The biggest traffic hazard on the highway today is the large number of refrigerated trucks that are desperately trying to haul meat out of storage fast enough to keep meat in the grotery counters. Watch your own highways and you will see that this is true. One NFO leader reported seeing 36 refrigerated meat trucks going by one intersection in 80 minutes. The NFO is over a large enough area now that the shipment of livestock has been so drastically reduced that the supply of meat that is not seen in the meat counter is getting razor thin.

been so drastically reduced that the supply of mean seem in the meat counter is getting razor thin.

Those opposing NFO's efforts are using every psychological effort they can muster to try and break the Holding Action now. They are spending great sums of money to shuffle livestock from market to market to try to make receipts appear normal. Receipt figures that are being given out are ridiculous and any farmer watching the movement of refrigerated trycks and the type of trucks hauling livestock knows this himself.

NEO has farmers counting the livestock received at many many former many

NFO has farmers counting the livestock received at many markets. These farmers report that receipts have drastically drapped almost every day. Since the NFO is over such a large area it would be impossible to report every count that has been turned in, but a summary of the count taken by farmers in several areas follow. For example: In lowa, 94 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 24,840 hogs, yesterday received 10,915. In Illinois, thirteen buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 3,779, yesterday received, 2.248. In a large area of Minnesota with estimated normal receipts for points reporting 10,000 hogs yesterday, received 4;578. In Indiana, 23 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 5,000 yesterday received 2,479. In Missouri, 13 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 1,200 cattle yesterday received 289. These same 13 stations normally received 4,300 hogs but they only received 1,837 yesterday, In another area in Missouri, 15 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 2,150 hogs yesterday received 22. In Colorado, a large packing plant only killed 850 head of cattle and 700 of these cattle came from one feedlot. Reports from Kentucky, Wisconsin, Kansas Ohio, New Jersey, New York, South Dakota show cuts of 30 to 50 per cent. Lapeer County, Michigan Auction had one sick cow, 2 calves and one goat. NFO members bought the goat, put a sign on it "we've been the goat long enough," and led it through town.

A. G. Meat Merchandising Company, Springfield, Missouri, sent a letter to stores in their area stating in part, "BEEF MAR-KET—Because of the NFO Holding Action, the Beef Market has advanced sharply. How long this condition will exist is unpredictable. PORK-PRICES: Short supply and high prices is the picture here. CALVES, VEAL and LAMB—calf market is much higher with the quality not too desirable. This is just one of the many indications that the meat supply is getting short.

It is evident that those opposing NFO's efforts and wanting to keep farmers prices low are getting desperate. They must convince farmers that the holding action is having no effect very quickly as they are going to run out of meat in a lot of areas. It is a safe prediction that receipts will still appear normal when they run out of meat. The holding action is so tight that many, markets are going to be open on Monday, Labor Day, that normally would have been closed. The battle lines are clearly drawn. The group opposing our efforts have practically run out of the production they control. The rest of the production is now largely in the highly of true farmers. 



Nebraska public school special education programs continued their growth during the last school year. State, Education Commissioner Floyd Miller said.

The State Education Department paid some \$546,000 in excess cost reimbursements to the schools for programs serving 6,955 exceptional children, Miller said this amounted to 72 per cent of the excess cost approved for each local school district. He added: "Had the state appropriation been large enough to have reimbursed the local districts fully, they would have received over \$750,000 in state aid." The 72 per cent reimbursement was the largest amount of financial aid ever approved by the education department, Miller noted.

Services were provided in 149 programs in 94 school districts employing 218 special education teachers and therapists.

Don Sherrill, director of special education, said applications for new-programs for this school year have shown a sharp increase. All indications point to a record increase in the special education services, he said.

Irrigators getting water directly from storage reservoirs were not affected.



Grasses, such as Kentucky

An autumn seeding escapes the worst weed competition. There are other favorable factors, too—warm soil that speeds up sprouting; gentle, penetrating rains most years; less drying out of the seedbed because the days are shorter and cooler than in summer.

It's hard to miss in getting a good stand of grass, if you seed your lawn in autumn when Kentucky bluegrass is at its best.

Prevent Wood Decay

Home owners can do a lot to revent decay of wood that is in direct contact with the ground and gets wet frequently. Steps, porches, wood rails, gates and lawn furniture are examples of trouble spots. Selecting the proper wood and following a definite maintenance schedule can prevent decay.

Some lumber — like the heartwood from redwood and cedar — is naturally decay resistant. Pines and firs, on the other hand, are not naturally resistant to decay —, but these woods can be improved by treatment with water repellent wood preservatives. Five percent pentachlorophenal solution is commonly used. There are two steps of penta solutions available. One type has a highly refined petroleum base that allows you to paint over it once it is completely dry. The other type has a more oily base and is not suitable for use under paint.

It is a good idea to treat the moderately decay re si st an twoods — firs and pines — diring the construction process. Soak the entire piece of lumber in the penta solution for about 10 minutes. If this isn't possible, soak the ends in the penta solution and byush the other surfaces with the wood preservative.

Also flood the bolt holes and joints with penta solution. Moisture often collects in these spots and causes early rotting.

Does Education Pay?

People, among them cult youth, are most important hatural resources. This ough education, training and planning, this natural resource is transferred into goods, services, and income.

Statistics help to tell the story and answer the question, "Does education pay?" Education does pay. The average income, for a person completing less than 8th 'grade is \$160,000 during his life-time or \$3,400 annually. Completing the 8th grade raises the average income figure to \$4,700 per year. The average high school graduate has an annual income of \$6,100. For the college graduate the figure climbs to \$9,500 annually or \$447,000 during his lifetime. For the person completing technical training following high school, the figures would be comparable.

But what are the costs of education? 4 1956 study estimated.

ing following high school, the figures would be comparable. But what are the costs of education? A 1956 study estimated the cost of one year of elementary schooling at \$300. High school was estimated at \$1,400 per year, with a year of college at \$3,300. These figures are obviously less than present costs of education. These estimates were based on both the private cost to the individual or his parents and the public cost paid through taxes.

Professor T. W. Schultz of the University of Chicago figured the percentage rate of returns on education investments. For a dollar spent on education, there is about It per year return—17% return on investment. This is an average figure for all schooling. There is a higher rate of return in the stages of early education than at the later stage. This is partially because the costs of education are higher at the later stages. Compared with the 17% average return, elementary schooling returns 30% high school returns 14%, and college returns 12% each year for each dollar invested.



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


