Present "Messiah" Oratorio Sunday at Rice Auditorium

Handel's oratorio, "The Messiah," will return to Wayne State College's Christmas observance Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock in Rice Auditorium.

The college chorus and orchestra will be augmented by about 100 singers from the Wayne area in the performance directed by Dr. Earl Janssen of the college music faculty.

The soprano soloist will be Mrs. William Hasebroek of West Point, taking time from her busy national duties as president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, a position that keeps her in Washington, D. C., or traveling much of the time.

A graduate of Wayne State, Mrs. Hasebroek serves as a trustee of the Wayne State Foundation and is active in many local, state and national organizations. She is a frequent traveler, singer who is frequently a soloist.

The contralto soloist is Mrs. Edna Lankart, the former Nancy Conway, Sioux City, a graduate of the University of South Dakota and later a student at the Chicago Conservatory of Music. She too is in frequent demand for singing in the Sioux City area and has served with the city's Symphony Orchestra and the Municipal Band.

The tenor soloist is John W. Boehr, instructor in voice and music theory at Grace Bible Institute, Omaha, soloist at First Central Congregational church, and tenor soloist for eight years with the Omaha Symphonic Chorus in its "Messiah" renditions. He received his master of music degree from the University of Nebraska last June. The Rev. Mr. Boehr was a soloist for Wayne's last performance of "The Messiah" in 1960.

Albert Hansen, Sioux City, will sing the bass solos. A native of Emerson, he graduated from Wayne State with a music degree in 1947. Since then he has been in news work for radio and currently the Sioux City Journal. Meanwhile, he has continued in music, as a church choir director, substitute teacher, and soloist with the Symphony Orchestra and Municipal Band. He has sung "The Messiah" at Wayne State several times.

Protest Trailer Court Permit At Wayne Council Meeting

Wayne's need of adequate zoning laws was again evidenced Tuesday night when about 40 Wayne citizens appeared at the regular meeting of the City Council to protest the issuance of a trailer court permit to Walter Moller, Wakefield.

The council had issued the permit to the Nov. 24 meeting. Location of the proposed court is on lot 17, Taylor and Wachob's addition. The property is located at the west end of Second street and was owned by Chris Tietgen.

City Attorney B. B. Bennett told the group that the council had no legal grounds for refusing the permit.

Attorney for the protest group, John Addison, said Wednesday that they had decided on no course of action as yet. Moller had no comment on the situation at press time.

In other action Tuesday the council met as a board of equalization and set assessments for the construction of sanitary sewers in districts 22, 23 and 24.

The council also voted to donate \$500 to the Wayne State Foundation. The figure was arrived at by allowing one percent of the total light and water bills paid to the city by Wayne State for the year.

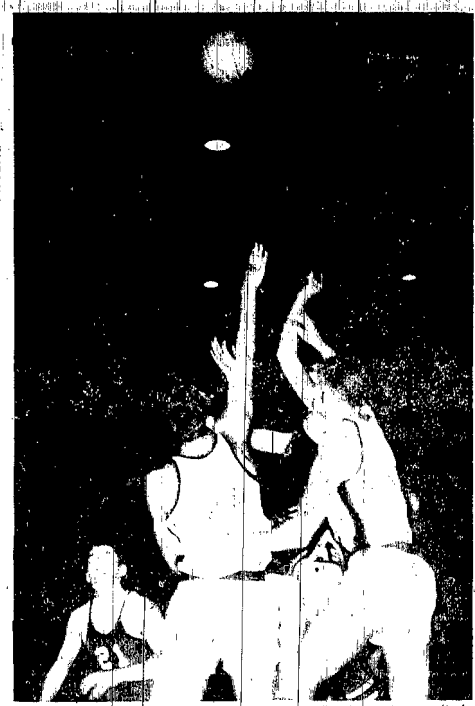

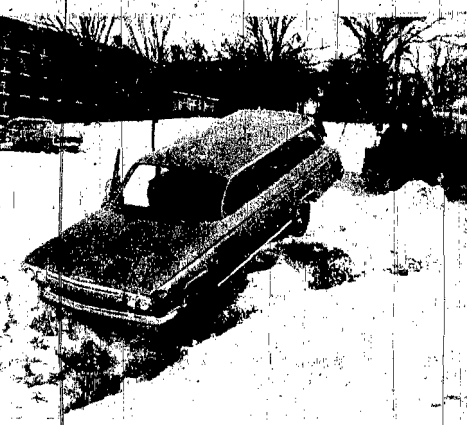

Soybeans Used as Dairy Supplement

Ground or cracked soybeans can and are being used for dairy feed in Northeast Nebraska.

