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Former School Board Members Answer

Why a High School

Editor's Note: In this series of comments by former Wayne school board members, The Herald is continuing to bring to its readers the answer to the question "Why a High School?"

ED SEYMOUR: The school board is on the right track. We need a new high school, and we have needed it for a long time. In my opinion the high school is the most important area.

ALBERT M. KERN: At the time of building our present elementary building, we on the school board realized it was but a temporary measure.

LOYD JENSEN: To continue giving our children a high quality of education, it is essential that we provide classroom space.

DR. WALTER BENTHACK: The present high school building was built in 1908 and remodeled at the end of the Great Depression.

We now have over two times as many high school students as in 1957. One hundred twenty of these come from outlying districts which takes in practically all of the potential high school students in our geographical attendance area.

The Junior High and lower grades potential enrollment is different. It could markedly increase should some or all of the outlying districts in time wish to join District 17.

We are fortunate to have an enrollment of 407, a good sized student body in our Senior High without which a broad program is impossible.

The present School Board members and their predecessors for a number of years have given much time and study to the educational needs of this community.

JIM HEIN: I am in favor of the school bond proposal. The past several years enrollment has been on a steady increase both nationally and locally.

REV. ROBERT E. SHIRCK: A basic prerequisite for a working Democracy, such as ours, is an educational system concerned with both quantity and quality.

It seems to me, that the high percentage of people who are enrolled in the public school system, or have already completed their secondary education, and the ever-increasing student enrollment in the universities, colleges and trade schools, indicates that to a great extent the democratic requisite of quantity is largely met.

A superior school of a few years ago — without change — is today an inferior educational facility. The problem of offering a quality education is more difficult to meet than the problem of reaching a larger number of students.

Tuberculosis Skin Tests Are Offered

A tuberculosis skin test program on a statewide level will be held Tuesday, Feb. 9, Wayne county freshmen and seniors will be offered the testing by the Wayne County Tuberculosis association.

Doctors of the county will offer their services and the entire testing project will be offered free of charge. Tests will be given at Wayne high in the morning and at Winside high in the afternoon.

Mrs. Robert Benthack is county chairman and Mrs. Arnold Maurer is county TB nurse.

Parents are being sent letters describing the tests and are asked to sign and return them to indicate permission for their youngsters to have the tests. Reprints of an article on the mounting threat of TB taken from Kiwanis and Reader's Digest articles are also being sent each parent involved.

After 12 years of declining, the disease is now increasing in some areas. Around 35 million Americans have been infected at one time or another with TB bacilli.

Tuberculosis is not the killer it once was. TB associations plan to keep that way through the detection skin testing program. In its third year here, the project is aimed at testing everyone eventually.

The proposed building of a new high school in Wayne proves the Wayne city school boards have made serious mistakes in the past and will make mistakes in the future. Their attitude is "soak the property owner." It is easier that way, to cover up mistakes. A few years back Wayne had a mill levy of 18 mills to operate its city school. They had all kinds of room for their classes. Now that the mill levy is 35 mills or over, there isn't any room. Where were the mistakes made? One mistake made was sitting back and letting surrounding towns gobble up county districts that should be in the Wayne city district. Not getting the college to give up prep school 10 years ago was another mistake. A much higher mill levy than present will keep lower income residents from owning their own homes. They just barely exist on their below-the-cost-of-living wages. Building the egg corporation in a rural school district means that the city owners don't care what kind of school the city has. If it was too expensive to have the egg corporation in the city school district, then just what are farmers doing there? Isn't it just as expensive for farmers? If Wayne has to build a new high school, the planning should be to retire it in 25 or 30 years so the mill levy would be raised very little. Wayne should build practical building facilities and not try to outdo another town. It should be built close to the college and the college should be willing to let the high school use the college library facilities and the auditorium and gym. ## FHA Planning Wayne Office

Heasty Reesman State Director for the Farmers Home Administration, has announced a full time office is to be opened in Wayne soon. For the past several years Wayne county has been served on a sub-office basis from the Hartington unit. The new office will be located in the new Professional Building, just east of the Morrison hotel.

