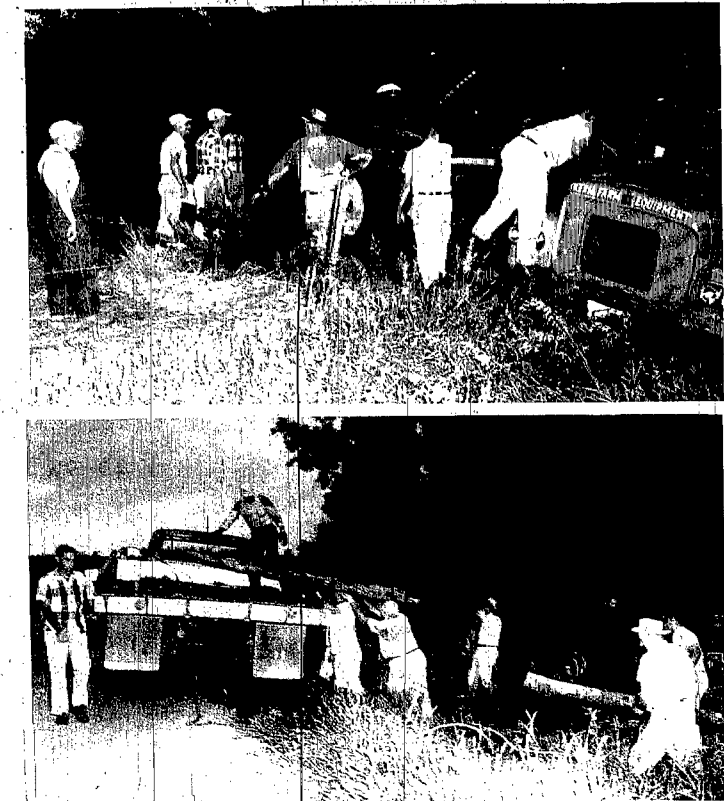
## Workers Needed for Fairgrounds Cleanup

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

This editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is our personal opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial, but if you read the editorial and have serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Revamping Kerr-Mills

A committee of the House has been considering ways and means by which the Kerr-Mills Act — which is the basis of the existing state-federal health program for providing medical aid to the aged and needy — may be revamped to encourage the states to make wider use of it. In the words of an AP report, "This kind of legislation is given a much better chance of going to the House with committee backing than is President Johnson's proposal for social security tax financing of hospital and nursing home benefits."

It places administrative responsibility where it belongs — within the states, and state officials should certainly have a better idea of local problems than a faceless group in far-off Washington. It offers help where help is needed — not just because a person has reached a given age. And, in various instances, the benefits provided are greater than under Medicare.

The changes that may be desirable in Kerr-Mills are a matter of argument. But the principle on which Kerr-Mills is based is the right and workable one.

"Although supporters of federal medical care under social security for the aged were challenged two years ago to find one elderly person needing and seeking hospital care to whom it was denied because of poverty, they have yet to supply the name and address of a single one, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. . . . It suggests that the real issue is not whether the aged are receiving the hospital care they need, but whether the present system of providing care will be replaced by a compulsory federal system."

Types of bacterial spoilage. Three of these types result in physical illness, but are not often fatal. The other type, known as botulism, is fatal to an average of two out of every three individuals affected. Botulism is caused by a poisonous toxin produced by a bacterial organism present in many soils and transmitted to foods in many ways. The organism is not dangerous in itself, but only when allowed to produce the highly poisonous toxin. It has three main characteristics: (1) in spore form, it is more resistant to heat than most other bacteria; (2) it grows best in absence of air, and (3) it develops primarily in low acid types of food such as vegetables, meats, and fish.

Therefore, if a low-acid food is heated enough to destroy most bacteria but not the botulism organism, and then canned or packaged to exclude air, the conditions are ideal for the development of the organism and its poisonous toxin. The development is particularly rapid if the food, once infected, is allowed to remain at a temperature between 50 degrees and 130 degrees Fahrenheit for even a short time.

Home-canned foods, unless properly processed, represent the most serious hazard. Low-acid foods should always be canned in a suitable pressure vessel and for the recommended time pressure.

Since enough heat can destroy the botulism, boiling canned food in a saucepan for at least ten minutes will further reduce the hazard. Canned foods that show any sign of spoilage, as recognized by bulging containers, or by unnatural appearance and odor of the product, should not be tasted nor eaten.

Under the contract the firm will have an exclusive license to use information in the production of certain chemicals which have been observed to stimulate the rate of growth of plants. It marks the first case of advanced payment of royalties to Nebraska under its agreresearch program, established by the 1953 legislature in an effort to find new industrial uses for farm crops.

