## NU Agronomist Advises On Fall Alfalfa Seeding

Now is the desirable time for seeding alfalfa, according to J. C. Swinbank, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist.

And for more profitable production of alfalfa, he suggests that farmers follow these steps:

Start with quality seed. Use certified seed of recommended varieties as the first step in the profitable production of any crop.

Determine soil quality. The production of big yields of quality alfalfa depends on a generous supply of nutrient minerals in the soil. Tests on soil samples can tell you whether or not it will pay to apply lime, phosphate, potassium or sulfur.

Assure quality stands. Plant on clean ground that is well supplied with essential nutrients. Prepare the seedbed well in advance of seeding.

## Standard Tests Are Goal for Insecticides

Agreement on standard insecticide tests and the determination of safe and practical tolerances was set as a goal for the U. S. Department of Agriculture in co-operation with other government agencies in the conference report on the agriculture appropriations bill sent to the White House in August.

"It is to be noted," said the report, "that it is within these areas where there must be agreement if our food supply is not to be needlessly jeopardized."

Budget estimates for pesticide research totaled \$29 million. A substantial portion of the items involved was agreed to in conference for a total of \$25.5 million. Of this, \$17.4 million was earmarked for research activities and \$8.1 million for facilities.

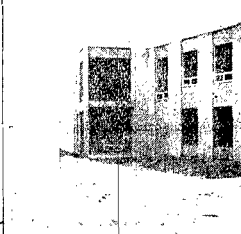

# Registration Begins at WSC; New Faculty, Staff Named

Wayne State returned to activity this week with indications that enrollment will soar well above last year's record number.

The total registration will not be known for some time, but advance reservations indicated a sizeable gain, and the largest crowd of new students and parents in history attended the opening-day convocation Monday.

The registration process, too, suggests growth. It was being done in Rice auditorium, having outgrown the old gymnasium.

New construction also indicates growth, with the new Fine Arts Center, additions to the Rice building and the heating plant, and renovation of Connell Hall to create 13 new classrooms.

The faculty has numerous changes, including the chairmanship of three divisions. Russel Anderson stepped down from leadership of the division of fine arts after 20 years in order—at his request—to devote full time to teaching. His successor, Dr. Raymond Kelton, band director since 1960.

Dr. Dale Johansen, who has been assistant to the dean of administration, will chair the business division on an interim basis. Dr. Lyle Skov, Hahn School director for two years and former English professor, will be acting chairman of the division of languages.

The faculty has 22 new members this fall, and there are eight graduate assistants.

One other, Jimmy Hummel, began his duties as director of admissions in July. He has bachelor's and master's degrees from Wayne State.

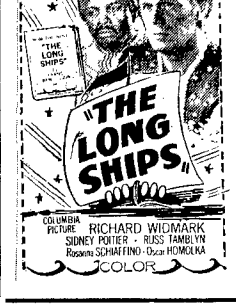

## NEWS FLASH!

### - NFO ALL-OUT HOLDING ACTION -

The biggest traffic hazard on the highway today is the large number of refrigerated trucks that are desperately trying to haul meat out of storage fast enough to keep meat in the grocery counters. Watch your own highways and you will see that this is true. One NFO leader reported seeing 36 refrigerated meat trucks going in one intersection in 90 minutes. The NFO is over a large enough area now that the shipment of livestock has been so drastically reduced that the supply of meat that is not seen in the meat counter is getting razor thin.

Those opposing NFO's efforts are using every psychological effort they can muster to try and break the Holding Action now. They are spending great sums of money to shuffle livestock from market to market to try to make receipts appear normal. Receipt figures that are being given out are ridiculous and any farmer watching the movement of refrigerated trucks and the type of trucks hauling livestock knows this himself.

NFO has farmers counting the livestock received at many markets. These farmers report that receipts have drastically dropped almost every day. Since the NFO is over such a large area it would be impossible to report every count that has been turned in, but a summary of the count taken by farmers in several areas follow. For example: In Iowa, 94 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 24,840 hogs, yesterday received 10,915. In Illinois, thirteen buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 3,779, yesterday received, 2,248. In a large area of Minnesota with estimated normal receipts for points reporting 10,000 hogs yesterday, received 4,578. In Indiana, 23 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 5,000 yesterday received 2,479. In Missouri, 13 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 1,200 cattle yesterday received 289. These same 13 stations normally receive 4,300 hogs but they only received 1,837 yesterday. In another area in Missouri, 15 buying stations with estimated normal receipts of 2,150 hogs yesterday received 52. In Colorado, a large packing plant only killed 850 head of cattle and 700 of these cattle came from one feedlot. Reports from Kentucky, Wisconsin, Kansas, Ohio, New Jersey, New York, South Dakota show cuts of 30 to 50 per cent. Lapeer County, Michigan Auction had one sick cow, 2 calves and one goat. NFO members bought the goat, put a sign on it "we've been the goat long enough," and led it through town.

A. G. Meat Merchandising Company, Springfield, Missouri, sent a letter to stores in their area stating in part, "BEEF MARKET—Because of the NFO Holding Action, the Beef Market has advanced sharply. How long this condition will exist is unpredictable. PORK PRICES: Short supply and high prices is the picture here. CALVES, VEAL and LAMB—calf market is much higher with the quality not too desirable. This is just one of the many indications that the meat supply is getting short.

