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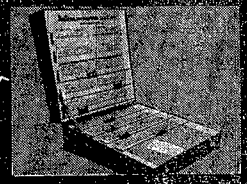

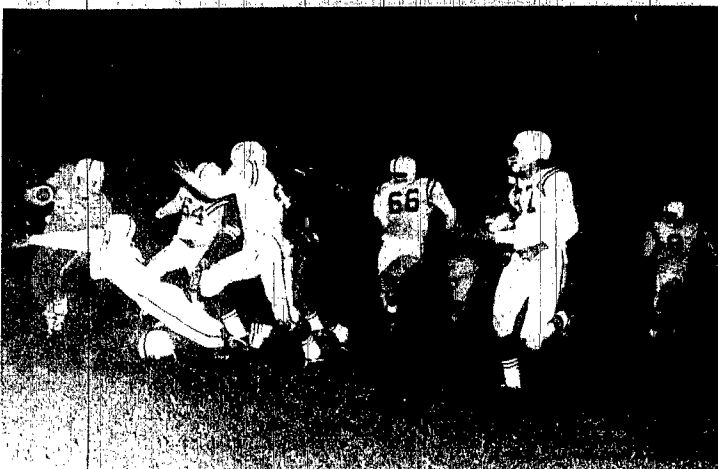

Wildcats Travel to Kearney For League Game Saturday

Kearney State next. And as usual, this fact means Wayne State's football machine goes into highest gear for what probably will be the biggest chore of the season. It also will be the opening of the Nebraska College Conference campaign for both Wayne and Kearney when they clash at 2 p.m. Saturday in Kearney's homecoming show. Less than a month ago challengers to the NCC title Kearney holds could tell themselves "things will be different this year" with Kearney minus its All-American quarterback, Dick Butolph, and his favorite pass target, end Jim Irwin, both graduated. But three Kearney games (two wins and a loss) have revealed Butolph's successor, Neal Kaup, as a demon with the aerial bomb. He completed 19 of 26 passes in Kearney's 18-0 conquest of Colorado State College last week. Otherwise, the Antelopes appear first two games. Statistically, Fullback Burr Matthes and Halfback Jerry Kilecoin occupy familiar positions at the No. 1 and 2 rushers, with 183 and 129 yards. Halfback Van Steckelberg has traveled 63 yards, Kirby 49. Monthlies and Kilecoin also double defense a good share of the time. Kilecoin played about 50 minutes against Northwest Missouri and Matthes nearly that much, both turning in several key saves. Quarterback Dean deBahr has passed for 88 yards on seven of 12 completions while his freshman understudy, Steve Feinstein, added 56 yards on three of eight completions. The Wildcats have whatever advantage comes from an extra week's preparation after an open date last weekend. There are no crippling injuries, and the gridirers still are growling for combat, as they have from the opening practice. Coach John Jermier probably will go with the same offensive starters, although several first-stringers have tough competition. Halfback Dennis Kirby is likely to see more action against Kearney after some fancy running in the

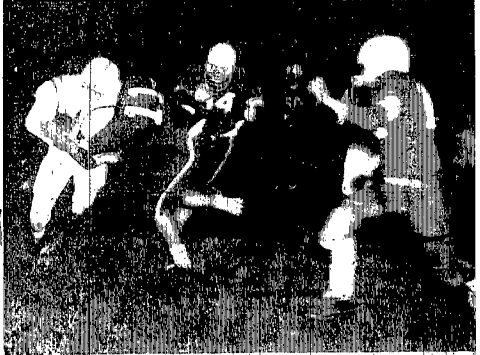
Dragons Trip Devils 12-0; Local Defense Improving

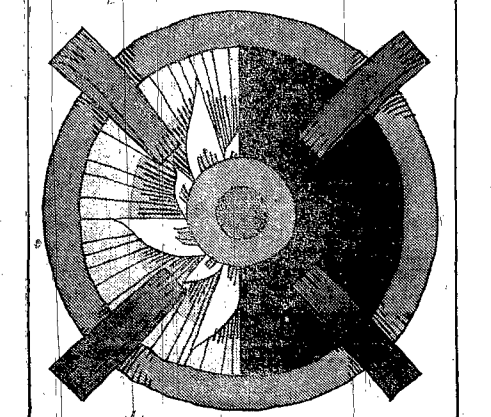
