## To Dedicate New Buildings At Experiment Farm Sept. 11

CONCORD: The new headquarters building at the Northeast Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station will be dedicated here Sept. 11 in ceremonies open to the public.

The announcement came today from Richard E. Atkins of Osmond, president of the University of Nebraska Board of Regents, and Honor Delmer of Madison, president of the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Farm Association.

The dedication will be held at 1:30 p.m. at the Station, two miles east of Concord. Earlier in the day, the Board of Regents will hold a regular business meeting, followed by a joint meeting at 11 a.m. with the Northeast Association board of directors.

The two-story, brick structure, located at the southwest corner of the Station, will house offices and laboratories for Experiment Station personnel as well as University specialists from the Northeast Nebraska Area Extension of free, now located at Wayne. Also included in the new building, scheduled for completion and occupancy by Christmas, are public meeting and demonstration rooms, a conference room, and several storage and work rooms.

The headquarters will become the hub of operations in northeast Nebraska for all off-campus services of the University, including agricultural research, agricultural and Home Economics Extension and off-campus and continuing education courses.

Construction of the building is being made possible in part through a grant to the University of Nebraska Foundation by the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Farm Association and C. D. Haskell of Laurel. Mr. Haskell donated the original 320 acres of land to the University for use as an agricultural experiment station.

Atkins urged all residents of northeast Nebraska and other interested Nebraskans to attend the dedication.

Visitors may view experimental plots, farm demonstrations, machinery, special equipment and chrysanthemums while at the Station, according to Dr. Denzil Clegg, station superintendent and area extension supervisor. One experimental group of cattle may be observed in the open shed-feeding lots, Clegg added.

## Expect Enrollment Increase; Senators to Address Faculty

Wayne State College is preparing to welcome next week a student body stably increased over last year's 1,799.

Freshmen and new students will arrive Monday, but the faculty will gather Saturday for their first official duties. On the faculty program, State Senators Richard Marvel and Marvin Stromer are scheduled to speak. Senator Marvel will discuss problems facing the 1965 Legislature, and Senator Stromer will talk about co-ordination of higher education in Nebraska.

An indication of enrollment prospects may be found in the advance registration of freshmen and new students — 27 per cent higher than one year ago. All dormitory spaces have been assigned, and there is a waiting list for all six halls.

For the first time Wayne State will limit enrollment of non-Nebraska residents. In general, out-of-staters must have finished in the upper half of their high school graduating class and have scored above the fifteenth percentile on college aptitude tests. This applies only to new students.

First major event, aside from getting settled, for new students will be a student-parent convocation Monday afternoon. Registration for day classes will take place Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Classes convene Friday, the 11th.

Thirty-five courses are being offered at night, with registration on the first night of each class from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m., starting Sept. 14.

Returning students will find 21 new faculty members, and three construction projects will be much further advanced since the students were here last.

## \$54,000 Available For Wayne Staters

A federal grant of \$54,000 will be available for loans to Wayne State College students in the coming year.

To use this sum, all of it from gifts by individuals, companies or foundations. Altogether, WSC will have \$70,353 for loans this year, including a cash balance from past years.

A report on Wayne's experience with the National Defense Student Loan program showed today that 371 borrowers have benefited by the loans since 1959. They have received \$269,775 (not counting the 1964-65 sum available).

Dr. Orvid Owens, co-ordinator of the program, said \$322,772.44 of the loans is outstanding, and \$18,466.60 has been repaid. The balance due will come in over a period of years after the borrowers leave college. And part of the balance will be canceled for borrowers who go into public school teaching — 10 per cent a year up to five years. To date, \$18,846 has been canceled.

Dr. Owens noted that only \$412 in payments are past due, an insignificant fraction of the total loaned.

## Westerhaus' Named SCS Honor Family

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally, it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

## Let's Have a Safe Labor Day

Labor Day is a youthful institution, as national holidays go. But its place in the national life is secure and honored. It provides a formal and well-earned salute to all working people, within and without the unions. And this is a tribute that goes beyond the changing problems and controversies that have to do with labor legislation and labor's rights and privileges.

Too, Labor Day has another special characteristic. It gives most of us a three-day holiday in this age of the five-day work week. And millions of people take advantage of it to journey in search of new sights and scenes, or to go again to favored vacation spots. Labor Day has become a day of fun, relaxation and sports.

Unhappily, however, that bright prospect is not realized for an appalling large number of us. They are the victims of Labor Day's toll of death and injuries. The mishandled automobile becomes a killer of almost warlike dimensions. The toll of drownings steadily mounts and ignorance or disregard of the rules and precautions that are essential to safe boating are big factors in this.

The tragic part of it all is that the vast majority of these and other accidents are totally unnecessary. They don't just happen — careless, thoughtless and uninformed human beings make them happen. If all of us this coming Labor Day period would use just rudimentary caution wherever we go and whatever we do, the expected accident toll would be reduced spectacularly. How about it?

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## Don't Blame the Automobile

The Public Health Service reports that for the first four months of 1964 the automobile accident death rate was 13 per cent higher than for the same period in 1963.

The marvel is that the death rate isn't higher than that when you see the total lack of courtesy and respect for others shown by drivers on public highways. Too many of them think (or don't think) as they sit behind the wheel of a car with a 200 to 350 horsepower engine that they own the road. They pay no attention to speed laws, they ignore the simplest driving rules, and they seem to think that it will always be the other fellow who will be hurt, instead of themselves, when they cause accidents.