Thomas Lambert will continue to serve both Cedar and Wayne counties as county supervisor. As soon as a replacement is available he plans to move to Wayne.

Cleyce Heistand assumed duties as County Office Clerk Feb. 1. He has been employed in the FHA office in Ponca for the past few months and moved his family to Wayne about two weeks ago from Woodbine, Ia.

Office days will be Wednesday afternoons. As soon as a replacement is available in Hartington, it is planned that Stanton county will be served on a sub-office basis from the Wayne unit.

Farmers Home Administration is an agency of the USDA. Primary functions are to provide needed credit for family-size farmers and rural residents for housing purposes unable to obtain credit from other lenders. The loans to farmers can be made for all types of agricultural purposes, including the purchase of family-size farms. Association loans are also available to rural residents for soil and water purposes and shifts in land use.

FHA recently assumed another responsibility, providing long term loans up to \$2500 to enable farmers and rural residents with limited income and limited resources to buy land, purchase necessary equipment or livestock and pay current operating expenses, and to finance non-farm enterprises. These loans cannot be made to refinance debts. One of the first of these Economic Opportunity loans was made to modernize and equip a small shoe repair shop in Hartington. The economic opportunity loans will not be made if an applicant's credit needs can be met with the previously existing FHA loans.

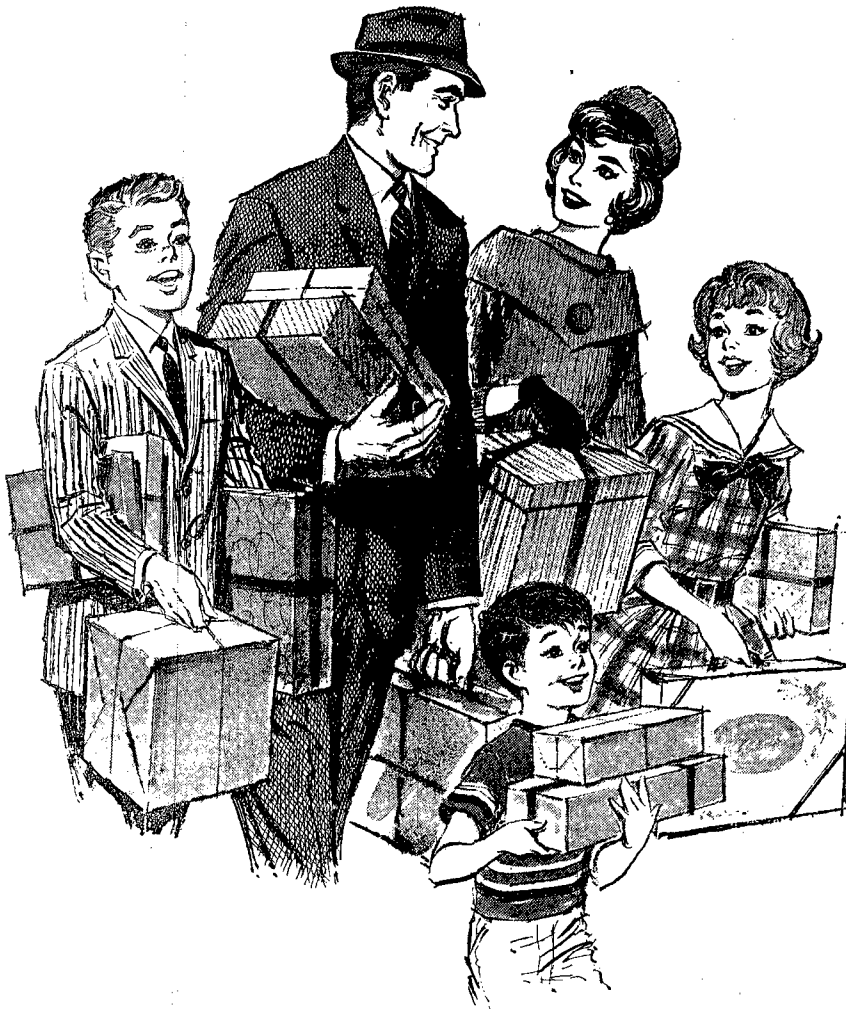

**Farm Short Courses Scheduled in Febr.**

The second group of farmer short courses for Cedar, Dixon, Dakota, Thurston and Wayne counties will begin during the first week of February. Farmers should contact their County Extension Agent immediately if they want to be enrolled in one or more of the following short courses:

**Swine:** Feb. 2, 4, 9, 11, 16, 18 at Oberlin and Feb. 3, 5, 10, 12, 17, 19 at Emerson. The following staff members from the University of Nebraska will provide information in economics, nutrition, breeding, disease, and engineering: Dr. Leo Lucas, E. A. Olson, Crosby Howe, Oscar Thomas and Hugo Zimmerman.

**Beef Feeding and Management:** Feb. 5, 9, 12, 16 at Pender. This short course will be about economics, nutrition, equipment and management. Dr. Paul Guyer, Mike Nussbaum and Robert Perry will provide the information.

To date, over 140 farmers in the Northeast Extension Area have completed short courses in Dairy, Corn and Sorghum Production, and Soil Fertility. Farmers who have attended these short courses have been able to learn in depth more about specific enterprises in their farm business.

