

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



They will also be asked to come up with recommendations for safety legislation and institute in the schools — as part of the curriculum — an adequate safety program.

When selecting a pattern to use with stretch fabric, choose the same size you would purchase for non-stretch fabric. Stretch, pants of action or lengthwise stretch fabric usually have a strap under the foot to maintain the slim trim look. Some special patterns are available for use with lengthwise stretch. Sewing stretch fabrics is basically the same as sewing with any similar non-stretch fabric.



The following hints might help you when you sew your first stretch garment:
... Allow the fabric to relax twenty-four hours after it has been taken from the boil.
... Avoid stretching the fabric, even slightly, during the cutting process. Use a sharp shears.

... Avoid stretching the fabric, even slightly, during the cutting process. Use a sharp shears.
... Use a sewing machine needle which is smaller than recommended for non-stretch fabric of comparable weight.
... For maximum give and minimum seam breakage, use nylon thread.
... Use a slightly looser tension, but be sure it is perfectly balanced. Test stitch on a double layer of stretch fabric scrap.
... Use 14 to 16 machine stitches per inch.
... Strive for a neat, easy fit—not a tight fit.
... Use interfacing in the same sections as on a non-stretch garment.
... Use a small piece of iron-on-interfacing to stabilize buttonhole areas.
... If linings or underlinings are used, they should be of stretch fabric or the advantage of the stretch of the outer fabric will be lost.

Changes Proposed Revision of federal beef grad-

ing requirements proposed by the U.S. Department of Agri-culture recently may influence Nebraska's beef feeding and

Nebraska's beef seeding and marketing patterns.
Currently, beef carcass maturity is divided into three age categories. The proposed change would reduce age groups to two categories with the division between the two being animals from approximately 28 to 31 months old.

The USDA also mtends to adjust marbling requirements in beef.

These moves will have several basic marketing implications for Nebraska feeders. For one thing, cattle can be marketed at lighter weights and younger ages and still make the "choice" grade.

Taking a look at the total marketing picture, the proposed dhanges will mean that more younger, lighter cattle can be marketed.

Under the proposed grading system, feeders would need to shorten the feeding period and increase the turnquer rate.

Selling lighter weight, younger cattle will reduce cost of gains compared to animals fed to the current "choice" grade.

A soil-saver structure installation and tree removal equipment demonstration day will be held September 3 at the University of Nebraska agricultural field laboratory at Mead.

"Later in the morning and throughout the afternoon, contractors can see the latest equipment available for use in tree removal and land clearing" according to John Nueberger, University Extension-sgriculaural engineer.

Feed Acounts
Ohio State University agricultural economists in a study of 67 hog farms in West Central Ohio found 68 per cent of producing 100 pounds of hog went for feed. Other costs were divided as follows: Labor, 11 percent; tractor, buildings, equipment and fences, 10 per cent; veterinary fees and medicine, 4 per cent; and 9 percent for miscellaneous items. The one-third of the farmers in the lowest cost range produced 100 pounds of hogs with 39 percent less feed than the third of the farmers in the highest cost range.