You read in the newspapers of one-car accidents. The polite phrase is used, "the car went out of control." That really means the driver couldn't handle his racing machine at the speed he was driving when a curve, a tree or a power pole failed to get out of his way.

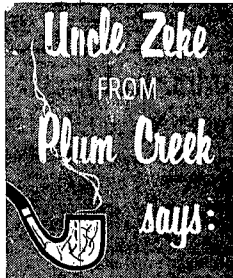
The boy is a natural spectator. He watches parades, fires, fights, ball games, automobiles, boats, and airplanes with equal fervor, but will not watch the clock.

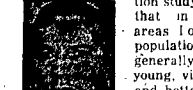

## Capitol News Several Suggestions Made To Change Livestock Taxing

LINCOLN — Representatives of various farm organizations took a generally neutral stance recently on ways to change the system of livestock taxation in Nebraska.

They appeared before a legislative council livestock taxation subcommittee headed by Sen. Jules Burbach, Grofton. He said he hopes to determine whether the present ad valorem tax system is the best for assessing livestock.

The ad valorem tax remains in effect, although the 1961 legislature changed the method so that the tax is based on the average market price at Omaha for the previous year — rather than the market value as of Jan. 1. However, livestock owners still pay taxes on the stock they had on hand Jan. 1 no matter how their numbers fluctuated during the previous year.

During the hearing, Sen. Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff proposed that farmers and ranchers be given the same legal break which other businessmen have, "lump sum, self-determined declarations of inventory." At the present time, farmers must itemize various pieces of machinery, all of which have fixed values, and livestock.

The president of the Nebraska Farmers Union, Elton Berck, said his organization is opposed to the average inventory system because it creates more problems than it solves. He termed as "grossly unfair" a system under which the values of used farm equipment can rise constantly.

E. H. Shoemaker, North Platte, vice president of the Nebraska Stockgrowers Association, came to the support of the ad valorem system and added that his organization believes "very strongly the present basis for valuation is fair."

Other suggestions were that the subcommittee study: The possibility of shifting the livestock assessment date from January to sometime in the spring.

The feasibility of taxing on the basis of an average yearly inventory of animals and their value rather than the number of head on hand on assessment date.

The possibility of taxing livestock through a production tax.

In other action, the council's subcommittee on tax enforcement announced a series of hearings will be held soon to determine if big business is complying with tax statutes.

Heading this subcommittee is Carpenter. He challenged the Douglas County Medical Association to determine if 444 Omaha doctors should be chided publicly for failure to submit their business financial records.

Public hearings will be arranged by Carpenter on all wholesale liquor distributors in Douglas County all major companies operating in Nebraska, all in-

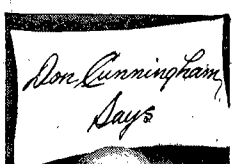
state. He explained he would not have time to conduct an adequate campaign, nor to devote the full time required in a 1965 legislative session. He also said his personal circumstances have changed greatly since his filing for re-election in February, 1964.

McGinley's place on the ballot will be taken by C. N. Clemens, Bridgeport. Also on the ballot will be Ramey Whitney, Chapell, who finished first in last spring's primary.

**Anti-Smoking Campaign**  
Sally Wilson, Lincoln, has been named to coordinate the state's program aimed at discouraging teenagers from smoking. Her appointment was announced recently by the Nebraska Health Department.

Miss Wilson will work with a special three-member state health board committee in studying legal possibilities to discourage young persons from taking up the smoking habit. The program will center around the idea that smoking is a serious health hazard.

Members of the health board committee are Dr. A. R. Sofko, Omaha; Dr. Louis W. Gilbert, Lincoln; and Charles F. Fowler, Lincoln.

**Take a Second Look**  
Suddenly we find that summer is gone. If you went on a vacation maybe you've discovered that the best thing about going away is getting back home. Now is the time to take a second look at your homes.

It's pretty easy to live in a house day after day without really seeing the rooms for what they are. It's well to look at your home every once in a while, with the scrutiny of a stranger.

You may be aware for the first time that colors are faded, upholstery is a bit dingy and springs are sagging.

As you inspect your home and its furnishings decide if they're comfortable and attractive. Articles that fall such a test should have their days numbered.

Mentally group your furniture into three categories: (1) furniture still doing a very good job for which it's intended. (2) items that will have to do because of the budget. (3) articles that are to be replaced as soon as possible.

If the appearance of your home comes as a shock, give it that sparkle that would impress even a stranger.

**Color Does Wonders**  
Color can do wonders to make a problem room more pleasing or give furniture new life. Color can make things appear more important or fade into the background. For example, a room with many doors and windows will seem less chopped up if the woodwork is painted the same color as the wall. Furniture painted the same color as the walls also seems to fade into the background. Poorly placed or odd-shaped windows can be camouflaged with draperies on the wall.

Contrast of dark and light is the key. An interesting or unusual piece of furniture can be turned into an attention-getter by placing it against a dark background if it is light, or against a light background if it is dark. Contrast helps to make small pieces appear more prominent. To de-emphasize an unattractive piece of furniture, slipcover or finish it in a color that blends with the background.
