In our Church on Christmas Sunday we always sing, "Joy to the world, the Lord is come." In spirit it is typical of both Christmas music and the Christian life. Do you have that feeling as a Christian, not only at the moments of Christmas but throughout the entire year? When you think of the Christ is your thought one of joy and gladness, or does it have about it darkness and solemnity?

The Spirit of the Halleluiah Chorus is not a monopoly of Christmas day or Easter Sunday. The spirit of the Halleluiah Chorus has captured the spirit that was commonly revealed to all the people who knew Jesus of Nazareth when He walked the earth. Certainly Jesus faced the realities of the world. Surely He was not ignorant of the suffering that was at hand. He faced the tragedies of His own life and did not face them in a jaunty or carefree manner, but throughout all His life of tragedy and sorrow, there are the overtones of this warm and cordial, this radiant and glad spirit that is woven into His life and ministry.

Where do you suppose His radiance came from? There must have been a hundred or a thousand springs of gladness from which He drew frequently. In John's Gospel he refers to Jesus as the light of the world. And so we use such words as light, joy, gladness, radiance and happiness to speak of what has come to the world. Isn't it just possible that we might draw from these resources of God that we might be radiant. We ought to draw upon them also so that as we try to represent Christ as Christians we can share something of the charm and wonder, something of the joy and light of Him whom we serve and of Him whose birthday we celebrate.

I feel fairly sure that one of the ideas that was a constant source of refreshment and joy to Him was His concept of values. "What does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses his own soul." One of the most difficult disciplines we have as Christians is to discern between real values and apparent values. Christ is not asking you to give up things that are rewarding and sustaining. He is not asking you to take out of your family life any of the things that make it good. He is saying to you, "Look seriously at the values of life."

Friends, if you want to do something for your home and family life at Christmas time, what is the best thing you can do? There is not anything for sale in any store that can take the place of true values, of a good spirit in your home. This is the thing that is essential, this is the one thing that is indispensable. A good spirit, love, confidence, understanding, forgiveness, patience, affection, fidelity, honor, devotion — those words describe a quality of spirit that is indispensable if you want your home and family life blessed at this season of the year. Other things may adorn it with extras; but if this quality of spirit is missing, the other things cannot do the job.

Christ knew that around Him there was a Providence that cared about His well-being. In this quality of spirit — faith in God — His life must have found its constant refreshment.

Merry Christmas? Well of course, I wish you a Merry Christmas; but if your merriment is only related to the material circumstances or interests that gather around the Christmas season, it is very shallow. Merry Christmas? I covet for you something of the insight and faith of this Man of Nazareth, whose birthday we celebrate.

Former Hospital Burns to Ground

Christmas in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Wylie of Winside will not be the holiday they had planned. Their home, which was once a hospital, burned to the ground in sub-freezing temperatures Sunday.

Mrs. Wylie thought she smelled gas in one room. When her husband checked, he found a blaze already started around a wall furnace.

It was a little after 11. Five hours later the remains were smoldering in the basement. Where a fine old two story home had stood there was nothing but blackened debris, most of it in the basement and all of it ruined.

Firemen from Winside and Wayne battled the flames in an attempt to save something but finally so much was already burned the fire was allowed to burn itself out with firemen staying on duty to make sure sparks did not endanger any other structures in the town.

Wylies were able to get a lot of their household furnishings, clothing and Christmas gifts out with the aid of neighbors, firemen and other volunteers. However, Wylie said they lost more of their belongings than they saved.

Apparently the fire had been underway a short time before it was discovered. Burning inside the walls, it was extremely hard to control and just when firemen seemed to have one area controlled the smoke and flames from another spot would indicate the blaze was still in charge.

Second floor items belonging to a Wisner couple who were married that day, were destroyed. Everything came crashing down as the floor gave way but by that time all hope for saving anything had been long gone.

Smoke billowed above the house so it could be seen for miles. From some directions fire appeared to be at the grade school as the Wylie home was just across the street.

A Pierce trucker, Joseph Dolesh, paid \$330 in fines and \$5 in court costs Friday. Judge David J. Hamer heard the case with charges being brought by H. Johnson, state scale operator.

Four charges were brought against the trucker. The counts were: failure to display registration; overweight load; overweight on capacity plates; and fictitious numbers plate.

A plea of guilty was entered. Dolesh was fined \$50 on the charge of failing to display registration and \$100 each on the three other counts.

No Pay to Good Neighbor For Daily Kind Activities

Wayne's "good neighbor" Dave Theophilus, has been cited again for his unselfish deeds worth thousands for which he will take no pay. WOW-Radio in Omaha chose him as the area "good neighbor of the day" Friday.

Every morning seven days a week Theophilus goes to the Wayne hospital where he shaves four to eleven male patients. Once he was urged to forget Sundays but he said, "That's the day almost everyone has company. They'll want to look their best." Even the most religious would not expect the Lord to frown on such Sabbath work.

An idea of what his service is worth can be figured out by considering the lowest number of patients, four. If he gave just four shaves a day that would be 1460 a year. At a dollar each, those shaves are worth \$1460. But he usually shaves more so his services are worth much more, especially to his "patrons."

One man has been receiving free shaves for 21 years. Another patient admitted he had not had a shave in a month—shaves like this are always a bit rougher but Theophilus has an electric shaver provided by the hospital auxiliary and is always ready for the toughest beards and the most tender skins.

For Mrs. Theophilus there is a sacrifice, too. When she needs her husband for help in the yard or home, he's gone, most often to the hospital. So, she manages without him, knowing how much the patients appreciate his work and how long it takes. Besides, her husband has to say a cheery word to other patients while he's there. "Even the women?" she was asked. "Sure, they need cheering up, too," she replied.

Who is this man recognized for removing beards at a season when the man with the beard is so prominent? Is he an ex-barber or even an amateur barber?

Theophilus is neither. He is a retired lumberman who at 78 (in February) still enjoys helping others. Born at Powell, S.D., he worked for Fullerton Lumber Co. at Carroll before coming to Wayne 23 years ago. He has also worked in yards at Randolph and Sholes as well as in Iowa towns. 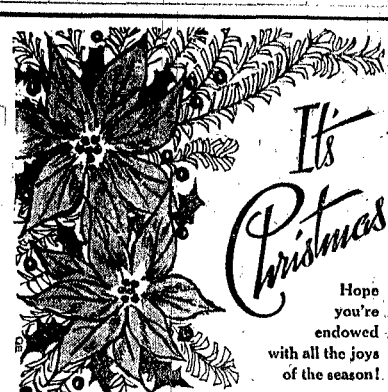
The Hastings squad also named three Kearney players, three Nebraska Wesleyan and one Peru. Wayne's win over Hastings fol-
