

And all meadows with the clover blossoms and butterflies thereon; the woods with their appurtenances, the squirrels and the birds and the echo of the stream's noises and all the distant places which may be visited, together with the adventures there found. And I give to said boys each his own place at the fireside at night with all the pictures that may be seen in the burning wood ... to enjoy without let or hindrance of care.

ITEM To young men, jointly, I devise and bequeath all boisterous

inspiring sport and rivalry, and I give to them the disdain of weakness and undounted confidence in their own strength. Though they are rude, I leave to² them the power to make lasting friendship, and of possessing companions, and to them exclusively, I give all merry songs and grave choruses to sing with lusty voices.
