#### **Payments for Feed** Grains Underway

As of June 30, 1964, total payments made in the county amounted to \$416,561.71 for diverting acreages.

verling acreages.

For feed grains, the chairman explained, a part of the diversion payment was made in advance to produce at the time they signified their intention to participate in the program. This was done as a means of helping them to meet their production expenses. The feed grain payments soon to be made représent the balance of the diversion payments due and the total price-support payments available to growers who took part in the 1964 program.

No advance payments were

No advance payments were made for wheat in 1964. The wheat payments currently being made therefore include the diversion payment for shifting wheat acreage into a conserving use and the value of marketing cetificates earned through participation in the program. Wheat certificates have a value of 70 cests per bushel for the part of, the farm's marketing allocation representing wheat for domestic use and a value of 25 cents per bushel for the wheat for export. 





In the words of an AP report, "This kind of legislation is given a much better hance of going to the House with committee backing than is President Johnson's proposal for social security tax linancing of hospital-and nursing home benefits."

The social security approach — com-monly known as Medicare — simply has fatted to gain substantial public caperersional support. And there is every reason why that should be so. It takes ho account of need or whether the individual wants or doesn't want the benefits. Almost every authority is con-vaged that the official cost estimates

benefits. Almost every authority is con-American that the official cost estimates are ridiculously low. And, above all, it presents the very real danger of governmental, bureauerate domination of the medical arts and institutions. After all, he who pays the piper calls the tune.



Although outbreaks of food poisoning are rather rare, they can
be extremely discomforting and
sometimes tragge.

be extremely discomforting and sometimes tragic. Most food poisoning can be at-tributed to one of four specific



when allowed to produce the highly poissoneus toxin.

It has three main characteristics:

(1) in spore form, it is more resistant to heat than most other bacteria, (2) it grows best in absence of air, and (3) it develops primarily in low air't types of food such as vegetables, meats, and fish.

Therefore, if a lew-acid food is healed enough to destroy most bacteria but not the botalism organism, and then canned or packaged to exclude air, the conditions are ideal for the development of the organism and its pcisonous toxin. The development is particularly rapid if the food, once infected, is allowed to remain at a temperature between 50 degrees and 130 degrees Fahrenheit for even a short time. Home-canned foods, unless properly processed, represent the most serious hazard.

Low-acid foods should always be canned in a suitable pressure

Corn Rootworm Beetles

We have many reports that
corn rootworm beetles are feeding heavily on corn silks.

Robert Roselle, Nebraska Extension Entomologist sends us

There may be need to control adults to protect silks in some fields. The need for adult control can usually be determined by watching the extent of feeding on silks; especially in later silking corn. If there are sufficient beetles to chew the silks to the husks during the period of poller-shed, it probably would be economical to control the beetles. Silks will grow rapidly, so the Silks will grow rapidly, so the key is to control before pollen production is complete, and pre-ferably when pollen is still abund-

ant.

— Remove all debris from the subsoil;

— Shape the lawn for adequate frequently freq

— Remove all debris from the subsoil;
— Shape the lawn for adequate drainage;
— It may be necessary to build wells around reversity in the new lawn level is to be higher than the existing level. Trees can be killed by root suffocation when covered deeply by soil.

If your lawn cover is 50 per cent or more desirable species of grasses, you can usually replant without preparing a new seedbed. Here are the steps in lawn renovation:
— Around August 15 get rid of all weeds, undesirable grasses and leaves. Mow the lawn closs-ly, and rake to remove most of the clippings, leaves and other debris.
— Rake the lawn vigorously, or cultivate it in such a way that the surface of the soil is loesened. This forms a seedbed for planting. Clods ½ to ½ inch in diameter are desirable.
— Fertilize, lime if necessary, and plant recommended varieties of good quality seed. Soil tests show the plant food needs of the soil, Many lawns in Nebraska can use a combination fertilizer of phosphorus and nitrogen.

Pure stands of Kentucky bluegrass make the most desirable lawn for most areas in Nebraska. Coarse grasses such as tall fescue should be avoided in mixtures.

When using a mixture of blue grass, and red fescue for shady areas, use 75 percent bluegrass and 25 percent fescue.

Other hints for maintaining good turf in shady areas include:

— Fertilize the grass frequently at light rates;

— Remove unnecessary trees;

— Prune trees by removing all dead and low branches;

— Drune shallow tree roots to prevent nutrient competition;

— Deep fertilize trees to keep them from competing with grass for nutrients: Punch holes 2 to 4 feet deep around the trees and add fertilizer to the holes.

— If you can't get grass to grow under trees, plant a sturdy
