Rockefeller Fund Gives Recordings

Wayne State's music department will be richer soon by a gift from the Martha Baird Rockefeller Fund for Music.

Dr. Raymond Kelton, chairman of the division of fine arts, has received notice that Mrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is presenting the complete recordings of the Beethoven "Thirty-two Piano Sonatas" as played by the late virtuoso pianist, Arthur Schnabel.

The gift also includes the scores of these sonatas, edited by Schnabel, and the pianist's book, "My Life and Music."

Schnabel, recognized among the world's foremost pianists, was especially noted for his interpretation of the classic composers, notably Beethoven.

Mrs. Rockefeller, a student of Schnabel's, expressed the hope that another generation of young musicians might benefit from his artistry through this gift.

Wayne is among several colleges, universities, conservatories and libraries receiving the gift.

Phone Rates Reduced For Long Distance Calls

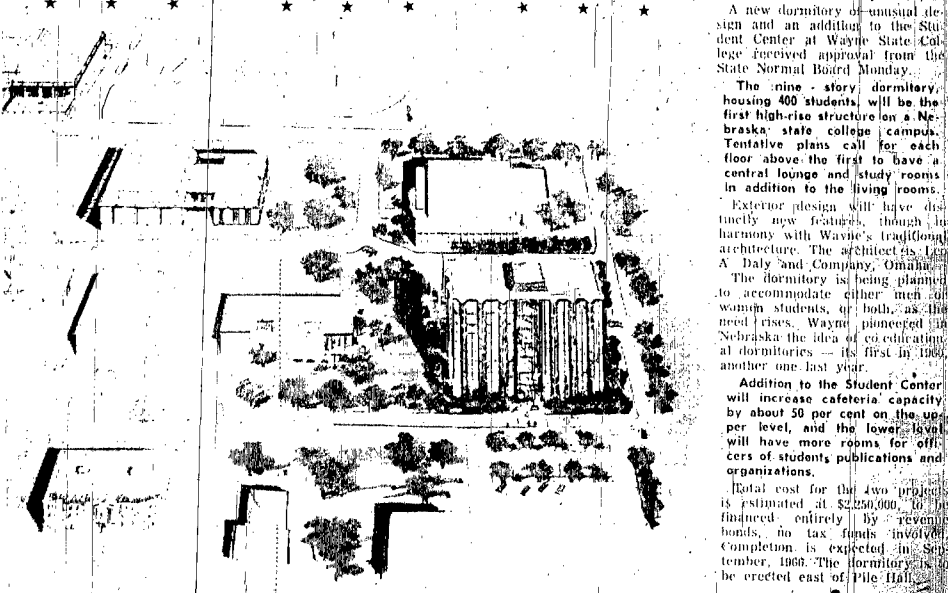
Northwestern Bell Telephone Company has been granted permission by the Nebraska State Railway Commission to lower rates on certain long distance calls within Nebraska effective Jan. 4, 1965.

The new rate schedule calls for reduced charges on station-to-station calls within the state placed between 9 p.m. and 4:30 a.m.

J. E. Olson, Northwestern Bell Vice-President and General Manager, said the new rate schedule will result in substantial savings to Nebraska telephone users.

Mr. Olson said the lower rates are the result of technological advances in the communications industry, recent tax changes, and the opportunity to better utilize the capacity of the telephone equipment during night-time hours when fewer long distance calls are made.

Wayne County Public Power District Schedules Rate Reduction for Users

A general rate reduction amounting to about \$12,000 annually for members of the Wayne County Public Power District was announced today by Manager Calvin W. Comstock.

Comstock said the reduction is the first cutback in general rates in 25 years and coincides with the observance of the Power District's 25th anniversary May 17. The action had been taken by the board of directors and has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration.

Prior to the board action, members of the Wayne County Public Power District had been paying 5 1/2 cents per kilowatt hour per month after the first 50 kilowatt hours. The reduction brings the price down to 4 1/2 cents per kilowatt hour after the first 50 KWH. Users who use a minimum of 50 kilowatt-hours or less each month have been paying a flat rate of \$3.50 per month and will continue to do so, Comstock explained.

A large percentage of our members have been using more than 50 kilowatt-hours monthly," Comstock explained. "In fact, the average consumption per month in 1963 was 720 kilowatt-hours. You can see this represents good news for our members. Naturally, the board of directors is very happy to pass this substantial savings on to them."