It is evident that those opposing NFO's efforts and wanting to keep farmers' prices low are getting desperate. They must convince farmers that the holding action is having no effect very quickly as they are going to run out of meat in a lot of areas. It is a safe prediction that receipts will still appear normal when they run out of meat. The holding action is so tight that many markets are going to be open on Monday, Labor Day, that normally would have been closed. The battle lines are clearly drawn. The group opposing our efforts have practically run out of the production they control. The rest of the production is now largely in the hands of true farmers. 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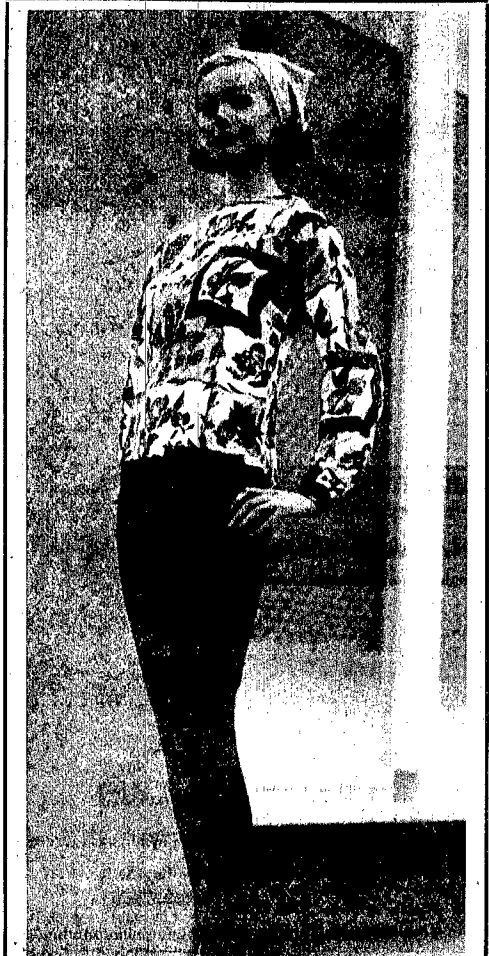

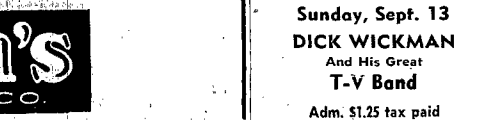

Government investigations of an industry may serve a useful purpose — if, that is, they honestly search out the facts without allowing political considerations to warp and discolor them. And that is a big "if," indeed.

that last year a typical family spent \$1,078 on food. If the profits earned in processing and manufacturing had been entirely eliminated, it would have spent \$1,038 — or a saving of only \$40. All the rest of the money went to producers and for labor, transportation, taxes and other unavoidable costs.

The pending investigation of the food industry is very much in point. It is spurred, on the one hand, by farmers who feel that they are getting too small a share of the consumer food dollar and, on the other hand, by consumers who think prices are too high.

Encouraging words come from Dr. George Mehren, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture in charge of marketing. He says, "The inquiry we recommend is not designed for punishment. Our modern retail food system has done a fine job. The American housewife is being served better than ever before in the scope, choice and quality of foods available."

This is a case where there seems to be a woeful amount of misinformation — particularly in the matter of the profits earned by the concerns which process and market our foods. Every time a food cost goes up, no matter what the cause or the necessity, these groups, all the way from the biggest processor down to the corner grocery store, get the blame.

If this sound dictum is followed, the investigation will concern itself with facts which are of legitimate interest to all concerned. Let's hope that happens.

## Capitol News Two-State Boundary Pact Ready for States' Approval

LINCOLN — Agreement has been reached by representatives of the attorney general of Nebraska and Missouri for drafting a "rough" boundary compact between the two states.

which federal, state and local governments could participate. It provides for each state to carry out a statewide planning program before applying for the federal money. Since Nebraska has been doing this for several years, it could get the jump on some other states in qualifying for the funds.

After it is prepared, it will be presented to the Nebraska Boundary Commission. Later it is hoped the proposal can be presented to the legislatures of the two states. Any such compact must receive the approval of both legislatures and must also be ratified by Congress.

The act is aimed at creating recreational areas near cities whose population increases have far exceeded growth in facilities of this kind.

Howard McFadden, Jefferson City, Mo., an assistant attorney general, said that the rough compact "will be a starting point from which we can work." He added: "If we don't get this boundary thing settled soon, it will only snowball and become worse."

Education Programs  
Nebraska public school special education programs continued their growth during the last school year, State Education Commissioner Lloyd Miller said.

He will work with Howard Moldenhauer, Omaha, a special assistant attorney general for Nebraska, in drafting the compact.

The State Education Department paid some \$546,000 in excess cost reimbursements to the schools for programs serving 6,995 exceptional children. Miller said this amounted to 72 per cent of the excess cost approved for each local school district. He added: "Had the state appropriation been large enough to have reimbursed the local districts fully, they would have received over \$750,000 in state aid."

Nebraska and Missouri have never had a boundary compact. When Nebraska became a state in 1867, the two states agreed that the center of the Missouri River channel would provide a common border. Through the years, however, shifts in the channel have placed land owned by Nebraska owners on the Missouri side of the channel and vice versa.

The 72 per cent reimbursement was the largest amount of financial aid ever approved by the education department, Miller noted.

Moldenhauer said it is generally agreed that the center of the present channel, which was fairly well stabilized, should be the boundary in any new compact. Problems arise regarding individual land titles along the bottomlands.

Services were provided in 149 programs in 94 school districts employing 218 special education teachers and therapists.

Moldenhauer outlined for members of the Missouri delegation some of the problems Nebraska is presently having with "flow" over individual property rights along the river. He said he wants to avoid similar difficulties in any future compact

Don Sherrill, director of special education, said applications for new programs for this school year have shown a sharp increase. All indications point to a record increase in the special education services, he said.
