



## Conference Votes For New Members

The five-member Nebraska College Conference wants to grow. Once a 10-team athletic league, the NCC Saturday at its fall meeting began an effort to regain some of its lost members.

The method, to accept a college into full membership without requiring participation in all the conference sports. Representatives of the members voted unanimously to draft an amendment to the constitution spelling out this goal, the amendment to be considered at the spring meeting May 15 at Kearney.

Meanwhile, the representatives decided their intention to work actively for new members. They did stipulate some conditions: new members would have to abide by eligibility rules of both the NCC and the NAIA, a national governing organization; they would pay the full regular dues of the NCC even if they skip some sports; and in football they would have to allow time, probably two seasons, before entering a full conference schedule.

The representatives also noted that the constitution presently requires unanimous consent of all members to accept a new member. Further, members would be expected to play a sport consistently, not jump in and out.

**Actually, the proposed amendment does not change much, since some of the present members do not compete in all sports. The constitution does not require full participation, but it does specify conditions for championship contention.**

The NCC had eight members in its first full year of competition, 1946; the four state colleges, Nebraska Wesleyan, Hastings, Doane, and Midland, York come in later but dropped in 1950.

Concordia and Dana joined in 1958, then dropped in 1960 along with Midland to enter the new Tri-State Conference. Wesleyan departed in 1962, Doane last spring.

In other action the conference set these tournament dates: wrestling, Feb. 27 at Chadron; track, May 14-15 at Kearney; golf and tennis, May 14 at Kearney; cross country, Oct. 30 at Wayne.

In addition, swimming was adopted as a conference sport, with a meet March 13 at Kearney.

## Check S.S. Records Before Retirement

"Inquire before you retire." That's the advice given by Joseph Buglewicz, social security district manager in Norfolk, to persons who plan to retire soon.

"We always try to make sure that a person's first retirement check arrives promptly," Mr. Buglewicz said, "but it really helps if we can talk with him before he actually retires. Suppose, for example, John Smith expects to retire in January 1965. If he files his claim in November 1964, there will be plenty of time to process the application while the postman can drop Mr. Smith's check in his box on Feb. 3, 1965."

Mr. Buglewicz added that some evidence of the previous year's earnings is generally needed. A wage earner can use his Form W-2, Withholding Tax Statement, while a self-employed person can supply a copy of his income tax return for the previous year.

A birth certificate is best for proving a person's age, but the Social Security Administration may also accept a baptismal record, census record, insurance policy, naturalization paper, passport, or even the old family Bible.

"The Social Security Administration relies on high speed wire transmission, electronic

computers, and highly trained people to insure prompt delivery of benefits," Buglewicz said, "but a pre-retirement visit to the social security office located at Norfolk is the best assurance of having that first check arrive right on time."

Leo Sitts, field representative of the Norfolk social security office, will be at the courthouse in Wayne, Thursday, Dec. 3 from 1 to 3 p.m.

## New Army Enlistees Granted Extra Leave

Men and women, who are scheduled to enter active duty in the United States Army during the period of Dec. 9 - Jan. 1, 1965, need not worry about not being able to spend the Christmas holidays at home, according to a recent announcement by SFC. Coleman of the Norfolk Recruiting office.

A new Department of the Army policy enables all persons who enlist or re-enlist after Dec. 9, 1964, to take as many as 16 or 17 days leave in order that they will not have to report for basic training on Christmas or New Year's day.

Not only will they spend Christmas and New Year's at home, but since the leave will be granted immediately upon enlistment, they will be drawing full Army pay and allowances.

Personnel who take advantage of this leave policy will be able to take as many as seven days leave upon completion of advanced individual training.

Barrero, from Bayshore, N.Y., brings experience from Paris College, Texas, where he lettered in basketball and track. He also earned all-conference recognition in Long Island high school competition.

The squad numbers five freshmen, an indication of shallow depth among the veterans. In the past Svonnigson has rarely used more than one or two freshmen.

The yearling corps, besides Mau, includes Ron Hintz, 6-0 guard from Rudyard, Mich.; Joe Mueller, 6-1 forward from Arlington Heights, Ill.; Bob Strathman, 6-1 forward from St. Louis, Mo., and Bob Symonds, 5-10 guard from Cumberland, Ia.

Mueller rated all-conference for two years in basketball, one year in baseball. Symonds was all-Southwest Iowa, all-conference, and a state honor roll player at Cumberland.