The Wayne County Public Power District energized its first section of line on Nov. 17, 1939. A 24-page historical brochure is being prepared in observance of the 25-year anniversary and plans call for mailing a copy to each member early in November. The brochure will contain an article giving highlights of the struggle to bring electricity to rural members in Wayne and Pierce counties and will be an interesting souvenir publication. It will feature a large number of pictures.

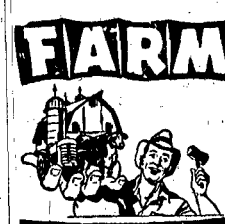

'Boys Couldn't Get Mad' Says Ball on Poor Season

The 13-0 loss at Neligh two weeks ago ended Wayne High's 1964 football season. It was an appropriate, soar ending for a poor season. The Devils failed to produce even a 500 record, as the final tally stood at 3 wins, 5 losses.

Wayne High is the largest school in the conference and yet failed to produce an adequate foe for any of the conference clubs with one possible exception. Why?

We went to Head Coach Jerry Ball for a possible answer or explanation, and what we learned was a rather startling discovery.

According to Coach Ball, the boys didn't really care whether they won or lost. No emotion was shown on their part in either case, and nothing could change their attitude.

Said Coach Ball, "From all indications and from conversations with other area coaches, Wayne should have been one of the top conference teams this year."

"This is looking at paper potential only. Going down our first string lineup we had one of the biggest lines in the conference. Potential-wise, we had three boys I feel could have been All-Conference selections."

Yet with all this potential, why the poor record and showing? "THE BOYS JUST DIDN'T GET MAD!" We were never mentally ready for a game. We had only one injury, resulting from contact so we were ready physically.

"But mentally I just couldn't get them up for a game. They look losing in stride and showed absolutely no emotion whatsoever."

"This is not the attitude of a winning ball club after a loss. I'm not saying they should be crybabies; but I am saying that it winning means anything to a club, it will show when they lose. It didn't show."

"Wayne should give them some sort of real satisfaction. But they gave me the impression that they thought they won because the other club committed more mistakes."

"A team can't win with this attitude and will not get fired up no matter how hard a coach tries. It wouldn't have made a bit of difference if, at halftime, I went into the locker room and screamed and shouted; if I would have gone in and quietly talked to them; or if I would have stayed outside and had a coke."

"This, I feel, made the biggest difference in our season. The way I see it we should have had maybe one less this year—no winner. But the rest of the season should have been ours."

"I realize that the switch in coaching the last four years here at Wayne has made a big difference, too. The change in football philosophy is a rough transition to make for any club."

"But if they try, it can be done. I'm looking forward to next year. The philosophy will remain the same, but the play of attack will be changed."

"Our player potential will remain on about the same level as this year with the exception of the graduating seniors."

Another program will be greatly stressed this winter to prepare not only football boys next year, but also track-men.

A weights program will be given to the boys who plan on going out for football next year, and who aren't out for basketball.

Coach Ball feels that if the weights program is as successful as he hopes it will be, next year's line could be a solid 200 pounds, tackle to tackle.

It won't be lacking in experience, either. Thirty boys earned letters this year, and fifteen will be returning.

