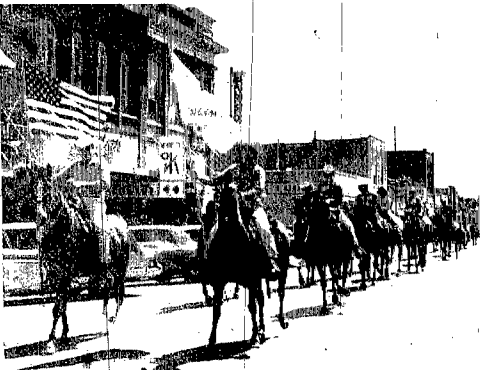

New Facilities Near Complete At Northeast Experiment Farm

CONCORD — "Completion by Christmas" is the goal of workers engaged in construction of the headquarters building at the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station two miles east of here.

The facility is unique in being the future hub of operations in Northeast Nebraska for all off-campus services of the University of Nebraska; agricultural research, agricultural and Home Economics Extension, and off-campus and continuing education courses.

The upper floor of the built brick, steel and masonry building will house area Extension workers serving Northeast Nebraska. The lower floor will include a public meeting and demonstration room 30 by 30 feet in size, equipped with a demonstration kitchen and divided by folding floors.

Visitors will enter the building through a 20 by 20 foot lobby and "chat" room. Also on the first floor will be offices, laboratories and work rooms for research scientists. A clerical staff will be officed with both Extension and research personnel. The facility includes 14 offices, a small conference room and several storage and work rooms.

Walls and ceiling are insulated. Office dividing walls are soundproofed. Floors are tiled, and the roof is of pitch and gravel construction. Very little out-

side painting will be required as the exterior walls are brick, window frames aluminum, and exposed steel is a new rust-resistant material which will not be painted, but will develop its own protective covering and soft brown color as it weathers.

The building is located on a hill at the southwest corner of the Station. An inviting view of the upper floor welcomes the visitor at the Experiment Station as he tops the hill, approaching from the west.

Several large windows afford an unusual panorama of the Station's research facilities and cropland to the north and east. Extensive plantings of trees, shrubs, flowers and lawn are planned to surround the headquarters structure.

The building is made possible, in part, by a grant to the University of Nebraska Foundation by the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Farm Association and C. D. Haskell, Laurel.

Research is conducted by the experiment station on 320 acres of farmland given to the University by Haskell, along with an addition of 150 acres of leased land.

Major research work being carried out is in the areas of beef cattle fattening, soil fertility and crop variety investigations.

At present, a staff of six area Extension agents are occupying temporary quarters in Wayne, awaiting completion of the headquarters.

Dr. Denzil O. Clegg holds the joint responsibility of area Extension supervisor and experiment station superintendent.

Area Extension agents are Don J. Kubik, dairy; Miss Myrtle Anderson, home furnishings and housing; Hugo Zimmerman, farm management; Miss Mary Joan Doyle, foods and health education; and Miss Anna Marie Kreifels, clothing and home management, while Ulverud A. Alexander works in both Extension and research, specializing in soils.

Walter Tolman is in charge of beef research and the experiment station.

The experiment station was opened March 1, 1957, and seven years of beef cattle feeding trials are nearing completion. Its 18-pen, open shed feeding lots have been called "second-to-none" as experimental feeding yards.

They have a uniform south slope, automatic waterers, cable fences and convenient weighing, sorting and loading pens. The shed has fill-up concrete walls and aluminum roof.

One discovery alone from the feeding trials will save Nebraska farmers more than the cost of

A new project this year will be the selling of commercial pens (5 or 6 head per pen). Individual animals will be sold before commercial pens are weighed and appraised.

A packing company representative will make firm bids at weighing following the showing. Business firms and interested individuals will begin bids at the price set by the packing company. Buyers may keep the calves, or the packing company will buy back the calf at the set price.

In addition to 40 individual calves there will be six commercial pens offered for sale.

County NFO Prexy Is Pleased With Holding Action

"Generally, we are pleased with the cooperation of the Wayne County farmers." This was the statement of Laurence J. Hansen, Wayne county president of the National Farmers Organization in referring to the group's livestock holding action.