"Soybeans can be used for protein supplement very satisfactorily," according to Don Kubik, Area Dairy Extension Agent. "If they are used moderately 25-30 per cent of the ration, they are a good addition to the dairy ration," he states. Above this level the ration tends to become less palatable and at 50 per cent it is almost unpalatable.

In experimental trials they have been fed at higher levels. For example in Iowa it was fed as the only concentrate and cows did eat up to 8.5 pounds per day.

In long range feeding trials where about 25 per cent of the concentrate mixture was ground soybeans, production was maintained at a level equal to that of cows fed a grain ration plus soybean oil meal. Butterfat per cent was also maintained, and even showed a slight increase in Indiana and Iowa studies.

When shifting from commercial supplement to soybeans, vitamins and minerals should be added to the ration to take the

place of those normally supplied in a commercial supplement. Soybeans have proved to be equal to linseed oil meal and superior to cottonseed oil meal in the dairy ration.

In summary Kubik stated that, "Ground or cracked soybeans are a good feed if used moderately in the dairy ration."

Editorial State of Iowa Doesn't Like Joint Ag Research Program

LINCOLN — Nebraska's celebrated agricultural research program apparently doesn't impress the State of Iowa.

The Iowa Development Commission has announced its rejection of a proposed \$60,000 joint farm research project by Iowa and Nebraska under the program.

Nebraska had proposed a study of dry-milled corn starch for various applications in the paper industry. Each state would have contributed \$30,000 toward the research.

Governor Morrison said he's disappointed with the Iowa decision. He said a cooperative venture is needed in this area so the full benefit of the research can be realized.

The Governor said he intends to pursue the proposal for joint research projects in future discussions with Midwest governors and congressmen. He said Nebraska cannot carry the load alone in this area forever.

"We need as much cooperation as we can get. This is vitally important to the economy of the whole region," Morrison said.

The proposed Iowa-Nebraska project was based on a successful Nebraska research program which opened a potential market for 16,500,000 bushels of corn through the use of the dry-milling process.

Nebraska began its agriculture research program five years ago. It is aimed at finding new industrial uses for farm products, thereby reducing surpluses.

The program has been watched intently by other industrially-minded states but thus far none have joined with Nebraska. Morrison said he hopes it's only a matter of time before joint projects can be started.

The Iowa Development Commission said two factors influenced its decision to reject the Nebraska offer: Indication by the paper industry that the oil content of dry-milled starch poses some costly technical problems, and recent reductions in the cost of wet-milled starch. Morrison said he intends to discuss the Iowa decision with State Agriculture Director Pearl F. Fleming.

Legislative Session Nears

The 1965 Nebraska Legislature, whose membership at 49 will be the largest ever under the one-house system, is busy making plans to reconvene Jan. 5.

Several state senators have announced intentions to introduce legislation. Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, has confirmed he will again sponsor more than 100 bills.

Lawmakers have announced they will introduce tax broadening, education, public power, traf-

fic safety, liquor and legislative redistricting legislation.

A bill will be introduced calling for a constitutional amendment providing for the election of the governor and lieutenant governor as a team. An effort will be made to change the name of the State Railway Commission to the "Public Services Commission."

Carpenter, who usually introduces more bills than any other two senators combined, said he will seek to redistrict the State Supreme Court and the State Board of Education on a strict population basis. He said the proposal is based on the U.S. Supreme Court's "one man, one vote" decree concerning redistricting of state legislatures. He said the decree should be carried throughout all branches of government.

Presently, the six associate justices of the State Supreme Court and all members of the State Board of Education are elected from six districts. The chief justice of the court is elected statewide.

New Tax Head

George J. Dworak, a native of Ord and former County Assessor, formally assumed the post of State Tax Commissioner recently.

He fills the vacancy left by Forrest Johnson, who served for five years. Johnson became the new executive Director of the non-profit Nebraska Tax Research Council, a fact finding group.

Dworak said the three greatest problems facing him in his new job are budgeting, preparing legislation and hundreds of tax-exemption hearings that are to be completed early next year.

