





Power at the Top

The proposal that a portion of fed-al income tax revenues be returned The proposal that a portion of red-eral income tax revenues be returned to the states, so that they can do need-ed things for themselves instead of hav-ing to look to Washington for help, isn't likely to get anywhere in the fore-seeable future. It is a highly complex and controversial matter.

But the mere fact that so revolutionary an idea is urged by responsible peo-ple is in itself a biting commentary on what has happened to the American system of government.

system of government.

The founding fathers established a central government of severely limited powers. It was to do what only a central government could adequately do, such as to provide for the national defense. The states and local governments were strong and independent entities, entrusted to meet the varying wants, needs and problems of their populations.

The formal structure of state and local government remains. But the foundation has been largely whittled away by legislative acts, by administrative decisons, and by judicial interpretations. In more and more areas of our national life, Washington calls the tune, and all must dange to it. must dance to it.

must dance to it.

This is costly in dollars — the vast administrative -bureaucracy must be paid. It is costly in a more important coin — that of diminished or destroyed state and local rights, obligations, responsibilities, and power of decision. Unless a halt is called, the end result can only be a federal welfare state in which the individual is only a number and all power is concentrated at the top.

Sales of tickets to the invitation-only inaugural balls and the inaugural concert account for most of the figures on the credit side of the ledger. In addition, inauguration medals are sold, as well as souvenir programs and a post-inaugural inard-cover book depicting the event. About 50,000 reviewing stand seats along the parade route bring in some money, too, at rates ranging from \$3 to \$10. While many things surfunding the hanaguration cost the viewer money, anyone can witness the oath taking ceremony at the Capitol, and the parade, free of charge—if he can find standing room.

The 1965 inauguration is figured to be the most costy in history, the total outlay being estimated at more than \$1.5 million. This is about \$400,000 more than was expended for the 1961 event.