Hansen said that county members are checking to see who is shipping livestock among the county farmers. He said that he felt the action which was started last Wednesday has been successful so far; and that a check of the Wayne and Norfolk auctions showed a decline in trading.

Hansen said that he and other county members are disturbed at the report of violence in some areas. He urged all NFO members to refrain from any violent action as it not only was illegal and dangerous, but also could do nothing but hurt the organization's efforts.

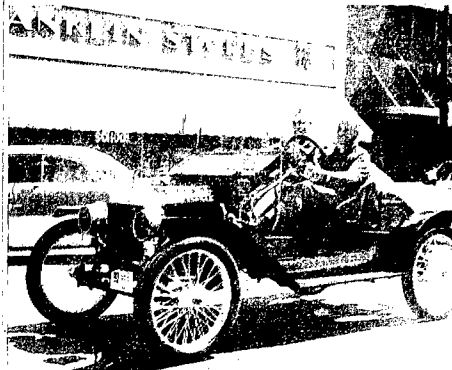

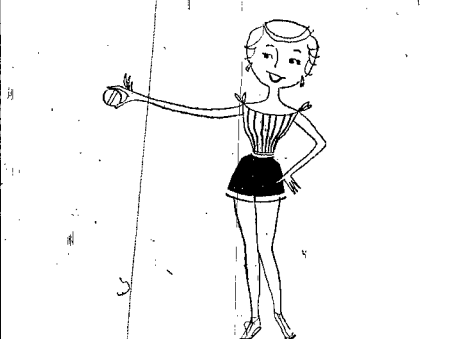

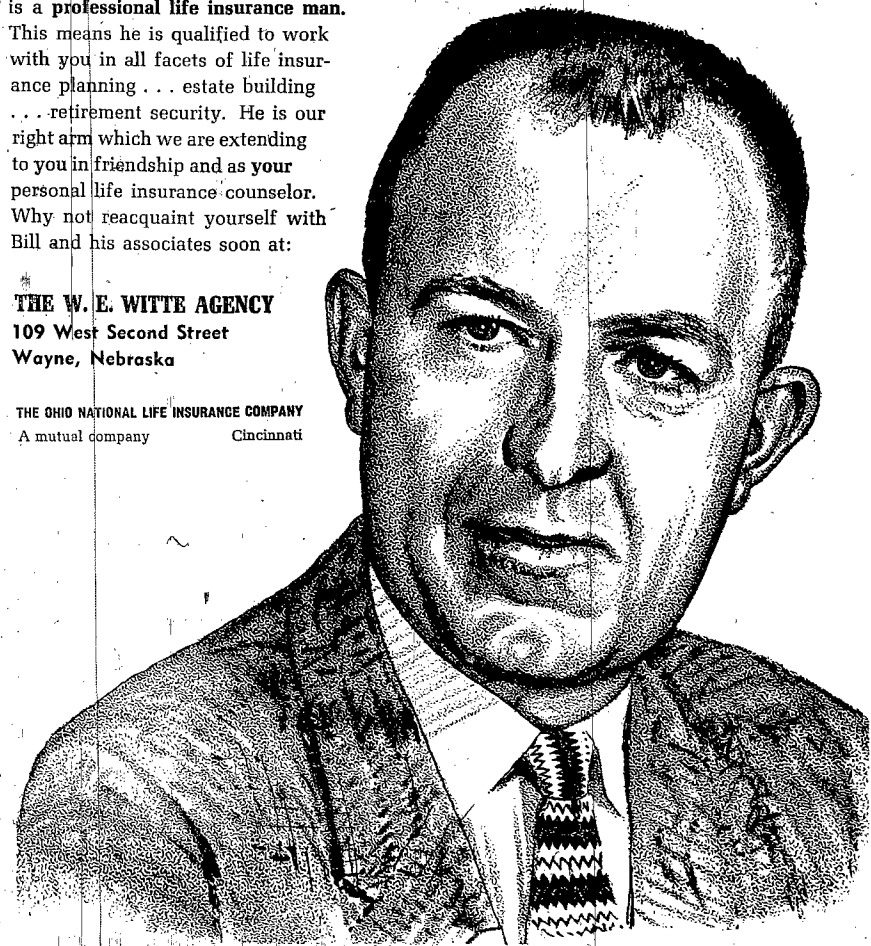
