The Wayne Branch of AAUW went on record Thursday night opposing the proposed amendment to make the office of the Commissioner of Education elective and the State Board of Education appointive.

Their statement read as follows: We the Wayne Branch of AAUW go on record as opposing the amendment to make the office of the Commissioner of Education elective and the State Board of Education appointive for the following reasons:

The proposed amendment provides no clear-cut division of authority. Under our present system, the people's elected representatives on the State Board of Education have the clear responsibility of policy. They, in turn, appoint the State Commissioner as the executive to carry out these policies and he is subject to the lay board at all times. This is a workable system. Under the proposed amendment, the Board would be appointed by the governor, the Commissioner elected by the people. With neither one responsible to the other, chaos could result with such a system. The amendment does not provide any guidelines as to the

In the election, November 3rd, appearing on a separate white ballot the voters will be deciding on the following proposed amendment: Constitutional Amendment providing that Commissioner of Education shall be elected beginning November, 1966, for four year terms; that the Commissioner of Education shall have general supervision and administration of the state school system under direction of the legislature; that the legislature shall determine the qualifications of the Commissioner of Education; that the State Board of Education shall consist of eight members, one representing each class of school districts and private and parochial schools, appointed for four year terms by the Governor with consent of the

legislature; to coordinate with the provisions of proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 1.

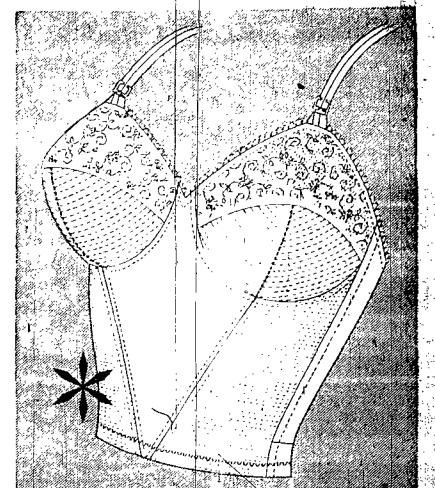

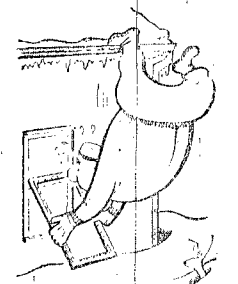

ORANGE HALLOWEENIES

Overnight sugar cookies for the "Tricks n' Treats crowd": beat together 1/2 cup soft butter, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 egg, 1 tsp. vanilla and 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind. Sift together 1 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 tsp. baking powder and 1 tsp. salt. Add slowly to first mixture, mixing well. Shape into a thick roll, wrap in waxed paper and chill overnight. Next day, cut into 1/2-inch rounds. Place on ungreased cookie sheet; bake 8 minutes in 400-degree gas oven. While cookies cool, make a medium-thin powdered-sugar frosting. Tint three-fourths of it orange, with red and yellow food coloring. In separate cup, tint the remainder green. Frost cookie face completely with orange; let set. Now draw green eyes and mouth, by dipping a toothpick in frosting. Yield: 4 dozen tasty jack o'lanterns.
