President Welch of the American Medical Association recently said two things which should help to set the record straight.

In Dr. Welch's words, "For many years, doctors, have insisted on help for the needy. We have plenty of that, and in the long run public opinion and feeling will previde the final decisons. But it would be a thought of a basis of emotion coupled with an ignorance of the salient facts. Knowledge is the essential prerequisite to any intelligent decision.

A total of 21 Nebraska communities now discharge untreated sewage into Nebraska waters. The Nebraska Health Department hopes that eventually the practice can be eliminated.

A Nebraska public power official says Nebraska rural public power districts — on the average — pay less for purchased electrical power than rurals in other Midwest states.

Paul M. Peterson, controller and chief accountant for the Loup River Public District, said recently the average cost of power to Nebraska's 34 rural districts is 7.32 mills per kilowath hour — a cheaper rafe than in Iowa, Missouyi and Minnesota.

Peterson said the cost of power to the 27 rurals served by the Nebraska Public Power System—operated jointly by the Loup and Platte Valley power districts—was-7-44 mills per kilowath hour.

The apparent fact that the Administration's decision is described as tentative poses a question mark. And it is a question mark that should be eliminated. The articles involved cannot logically be classed as luxuries in our kind off society. Numbers of them are absolute necessities. As a matter of simple justice, repeal should have taken place long ago.

Washington reports say that the plan also calls for repeal or reduction of certain other special taxes. These are like the retail sales taxes which one government official described as "increasing the cost of doing business."

The reason given for the expected Administration move is that repeal would have a salutary effect on the economy at a time when it might be starting a downturn. That is important. But it is even more important that the government finally keeps its word and relieve us of these "wartime emergency" burdens.

The profit margins fer Nebraska rurals is 26.97 per cent. This compares with 21.28 for Kansas, 20.77 for lowa, 21.48 for Minnesota, and 29.85 for Missouri, according to the REA figures.

The State plan is based on a proirity method giving consideration to present and projected enrollment increases, use of present facilities and the amount of matching money on hand.

The commission said if the state plan is approved, federal money will be made available to hire a permanent administrative staff to administer the plan.



Safe Grain Storage Pays

If you are building or buying new facilities for storing grain this fall, here are some ideas that will help ensure safe storage of corn or milo.

that will help ensure sate storage of corn or milo.

— Concrete floor should include a vapor barrier to help keep ground moisture from spoiling grain. Use a sheel of polying on top of a thin layer of concrete which has been placed over the gravel fill. The storage floor, 4 to 6 inches thick, should be poured over the vapor barrier.

— Concrete will be stronger if kept wet fer 5 to 7 days after pouring. This can be done by covering concrete with straw, earth or building material and sprinkling to keep the surface damp. To keep moisture in new concrete from causing grain spoilage, a plastic sheet of two mil thickness can be buildings will.

— Frame storage buildings will



framing is covered with sheath-ing followed by building paper and exterior siding.

and exterior siding.

If metal storage buildings are erected, be sure to read the instructions prepared by the manufacturer to aid in construction. This will save time and ean help prevent leaks that might develop due to careless workmanship. A storage building carefully erected will pay you dividends

ends — Storage bulldings should be weathertight at the eaves and roof ridges. Openings in these places will get snow blow in on the stored grain, resulting in spoilage. Ventilators on the roof gables ends should also be constructed to keep cut snow and rain

rain—If natural air drying will be used, the system should be planned and designed before building construction starts. In large flat storages, the system can be built so the main air duct can serve as a storage partition in addition to previding air distribution.

serve as a storage partition in addition to providing air distribution.

— Aeration systems also are important and should be included when grain is dried with heated air and if the storage has a capacity of 2,000 bushels or more. Areation helps keep grain cool and helps prevent insect and mold damage. It also helps prevent moisture accumulating on the top, of stored grain.

— Storages should be built to keep out rats. In frame storages a 24-inch strip of hardware cloth (hall screen) should be placed detween the sheathing and the siding around the building just above the foundation. A galvanized metal strip 8 inches wide should be placed around the outside of the building just above the hardware cloth.

Safe Grain Storage Pays

If you are building or buying new facilities for storing grain this fall, here are some ideas that will help ensure safe storage of corn or milo.

— Concrete floor should include a vajor barrier to help keep ground moisture from spoiling grain. Use a sheet of polyethlyene or lapped, rolled roofing on top of a thin layer of concrete which has been placed over the gravel fill. The storage, floor, 4 to 6 inches thick, should be poured over the vapor barrier.

— Concrete will be stronger if kept wet for 5 to 7 days after pouring. This can be done by covering concrete—with straw, dayth or building material and sprinkling to keep the surfacedamp. To keep moisture in few concrete from chasing grain spoilage, a plastic sheet of two mil thickness can be put on the floor before filling with grain.



He said in Kansas the average cost of purchased power! for rural districts is 8.02 mills per kilowaft hour, in Iowa 11.76 mills, in Missouri 7.49 and in Minnesota 10.48. Peterson said the 1963 statistical report of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) shows the average revenue per kilowatt hour of the Nebraska rurals was lower than that of any other of the five states at \$2.26. But he noted that 'this represents a margin of profit greater than all but one of the other states."
