Let's Have a Safe Labor Day

Labor Day is a youthful institution, as national holidays go. But its place in the national life is secure and honored. It provides a formal and well-earned salute to all working people, within and without the unions. And this is a tribute that goesheyond the changing problems and controversies that have to do with latior legislation and labor's rights and privileges.

Too, Labor Day has another special characteristic. It gives most of us a three-day holiday in this age of the five-day work week. The tragic part of it all is that the vast majority of these and other accidents are totally unnecessary. They don't just happen — careless, thoughtless and uninformed human beings make them happen. If all of us this coming Labor Day period, would, use just rudimentary caution wherever we go and whatever we do, the expected accident toll would be reduced spectacularly. How about it?

Several Suggestions Made

To Change Livestock Taxing

IdNOOLN—Representatives of yarious farm organizations took a generally neutral stance recently, on ways to change the system of livestock taxation in Nebraska, They appeared before a legislative council livestock taxation subcommittee headed by Sen. Julies Burbach, Grofton. He said the flugges to determine whether they greent advalorem tax system is the best for assessing livestock.

the presents advalorem tax system is the first for assessing livestock.

The ad valorem tax remains in offect, although the 1961 legislature changed the method so that the tax is based on the averlage market price at Omaha for the previous year — rather than the market value as of Jan. 1. However, livestock owners still say laxes on the stock they had on hand Jan. 1 no matter how, their numbers fluctuated during the previous year.

During the hearing, Sen. Terry Carpenter of Scottshluff proposed that farmers and ranchers be given the same legal break which other businessmen have—lump sum, self-determined declarations of inventory." At the present time, farmers must itemize various pieces of machinery, all of which have fived values.

all of which have fixed vatues, and livestock.

The president of the Nebraska Farmers Union, Elton Berck. Said his organization is opposed to the average inventory system because it creates more problems than it solves. He termed as "grossly unfair" a system under which the values of used farm equipment can rise constantly.

E. H. Shoemaker, North Platte, vice president of the Nebraska Stockgrowers Association, came to the support of the advalorem system and added that his organization believes "very strong-ley the present basis for valuation is fair."

In other action, the council's subcommittee on tax enforcement announced a series of hearings will be held soon to determine if big business is complying with tax statutes.

Heading this subcommittee is Carpenter. He challenged the Douglas-County Medical Association to determine if 444 Omaha doctors should be childed publicity for failure to submit their business financial records.

Public hearings will be arranged by Carpenter on all wholesale liquor distributors in Douglas County all major-off-companies operating in Nebraska, all in-

Representatives of the various businesses will be asked to explain, in detail their latest tax records, capital worth, and other financial information. Carpenter said the subcommittee, on the basis of data supplied, will then work but its recommendations for the 1965 legislature.

Nebraska has 2.500 school districts without a high school. Under state law, youngsters living in such districts may enter any, public high school accepting them. Under this arrangement the student does not have to pay tuition but his home district must underwrite a special property tax levy for support of the free high school subino fund. High schools which accept the non-residents are paid \$15 per pupil per week from the fund. This means a high school accepting a non-resident student is paid about \$540 for leach student; which is usually more than what it costs the district to educate the non-resident.