**Department of Roads Cuts Biennium Budget Request**

LINCOLN—The Nebraska Department of Roads has cut back its 1965-67 biennium budget request by more than seven percent because of a \$9.5 million decrease in available federal monies.

The budget asks \$143,500,638 for the two-year fiscal period, compared to \$155,914,422 appropriated for the current operating expenses.

State Engineer John Hossack said the decrease in available federal funds was caused by the Highway Department using up its backlog of U.S. Government money. He said the state was slow to take advantage of funds for Interstate highway construction, but that accelerated work on the superhighway has cut down that backlog.

"This biennium the federal matching money will be spent about as fast as it's available," he said. The federal government underwrites 90 per cent of the cost of Interstate construction, with the states paying the remainder.

The budget request anticipates \$67.9 million will be available from state revenue sources to match some \$68.7 million in federal funds. This is a \$3.9 million increase over the current appropriation.

Hossack said the increased use of Nebraska roads is expected to bring a \$2.6 million increase in state gas tax funds, the principal state source of income for the Highway Department.

He said he expects few changes in the department's programs during the coming biennium, but that low cost surfacing of gravel roads would be emphasized.

Hossack said the state's growing highway system is causing maintenance costs to climb steadily, thus reducing the money available for road construction.

He noted that the Interstate system, growing at a 45-mile-a-year clip, means an added \$180,000 yearly in maintenance costs.

The Highway Department is also requesting a \$2.5 million budget for capital construction in the next biennium. The largest chunk of this request, \$1.7 million, is earmarked for a new office building in Lincoln.

Construction of the building is expected to start sometime next summer.

**Budget Hearings Open**

Governor Morrison has opened a month-long schedule of public hearings on the budget requests of state agencies. He will mold his recommendations from information derived at the sessions.

The Governor said he intends to maintain a "tight budget," adding, however, that "you can't hold the University of Nebraska and the State Colleges back when their enrollments are increasing so fast."

Budget requests submitted so far total more than \$300 million.

**School Districts Comply**

The State Education Department reports that about 75 percent of Nebraska's school districts have complied with the Nov. 15 deadline for filing financial records for the past school year.

A law passed by the 1963 legislature requires all class two, three, four, five and six districts to file annual audits. Districts which contain only elementary schools are exempt.

"I don't know of a nicer thing that's being done along the road," Whilton said.

Whilton said he hopes that the next congress will close the "loopholes" in the Federal Billboard Control Act. He said there's a good chance the federal act will be liberalized to give communities more space to advertise the facilities in their town.

Nebraska has asked the Federal Bureau of Roads to permit it to construct 500-square foot Interstate signs. Presently only 100-square foot signs are allowed.

**Enrollments Rise**

The enrollment crush at Nebraska's four state colleges has shown up in a dormitory occupancy report released by Normal Board Coordinator Dr. Freeman Decker.

Of the 25 housing units on the campuses at Peru, Kearney, Wayne and Chadron, 13 are housing students in excess of their rated capacity. Six others are full.

Decker said in some of the overcrowded dormitories, three students are living in rooms designed for two.

All four schools recorded increased enrollment this year.

**River Pollution**

State Sanitation Engineer T. A. Filipi said more than 22,000 pounds of raw grease is being dumped into the Missouri River daily by Omaha packing plants.

He said a short-range solution to the problem is needed in a hurry since the river does not become contaminated. He said Omaha officials are now undertaking a project to treat packing house waste, but that this won't be completed for at least two years.

Filipi said St. Joseph, Mo., officials are becoming alarmed over the situation.

**Redistricting to Go Easily?**

One of the leading opponents of the area reapportionment bill of the last State Legislature says another hassle over redistricting the state can "easily" be avoided in the 1965 session.

Sen. George Svay of Omaha proposed that Douglas County, Lancaster County and outstate senators meet as three separate groups and reapportion their parts of the state according to the Federal District Court decree of last summer.

"If each area works out an agreement according to the court order, we should be able to come up with a pretty good plan, no fight should be necessary," Svay said.

A special three-judge panel ruled last July that the 1965 legislature must reapportion itself on an equal population basis. The ruling came after the U. S. Supreme Court held all legislatures must be apportioned on a population basis only.

Feuding and fussing over re-apportioning Nebraska's unique

system, growing at a 45-mile-a-year clip, means an added \$180,000 yearly in maintained costs.
