

Why a High School?

Editor's note: In the following article, members of the Board of Education answer the question, "Why a high school for District 17 at this time?"

LYNN ROBERTS, President: Our school board has spent many months studying all the plans we thought might solve our building problem.

DEAN SCHRAM: I believe we should build a new senior high school rather than any other type building.

I think I have been reminded of our crowded condition in high school over the past few years as much as anyone.

It seems only logical that a building built in 1908 for about one-half as many students should be replaced to keep up with the changing times.

The wheels of progress roll forward only; let's keep the school system going in the same direction.

DON ECHTENKAMP: The present high school building is very short of space and in most departments unable to meet the needs of our instructional program.

A new senior high school building would allow the junior high program to be housed in our present building.

DOROTHY LEY: One of the benefits of the democratic process is the sifting and refining of ideas as a group searches for a solution to a problem.

Along the way in this investigation we, of course, considered many plans. We visited several communities which had attempted to solve their problems by adding on to their original building.

I think we have to keep before us the answer to the question, "What is a building for?"

A wise woman I knew as a child had a saying I think appropriate to our venture. She would comment: "You can get economical in the wrong places, and it turns out to be pretty expensive in the long pull."

Why build a high school? The answer is quite simple in my opinion. Without a new high school we cannot offer quality education in Wayne.

Not only is a new high school the most educationally sound decision, but it is also, in my judgment, the only economically sound decision we can make.

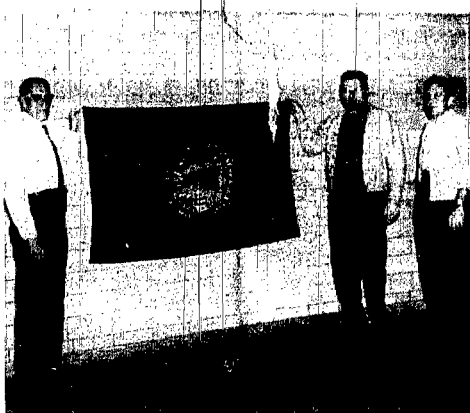

1965 Feed Grain Program Announced by ASC Office

Farmers taking part in the 1965 feed grain program may get the top rate of payment on the entire acreage diverted into conserving uses if they sign up and actually divert at least 40% of the farm's feed grain base.

The key figures for estimating diverted acres and diversion payments are 20, 40, and 50, the Chairman explained.

If the grower signs up and diverts only the minimum acreage, his diversion payment will be figured at the lower rate—one-fifth of the county's total price-support rate.

If the grower diverts between 20 and 40% of his base, the lower rate applies to the minimum diversion and the higher rate to the balance diverted.

But if the grower signs up and actually diverts at least 40% of the base, the higher rate will apply to the entire acreage diverted.

Cuban Exile Tells of Tyranny In Castro's 'Suffering Country'

A distinguished Cuban who exiled himself to the United States, leaving everything "to gain liberty," told Wayne Kiwanians the plight of his native land Monday.

Dr. Aristides Sosa, one-time secretary of defense, Army major general, lawyer, author, professor, spoke passionately of Castro's tyranny over Cuba, a tyranny which impelled him to flee in 1961.

He went to Colombia for a year, then to the U. S., while his two sons, Aristides and Rafael, came directly to the States. Rafael, now on the Wayne State faculty, teaching Spanish, translated his father's speech for the Kiwanians.

The other brother also taught at WSC during a summer session two years ago and now teaches at Kearney State.

Their father is following them into the teaching profession because his 30 years of law practice in Cuba does not easily transfer into the different legal system used in this country.

Frequently in his talk here, Dr. Sosa referred to "my suffering country," where, he said, "Man is a slave... there is no privacy, not even in one's own home, and children are taught to hate religion."

They also are tricked into spying on their own families, he said. Teachers show their pupils pictures of various weapons and ask if they have seen such weapons at home.

The greatest peril to Cuba, Dr. Sosa declared, lies in the communist education of the children, who cannot be re-educated.

A majority of Cubans do not want this tyranny, but can do nothing to overthrow it, under the armed domination of the state, he said.

Dr. Sosa's varied career, in addition to his position in the Army, has included establishment of Cuba's rural school system, publication of numerous books, university teaching, and during World War II serving as secretary of defense.

He said he left Cuba on the pretext of making a short trip to consult a legal client in Colombia — and never returned.

Meanwhile, Dr. Sosa is preparing to teach in the Midwest which he called "the part of America I like best."

As a school board member I am conscious of my obligation to two groups: the children of this community and the taxpayers of District 17. I am convinced that the interests of both will be served best "in the long pull" with a new senior high school.

DEAN PIERSON: Why a high school? I can assure you that I have asked this question of myself many times before I was sure that a new high school was needed for Wayne.

MORRIS SANDAHL: Everyone is aware of the crowded condition of our school system at present and everyone realizes that something must be done in the way of a building program since we are going to lose the use of the Hahn college building in another year.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

"Service with a Snarl"

"The U. S. housewife who comes home from a hard day's shopping complaining of the rudeness of sales clerks might sing a different tune if she had ever visited Russia."

