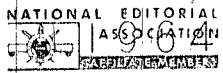

Three One-Act Plays Offered Sunday, Monday and Tuesday

Three one-act plays are the stage bill to be offered by Wayne State students Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights, all of them done in arena style in Rice Auditorium.

The first begins at 8 each night, with the audience seated all around the set on the Rice stage.

For this show, there's a special sales inducement—a one-cent "sale." Everyone who buys a single admission ticket or has a season ticket, may bring a guest for one cent.

Students are directing all three plays by American authors. In fact, the student's chose their own plays and the casts.

The first one-act is "The Undercurrent" by Fay Ehlert. This is the tense story of a young girl in secret rebellion to a tyrannical father. Full of stark realism, the play was written by a woman who was once a social worker and shows a vivid knowledge of the undercurrent that drags children away from unloving homes into an all-to-real world.

Second is a comedy, "The Flat-

tering Word," by George Kelly. In this play a minister who is greatly prejudiced against the theatre comes to mental grips with an actor-friend of his wife. The actor, in his efforts to convince the minister to attend the theatre, makes use of the one flattery that no one can resist.

The final play of the evening is Tennessee Williams' "The Long Goodbye." Written in a style that is typical of Williams, this drama is a conflict of the mind, in this case the mind of a young writer growing up. One by one his family has been removed from this world until only he is left. As he relives his past, he finds that everyone is always saying goodbye and that life is nothing but one long goodbye.

Four Lettermen Bolster Devil Basketball Hopes

Wayne High opens its 1964-65 basketball season Dec. 5 at Albion with an inexperienced team playing a much tougher schedule. Four previously unscheduled schools are on tap for the Devils, including last year's State Champion, Ralston. The other three clubs are Albion, Columbus St. Bonaventure and Papillon.

Head Coach Harold Maciejewski feels that the changes have boosted scheduling for the Devils, and will provide the experience his boys need. It will also show what types of clubs other areas of the state are producing.

Wayne's hopes will be thrown upon the shoulders of four returning lettermen, two of whom were starters last season. Doug Manske, senior at 6' 7", and Rick Bornholt, a 5' 7" senior, are two regulars returning from last year. Phil Kelton, 6' 7", and Neil Adams, 5' 8", are both juniors who saw limited action, with last year's successful varsity squad.

The other 12 squad members have no varsity experience, but played on last year's "B" team with a 14-2 record. They are: Glen Nichols, 5' 11", sr.; Dean Eloffson, 6' 3", jr.; Gary Mordhorst, 6' 3", jr.; Keith Tietgen, 6' 0", jr.; Mark Robinson, 5' 11", jr.; Bob Reeg, 6' 1", jr.; Maurice Boeckenbauer, 6' 1", jr.; Leon Jorgensen, 6' 1", jr.; Lowell Lutt, 6' 1", jr.; Jim Chambers, 6' 1", jr.; and Jack Manske, 6' 1", jr.

"We don't have any tall men, as in Mau last year," said Mac. "and Donie Green, a senior with a lot of varsity experience, moved to Seward."

"But we should have good team strength this year, and a better balanced club. I also like the way the boys have been working this year. Our practice sessions have been running very well."

What's in store for Wayne this season from the new teams? Albion, Dec. 5, there—says Mac. "This is as tough an opener as we've had in quite a while. It's a B school with many returning lettermen. A pretty strong ball team. Papillon, Jan. 12—Papillon came through with a 19-3 record last year. All three losses were to Ralston. We will see them in the Holiday Tournament this season. Ralston, Jan. 23, here—Ralston comes up here this year carrying their hopes around a corps of lettermen. They were Class B State Champs last year, and could return this year."

St. Bonaventure, Feb. 6—We will entertain this club without too much information about them. We do know they have good athletes there, as they had an outstanding football team. I think we can assume they will have a pretty far basketball team, too. Rice Auditorium will be the setting for three Wayne games and the holiday tournament. Norfolk, Bloomfield and Ralston will be played in the WC gymnasium.

Aside from this trio, the squad lacks any player with extensive battle testing. After a month of practice, Svenningsen reports Wayne High grad Jim Mau showing real improvement. At 6-5 he equals Hope's height as the squad's tallest, and Mau in addition has the left to be a rugged board man at 225 pounds.

The squad suffered a blow with the recent departure of Dick Franssen, a probable starter, who had to drop school because of illness. He may be able to return in January. Opening game takes the Wildcats to Dana College, Dec. 1. First home game will be Dec. 4, against Hamline University.

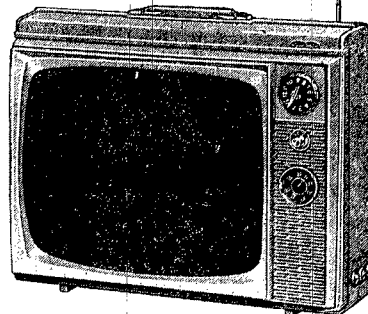

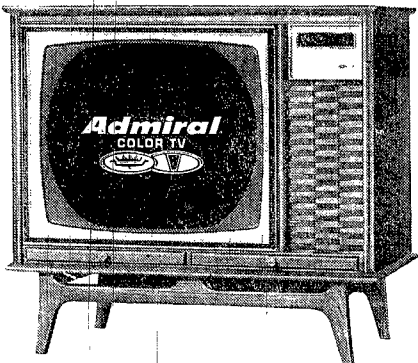

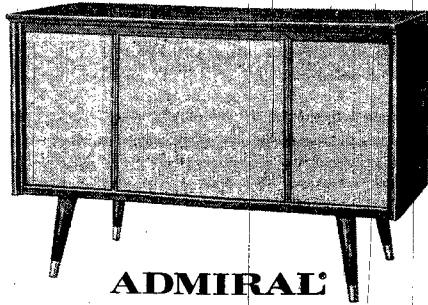
