Game Commission Tells
How to Care for Game

Lincoln, Nebr.— Special care is needed to preserve the fine flavor of game birds during the opening weeks of the season. The Game Commission urged hunters to draw and cool their birds, as soon after they are bagged as possible.

"The balmy weather that we can expect during the weeks of quall and pheasant season causes game birds to apoil rapidly unless they're drawn born after being shot," said M. O. Steen, Commission director. "It's a shame to put so much effort in bagging some birds and then have them ruined for table use through neglect in the field."

The Director had the following tips for early season care: game proket or sack, they soon show signs of spoilage. Hanging the birds seep arately from the bett is a good way to cool them quickly.

To field dress a bird, make a cut midway botween vent and point of breastbone. Extend opening around the vent and point of breastbone. Extend opening around the vent and remove the entralis in one mass. Place giblets in a small plastig.



Guard Against Winter Fires

As outside temperatures drep, indoor fire dangers rise!

National Fire Protection Association records show that cold weather, always brings an increase in destructive fires.

Heating systems are mainly to blame. When they're pushed hard in the cold weather, any weakness in the equipment or installation may show up—sometimes with disasterous results. And any faulty practices in using and fueling heaters, especially portable kerosene units, mean trouble

Refueling portable oil heaters calls for care. Never fill while calls for care. Never fill while, they are burning or still hot, and avoid overfilling. If cold oil is used watch for possible burner flooding and flare-up. Keep portable heafers out of halls and away from doors or stairs where they might block escape. See that they are not placed to near curtains, clothes racks and other combustibles.

Fabric Softness

Fabric Softness
Fabric softeners or conditioners are designed to give fabrics a softness and fluffiness, to eliminate or reduce static cling, to reduce static cling, to reduce seasier.

When a fabric softener is added to the rinse water, it forms a ling coating on the surface of each fiber. This coating lubricates the fibers and allows them to move freely against each other, making the clothes softer to fae tearriers.

them to move receiv against each other, making the clothes softer to the touch.

State electricity, especially noticable when the weather is cold and dry, is caused by friction between two fabrics. Garments made by wool, cotton and linen are not affected much by static electricity because of their natural moisture content. Most snytheneds build up static becausthey hive little, if any, natural moisture. Therefore, when friction occurs between a wool dress, for example, and a nylon stip, the static electricity remains in the slip causing irritating clinging.

The thin film formed on the surface of synthetic fibers treated with fabric softeners prevents the retention of static electricity. All shorts offeners contain an ingredient which, when put into water, has a positive charge. Since most fabrics have negative charge, the softener is attracted to the fabric. As a result, the softener benefit is picked up and retained on the fabric and none remains to be discarded with the rinse water. For this reason, the amount of fabric softener sued should be based on the ampunt of fabric in the load, not on the quantity of water in the washer.

Most fabric softeners should be used only in the final rinse. Con-

Most labric softeners should be used only in the final rinse. Continuous, use of softeners might decrease the absorbent qualties of fabligs, therefore, from time to time skip the softener in the rinse where to' prevent an accumulation.