He said he would outline his plans for legislation after meetings with Governor Morrison and members of the Tax Commission staff.

Dworak, who will receive \$12,500 yearly as Tax Commissioner, joined the commissioner's staff in 1963 as a field man. He had served as Valley County Assessor from 1959-1963. He is married and has three children.

Speedup on Interstate

State Engineer John Hossack has proposed legislation to be enacted to allow for increased Interstate Highway right-of-way acquisition in urban areas.

He suggested a loan program whereby the State Department of Roads would receive special funds for advanced property purchases. He said the money could be paid back after 1972, the year all Interstate projects must be completed to be eligible for 90 percent federal aid.

Hossack said such a program

is needed to assure that urban portions of the superhighway will be finished by the deadline.

A loan program, he added, would allow the Highway Department to acquire needed property without tampering with present interstate funds.

The veteran State Engineer explained that urban projects generally take longer to complete. He said they are more complicated and time-consuming.

Labor Proposal

The state Department of Labor, in its biennial report to Governor Morrison, has recommended the enactment of a \$1 million minimum wage law in Nebraska.

The department also recommended that it be given authority to assist workers in the collection of unpaid wages, and legislation limiting the number of pounds to be lifted by female employees.

The report said that the weekly wage for production workers in manufacturing hit an all-time high of \$104.48 in June of this year, compared with \$95.23 two years ago.

The hourly wage for production workers climbed nine percent to \$2.37 in the same period, the report said.

Total employment in activities outside agriculture increased some 1.9 percent.

Co. Agent's Column

Big Farming Operation

Do you need a big operation to stay in farming?

Some thoughtful answers to this question have been given by Purdue University extension economists.

Basically they found in their studies that you need not operate a section of land and a complex series of livestock enterprises to make a profit in farming. In fact, there was evidence in the Purdue study showing an opposite trend. The medium-sized crop-livestock farm with two men operating the unit was just as profitable or more so than many extremely large units.

Generally speaking, a profitable farm unit begins with a good crop base. You should shoot for 200 to 300 tillable acres with good yields and an intensive rotation.

Most farms in the 200 to 300-tillable-acre range also need livestock to push returns high. Even here, though, there's no necessity to run the biggest operation in the county to make a profit.

Milk Cows That Pay—Go DHIA!

Don Kubik, University of Nebraska dairy specialist, says that there are good reasons—both economic and production-wise—for joining the Nebraska Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

Of course, just joining DHIA won't automatically guarantee more money from your dairy cows—but it will give you the facts and figures to know which cows are making money for you—and which cows are taking a free ride on the feed bucket.

Kubik says that cows need to produce 7,000 pounds of milk before they can start showing any profit. He points out that non-DHIA cows last year averaged only 600 pounds (800 pounds in Wayne County). Cows in DHIA herds averaged more than 10,000 pounds of milk and more than 300 pounds of butterfat.

Kubik says that if Nebraska dairymen remove the cows that aren't paying for their keep—there would be fewer cows to eat up feed and profits, there would be less milk on the market, and more profit per cow—because only the high producers would be kept.

Increasing herd production by 25 percent increases labor returns by \$3,000 dollars per year. But increasing herd size by 25 percent increases labor income only \$1,500 per year.

Price For Farmland Increases

Whether he likes it or not, today's farmer is learning to live with credit. It's a matter of survival in the face of the higher costs of land along with the other production inputs.

Farmland prices have risen more than 50 percent in the past decade, while net farm income per acre is up only 4 percent. Outstanding farm real estate debt has nearly doubled.

The widening gap between land prices and farm income also means that many a purchase of farmland is based less on what the farm earns today than on what the acreage will bring tomorrow when the land is put back on the market.

Christmas Mail

Now is the time when Christmas mailing lists are updated and cards are addressed. It's a good idea to keep a list of cards received and cards sent each year. New names can quickly be added, addresses checked, and perhaps some names dropped from the list.

If you have not added ZIP CODE numbers to your mailing addresses, do it this season. ZIP CODE numbers help to speed up mail delivery and to assure correct delivery. Your local post office can supply you with ZIP CODE numbers you need. Numbers can often be read when handwriting is illegible. Therefore the proper ZIP CODE on letters or packages can keep mail out of the "dead letter office." Even the return address should be complete with a ZIP CODE number. Remember too that to be complete an address must give the street number or the RFD number.