The \$300,000 will be paid to the state over a three-year period. Other royalties would be paid upon further development of the chemical compound.

The Nebraska Power Review Board will hold a hearing August 19 on the application by the Omaha Public Power District (OPPD) to construct a 200,000-kilowatt turbo-generator unit.

The generator would be the largest ever installed in Nebraska and would be the fifth at OPPD's north Omaha power station. It would be capable of producing 86 percent more electricity than all of OPPD's generating facilities when it was formed in 1946.

OPPD, which proposes to make the unit operational by May 1, 1958, has estimated it would involve a new investment cost of approximately \$1 million.

A warning should be heeded by all who plan to pressure food at home this year so that they can avoid all hazards that may lead to food poisoning.

Although outbreaks of food poisoning are rather rare, they can be extremely discomforting and sometimes tragic. Most food poisoning can be attributed to one of four specific

## Conservation NEWS NOTES

If you really want to conserve your soil and water, you have all it takes to make a start. It's just a matter of letting the right people know you are interested. Call a Wayne County District supervisor on the phone right now and tell him what is on your mind. The names of the supervisors are: W. William Fenske, Bernard Spittiger, Roy Day, Leo Hansen and Paul Evringham.

If it is more convenient, step at the local Soil Conservation Service office in Wayne. Here should be a man named Marr, or technicians in Roy Albertson, Frank Lansing will give you information and volunteer their services. If you haven't worked with the District, why not give it a try. The supervisors will ask you to show your good intentions by signing a simple conservation agreement to work toward the kind of conservation program your land needs. This agreement makes you eligible to receive help from the Federal conservationists of the Soil Conservation Service. These men are assigned to the District by the Federal Government at the request of the District Supervisors.

When your application has been accepted you have joined the most popular conservation fraternity in the world. Already nearly 800 of your friends and neighbors in Wayne County have made this start. Talk conservation with them. Learn how they have benefited. When you have developed a conservation plan along with your conservationist and have applied many of the practices called for in the plan, then you may want to ask your supervisors to help you in requesting planning assistance for a watershed project. Watershed projects are community projects and they need the cooperation of many people. To summarize watershed projects remember that each project is a local undertaking with state and federal help, not a state or federal project with local help. The people living within the watershed area must initiate the

ing. The soil should be worked frequently to get the jump on weeds. When preparing for a new seedbed, remember these points: — Remove all debris from the subsoil; — Shape the lawn for adequate drainage; — It may be necessary to build weeds around trees if the new lawn level is to be higher than the existing level. Trees can be killed by root suffocation when covered deeply by soil. If your lawn cover is 50 percent or more desirable species of grasses, you can usually replant without preparing a new seedbed. Here are the steps in lawn renovation: — Around August 15 get rid of all weeds, undesirable grasses and leaves. Mow the lawn closely, and rake to remove most of the clippings, leaves and other debris. — Rake the lawn vigorously, or cultivate it in such a way that the surface of the soil is loosened. This forms a seedbed for planting. Clods 1/2 to 3/4 inch in diameter are desirable. — Fertilize, lime if necessary, and plant recommended varieties of good quality seed. Soil tests show the plant food needs of the soil. Many lawns in Nebraska can use a combination fertilizer of phosphorus and nitrogen. Pure stands of Kentucky bluegrass make the most desirable lawn for most areas in Nebraska. Coarse grasses such as tall fescue should be avoided in mixtures. When using a mixture of blue grass and red fescue for shady areas, use 75 percent bluegrass and 25 percent fescue. Other hints for maintaining good turf in shady areas include: — Fertilize the grass frequently at light rates; — Remove unnecessary trees; — Prune trees by removing all dead and low branches; — Prune shallow tree roots to prevent nutrient competition; — Deep fertilize trees to keep them from competing with grass for nutrients: Punch holes 2 to 4 feet deep around the trees and add fertilizer to the holes. — If you can't get grass to grow under trees, plant a sturdy

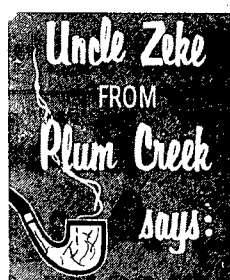

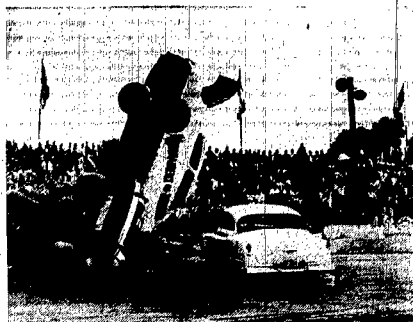