Thus states *Nesweek* in a brief article aptly entitled "Service With A Snarl". It seems that in Russia — where the state owns and runs practically everything — discourtesy and indifference have long been the order of the day in the stores. The government is now attempting to do something to correct this, in order to spur the sales of goods. However, no one expects that much success will come from the effort.

Nesweek quotes a disgruntled shopper as saying, "As long as we have party members and not real sales clerks be-

hind the counters, we'll never get good service."

Here is one more of the innumerable examples that can be cited of the difference between a totalitarian system and free lance system. In the former, there is no competition in any real meaning of the word. The customer is always in the position of having to like it or lump it. On every hand, he is faced with an entrenched and immovable bureaucracy, backed by an all-powerful state.

In a free system, to the contrary — and American retailing in all its branches and kinds, from the biggest chain to the smallest independent is a prime example of that system — the customer is king. Competition sees to that. And, because of competition, the discourteous clerk is not long tolerated, for management knows that competent, pleasant and helpful personnel are essential to obtaining and keeping customers.

Capital News Sens. Carpenter and Marvel Blast University of Nebraska

LINCOLN — A hodgepodge of legislation has been dumped in the 1965 State Legislature as the lawmakers search for ways to improve something for just about everyone.

Surprisingly, though, there has been little open fighting among the senators. Most of the barbed words to date have been aimed at those outside the legislative family, including the University of Nebraska and the State Education Department.

Sens. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, and Richard D. Marvel, Hastings, have both criticized the University. Carpenter blasted the school for proposing a long-range bond issue backed by student fees for a multi-million dollar building program. Marvel admonished the school for failing to provide his committee with necessary fiscal data on time.

Sen. Fern Hubbard Orme, Lincoln, defended the University. She urged the lawmakers not to jump to hasty conclusions regarding the school's capital improvement plans.

Most senators did not express opinions on the University's plans. They said further details must be supplied before any basis for comment can be established.

Already committees of the Legislature have killed some controversial bills. Included among those axed were proposals to change the livestock taxation date from Jan. 1 to Feb. 1, and requiring most public officials, elected and appointed, to disclose their substantial business interests.

One major taxation measure has been advanced to the floor for full debate by all legislators. It would increase the state tax on pari-mutual betting at horse races from three to five per cent. Carpenter is the sponsor of the bill, which is opposed by county fair representatives and operators of the six major race tracks in Nebraska.

Sen. Sam Klaver, Omaha, dean of the Legislature with 11 terms under his belt, has opined that the lawmakers could be wasting their time this year.

Klaver said all bills passed by the 75th session might be meaningless unless a new reapportionment plan is adopted first. "I would remind you that this is a de facto body," he told his colleagues. "We should probably concentrate our efforts on passing a reapportionment bill before any other or we could be in real trouble. The bills might not be worth the paper they are written on."

The U. S. District Court has directed the 1965 legislature to redistrict itself on an equal representation basis.

Similar figures for the previous period were 618,900 and 19,800.

Accident Percentage Up
State Safety Patrol Chief Col. Dan J. Casey reports a final summary of 1964 traffic accidents showed a 28 per cent increase in road deaths in Nebraska compared to 1963.

The record 1964 figure was 447, compared with 349 in 1963. The previous record high was 401 in 1962.

Nebraska was one of 44 states to experience increases in traffic deaths last year.

Populous Douglas County was the scene of 58 traffic deaths. Lancaster County, with its metropolitan area of Lincoln and heavy concentration of traffic, recorded 28 fatalities.

Hugo Srb, clerk of the Legislature, said the new policy is aimed at providing out-state citizens with a better opportunity to keep abreast of what's taking place at the Capitol.

"Anybody that really wants to find out about a bill, or what his senator is doing can go to the clerk of the district court in his county and ask," Srb said.

Sweeping Budget Asked

The University of Nebraska believes education is one of the top needs of the state. It has asked for a sweeping \$34.9 million capital construction budget for the next two-year fiscal period which begins July 1, 1965.

Included is a proposed \$21 million long-term bond proposal that would be backed by student fees, but supported indirectly by the State Legislature.

The program embraces improvements on the downtown, agriculture college and medical college campus. Largest project is a \$7.7 million chemical science building. Second in line is a \$3.7 million, 200-bed University Hospital in Omaha.

Legislation will be necessary to effect the bond proposal. One basic act is planned, plus some changes in existing statutes.

Labor Force Declines

Nebraska's overall labor force declined by slightly more than one-half per cent during fiscal 1964, the State Department of Labor reports.

Average unemployment during the same period slumped about five per cent. The unemployed-to-labor force average ratio dropped by one-tenth of one per cent from 3.1 per cent to three per cent.

The department said the increase in non-agricultural jobs failed to keep pace with the reduction in farm employment.

Young Farmers Offered Training

With agriculture becoming more and more technical, added knowledge may make the difference between being able to stay on the farm or having to look for a job in town. Administrators at the University of Nebraska feel they have an obligation to provide such learning opportunities. Among these is a short course being offered by the College of Agriculture in cooperation with the Center for Continuing Education.

