Lincoln — Nebraska's tax system always gets a lot of attention during every session of the legislature, and it is 'already becoming 'clear that 1965 will-prove no deception.

Recently State Sen, Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, said the present system of taxation is "completely inneffective." He added that the only thing that can be done to meet ever-increasing government costs is to broaden the tax blase. The Scottsbluff lawmaker, however, did not propose a specific approach.

During the principal spokesmen against enactment of the state income tax bill prepared by Sen. Keinneth Bowen, Red Cloud. During the lengthy debate of the measure, Carpenter said Nebraska did not heed a broadened tax base hecause enough money could be laised from laws already in existence, if the laws were properly enforced.



Rat and mouse control programs should include rodent-proofing of bins, and poison baits. Baits should be put out now, so they will be there when rodents knock on the doors. Several kinds are available. Information on these formulations, is available front county agents.

Cool season grasses should be fertilized, with nitrogen this fall, advises M. D. Weldon, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist.

September is the time to fertilize cool season grasses for late fall pasture, he said. Brome, wheatgrasses, orchardgrass, tall fescue, Kentucky bluegrass and the like respond quickly to nitrogen fertilizer topdressing in cool weather.

Fertilizer carrying 40 to 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre is a good rate of application for nonirrigated pastures.
