As a school board member 1 am conscious of my obligation to two groups: the children of this community and the taxpayers of Dis-trict 17. 1 am convinced that the interests of both will be served best 'in the long pull' with a new school high school. I also believe that the interests of both will be served best if we get underway with all speed as soon as the need is thoroughly discussed and understood by the citizens of this community.

the clitzens of this community. DEAN PIERSON: Why a high school? I can assure you that I have asked this question of myself many times before I was sure that a new high school was needed for Wayne. After several months of study and visitations to other schools by our board, it was not hard to realize our shortcomings on the high school level. The present in-adequate facilities in science, home ec, shop, music, and physical ed-ucation made me realize that our children were not given a fair breakk with competing schools. Comparing notes with the Study Group and Planning Commission further convinced me that if our educa-tional system in Wayne was going to progress, steps were needed immediately to correct our inadequacies.

Inmediately to correct our inadequacies. When I send my children to school, I want them to remain there all day, not to come home at 2:30 because of lack of room. It is said that elementary is to preparb the child to study on the secondary education, our good elementary work has been in vain. If my children elect the science field, home ec, shop, music, or physical advection, I want them to be able to attend the school that will afford fhem these facilities, don't you?"

MORRIS SANDAHL: Everyone is aware of the crowded condi of our school system at present and everyone realizes that some g must be done in the way of a building program since we are g to lose the use of the Hahn college building in another year

If we were to replace the Hahn facility with a new elementary building, we would not be solving the problems of a crowded Junior high area and an inadequate, outmoded high school. I think that by building a new schior high school we will be improving every level of our educational, system.

A new sendor high school will provide our students with the room and facilities for a good high school education.