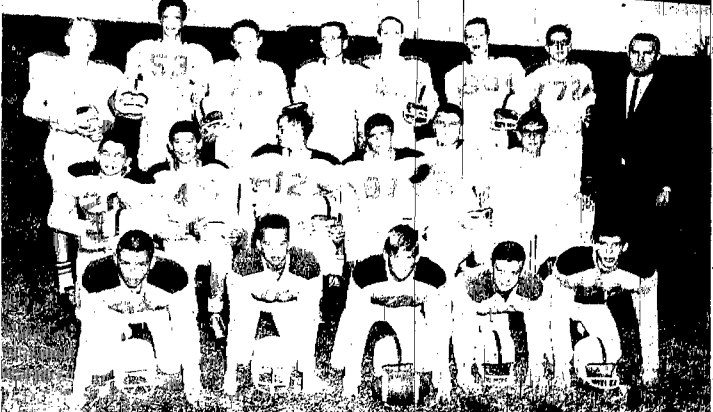

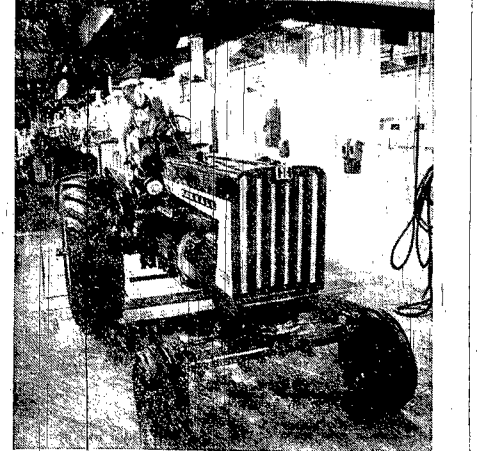
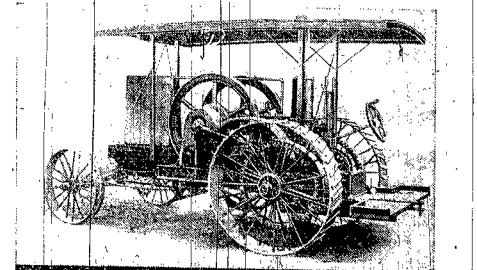

However, a fellow can't view a political landslide like this without some misgivings and without some thought of how it may affect our future.

It is to be hoped that both our Executive and Legislative branches of Government will not accept this as a mandate that gives them carte blanche to put into effect just any program that they deem fit. Frankly we shouldn't fear this too much for these men are practical enough to know that there is a pretty sizable hard core of dissidents who will be scrutinizing very carefully all these programs. These who might advocate them, are all practical politicians enough to know that the pendulum swing just as far away from you as it has swung toward you.

Regardless of what a lot of people may think right now, there will be no calamity for America nor will America become a casualty. Too many sound people around to allow that to happen.

chrome oven is by washing with a sponge or soft brush dipped in hot soap or detergent suds. A wooden spoon or rubber scraper may be used to loosen cooked on food after it has been softened by the suds. Then rinse-wipe the chrome with warm water and polish immediately with a dry cloth.

If the chrome has become streaked, wipe it (when cool) with a cloth moistened with baby oil. Then wash with suds, rinse and wipe dry. To keep the outside of a chrome oven door shiny, apply silver polish according to directions on the container.

When an oven has been neglected so badly that ordinary washing is not sufficient, a special oven cleaner may be used. After this has loosened the stubborn crusts, wash all surfaces, as usual. Once the oven is clean, it can be sprayed with a transparent protective coating which prevents grease and food from sticking. Then it takes only a sudsy sponge to clean the oven surfaces. These protective sprays can be purchased at grocery stores. Their protective coat gradually wears away from oven surfaces and needs to be renewed from time to time.

Chrome surfaces should never be scoured with abrasives or scraped with anything sharp. If the chrome plating is scratched, the metal underneath will be exposed to corrosion.

Lining Ovens With Foil

Lining an oven with foil prevents proper circulation of hot air. Therefore, avoid baking results, which the oven was engineered to give, will not be produced. It is wiser to omit the foil and wash the oven as needed. One permissible exception is placing a piece of foil under a casserole or fruit pie just large enough to catch normal drip or possible overflow.

4-H Enrollment Doubled

In the past 20 years, Nebraska 4-H Club enrollment has increased 2 1/2 times, says W. M. Ames, State 4-H Club leader.

From a total of 23,722 members in 1944, enrollment jumped to a total of over 52,885 in 1964. City boys and girls constitute a steadily increasing proportion of the membership of Nebraska and national 4-H clubs. In Nebraska, presently only 67 percent of the members of this once wholly rural organization come from farms, 15 percent from rural but non-farm homes, and 12 percent from urban or cities.

"Keeping pace with changing needs of young people, 4-H develops much of its strength from thousands of adult volunteer leaders who devote much time to leading 4-H clubs in their own communities and areas."

Ames pointed out.

During half a century some 250,000 youngsters in Nebraska and nearly 23 million youngsters nationally have participated in one or more of the many 4-H projects and activities. Some young people have built life-time careers from their 4-H work, the state leader noted.

"Boys and girls 9-19 years of age, interested in learning 4-H or finding out more about the program, should get in touch with their county agricultural agent or home Extension agent," Ames concluded.
