Inspected for Scabies

Plans are being completed to inspect all sheep flocks in the state this winter.

The Nebraska scabies eradication program is a "team effort" involving federal and state agencies, sheep producers and veterinarians with the county Extenson agent acting as coordinator for the inspection in each county.

The section in each county.

Barlier this year, all flocks in 88 eastern Nebraska counties were inspected for sheep scabies, caused by a tiny mite which is most active and therefore easiest to detect, during cold weather. Following the inspection, however, sheep scab was detected in several flocks around the state. A decision was made to reinspect flocks in all counties to assure that the disease has not been re-introduced in areas previously declared "scab-free."

It is imperative to the success of the inspection effort that each and every sheep flock be inspected.

**Approved Schools to Get** 

Payments are made retroac-tively for the 1963-64 school year, according to Floyd K. Alexand-er, director of education. Alexander said about 13,000 students in 213 school systems in Nebraska participated in the program last year. He estimated that about 230 schools are con-ducting driver education classes currently.

currently.

The 1963 law provides that part of the fees paid for driver licenses be made available to schools with approved driver education classes.

Alexander said that 11 school systems, including Lincoln and Omaha, have not been paid for last year's program because of a technicality involving the qualifications of some driver education instructors. He said the problem will soon be cleared up, though.

Each school with an approved program is eligible to receive 350 per student taking driver education. The per pupil cost, however, is almost always higher than that, Alexander said.

Alexander said there's a surplus of division funds now and that it may be possible to raise the per pupil payment of \$40. Another possibility, he said, is the establishment of la school bussupervisory agency within the State Education Department.

# Fund Formula Changed

The Nebraska Hospital Advisory Council has agreed to change the percentage of federal funds applied to Hill-Burton hospital projects in the state. Presently, the federal matching percentage is 40. The Council lowered this to 33½ per cent to allow the funds to be spread over more projects.

The official State vote can-vass has been completed. No changes resulted in previously announced returns of the Nov. 3

Secretary of State Frank Marsh, who compiled information for the canvassing board, said the total vote was 592,673 with about 70 per cent of the esp

the polls.

The vote fell short of the 619, 399 recorded in the 1960 election and the all-time high of 623,781 set in 1940. It also was shy of Marsh's pre-election estimate of 655,000

disson.

The carvass showed that president Lyndon B. Johnson defeated Republican nominee Sen. Barry Goldwater by 30,460 votes. Johnson got 53 per cent of the votes cast and was the first Democrat to carry Nebraska in the presidential election since 1336

Democrat to carry Nebraska in the presidential election since 1836.

Democrat Governor Frank B. Morrison defeated Republican challenger Dwight Burney by 115,997 votes, collecting 60 percent of the ballots marked. It was the largest victory margin ever for a Democratic Governor in Nebraska.

The closest race was for the First District seat in the State Legislature. The canvass showed that Mrs. Calista Cooper-Hughes! Humboldt, edged Floyd W. Pohlman, Auburn, by a scant 18 votes for the post.

Other close legislative races were in the 16th and 22nd district. Sen. W. H. Hasebrock, West Pelint, won re-election from the 16th district by 177 votes, and former State Sen. Herb Nore, Genof, won in the 2nd district by 176 ballots.

Members of the State Board of Canyassers are Governor Morrison State Treasurer Metle

Nebraska's initial allocation under the act is more than \$1.8 million!

under the act is more than \$1.8 million. The state plan sets up detailed eriteria for the Nebraska Higher Education Commission to use in determining projects priorities. Althdugh the act was authorized by Congress last year, no funds were appropriated for fiscal 1984.