The first term of the Midwest Institute for Young Adults will be completed February 5, when the 38 young men attending graduate.

The second term starts Feb. 8 and continues to Apr. 2.

The four main courses offered include:

— The fundamentals of nutrition, feeding and judging of livestock.

— Principles of crop science with emphasis on classification and distribution of crops, how plants grow, plant and soil relationships and soil testing and fertilization practices.

— The basic principles and procedures in the selecting, management, and adjustment of farm tractor engines and electric motors.

— Planning the crop and livestock, farm records, analysis of the farm business, budgeting, land values, purchasing or renting land, leases, agricultural credit, the basic economic principles of farm management and operation.

The courses are taught by University professors. Attending the first session is not a requirement for registering for the second session.

Demand For Outdoor Fun

The most important factor concerning the demand for recreation is the population boom. U. S. population is expected to reach 350 million by the year 2000. That's almost double today's population. To, there will be more young people in the nation in the future. The proportion of those in the 15-24 age bracket, the most active of all, will probably rise from today's 13 per cent to 17 per cent in only the next 12 years. That active group likes plenty of vigorous recreation such as hiking, horseback riding and swimming. Operators of recreation sites will do well to make plans to accommodate young people.

But outdoor recreation will be competing against many other leisure time activities such as music, television, spectator sports or such backyard projects as gardening, lawn working or relaxing in the sun.

As far as the supply of outdoor recreation is concerned, acreage alone is a poor indicator of the number of recreation opportunities available on a given area. Some activities require little land. Running a swimming pool or fish bait enterprise, for example, takes only a couple of acres while a hunting preserve calls for hundreds of acres.

Machinery Costs 1/3 Less
Costs per acre for 13 major kinds of implements ran 37 per cent lower on big farms (280-360 acres) than on small farms (60-100 acres), according to a USDA study in Northwestern Ohio. Furthermore, costs were 27 per cent lower on the big farms than on the medium-sized farms (140-180 acres).

Compared with small farms, tractor costs per acre were 31 per cent lower on the big farms; compared with medium-sized farms, they were 17 per cent lower. Machinery investment was \$77, \$62, and \$53 per acre for the small, medium and large-sized farms, respectively.

Wide use of coin vending machines and the activities of coin collectors have aggravated the United States Mint's problem of keeping supply abreast of demand.

Coinage of domestic coins grew from \$1.6 billion in 1953 to \$3.8 billion in 1963. It is estimated that more than \$4.7 billion will be needed in the coming fiscal year.

During the 1953-1963 period, Treasury figures show coinage of pennies increased 1.4 billion; dimes by 316 million; quarters by \$21 million, and half-dollars by 61 million.

Saving at the rate of \$1,000 each day, it would take nearly 3,000 years to accumulate \$1 billion. This illustrates the magnitude of \$1 billion, and of an annual Federal budget of \$100 billion.

It also shows what your youngsters — and their youngsters — face in paying off a public debt of some \$318 billion.

Food consumption in the United States in 1964 was about one percent above that in 1963, according to the Department of Agriculture. In the year ahead, per person food consumption is expected to continue above the 1964 level, the Department says.

The Commerce Department plans this year to develop standards for car seat safety belts. These standards, according to a Department spokesman, will be tougher than those met by many of the cheaper belts now available. To meet them, many manufacturers will have to either improve their cheaper lines of belts or take them off the market.

Worth remembering: Our national debt today means that every man, woman and child in the country owes \$1,600 which, some day, must be paid. Interest alone annually amounts to more than three times as much as the Federal government spent for all purposes each year from 1926 through 1930.

Furniture Outlook for 1965
Furniture prices are expected to be higher in 1965. The increase could be from 3 to 5% if higher cost of materials and labor are reflected, according to a recent USDA outlook report.

The consumer demand currently is for higher quality merchandise which is another reason for the higher price tag on furniture as well as other items.

A wide choice of styles and sizes of furniture of all kinds is offered by manufacturers and retailers. Provincial, both French and Italian, and early American styles continue to be highly popular, sprinkled this year with designs influenced by Japanese and other oriental styles.

The consumer will find a wide variety of choices in styles, sizes and types of fabrics in higher quality lines. She will also find some innovations through the inclusion of "built-in" features. Such features include a number of useful devices like concealed lighting, electrical outlets, plastic shelf surfacing, the racks and clothes hangers. Some pieces are more highly "engineered" to include electrical appliances such as a compact refrigerator concealed in a French style clothes press.

Families, particularly young couples, in drawing up their long term furniture budget need to consider whether it would be wise to include obvious current novelties not only in furniture but also in other household equipment.

The stepped-up production of furniture is expected to result in some changes in the use of woods during the next few years. Walnut has been the most popular wood for U. S. furniture and at present, consumption is outstripping the new growth of walnut trees. To stretch present supply and to provide time for a planned program the U. S. Commerce department revised the standard on the thickness of wood veneer from 1/28 inch to 1/36 inch. Development of artificial finishes is taking place and effort directed toward improving those now being used.

The wise consumer will read labels carefully or expect reliable information from the retailer.