**NSLI Now Available To Army Veterans**

Nebraska veterans interested in the new law reopening National Service Life Insurance may obtain a "general information" sheet at the Veterans Administration Regional Office, Lincoln, Neb.

Edward P. Onstot, VA Regional office manager, said this printing sheet gives a general outline of what the law provides, what the veteran must do, and concludes on the reverse side with sample tables of monthly premium rates. A copy of this sheet may be obtained in person or by writing or telephoning the Contact Office at the VA Regional office, 220 South 17th St., Lincoln.

Onstot reminded veterans, however, that no application can be made for the insurance until May 1, 1965. This date for reopening is set by law. He gave this brief resume of key facts which interested veterans should know:

Veterans are eligible if: (a) They were originally eligible for NSLI between Oct. 8, 1940 and Jan. 1, 1957; (b) They now have no GI insurance or less than \$10,000 in coverage; (c) They have service-connected disabilities and regardless of degree they meet standards of good health or are prevented by their service-connected disabilities alone from meeting standards of good health; and (d) They had on or before Oct. 13, 1964, non-service-connected disabilities which are sufficient to prevent them from buying commercial insurance at the highest rates.

**Accelerate Maturity Dates on Soybeans**

The USDA today announced acceleration of maturity date on 1963-crop farm-stored soybeans now under reserve price-support loan.

This action is being taken to help insure a stable flow of soybeans to market to cover demand during the current period when market prices are well above the level permitting profitable redemption of loans by producers.

Market prices recently have been the highest in several years reflecting strong demand and need for ample supply of soybeans in commercial channels to realize high level of estimated 1964-65 disappearance.

This department also announced that in view of the market outlook, a resale program will not be offered on 1964-crop soybeans placed under price-support loan. These loans will mature July 31, 1965.

Approximately 8,647,000 bushels soybeans from the 1963 crop under resale on farms as of Nov. 30 mainly in midwestern states, will be affected by the earlier maturity dates.

No repayments or deliveries may be delayed beyond Feb. 15, 1965 on the 1963-crop of resold soybeans.

**Variety of Problems Come Before Officers**

Wayne policemen seldom find life dull. In addition to the "routine" accidents, funeral escorts, overparking complaints and "watch our house while we're gone" calls, the officers of the police department have had a variety of other complaints the last two weeks.

An argument ensued but the items were taken from a shopping bag and given to the clerk. The store declined to press charges so no court case came up and no names are used.

Another case involved two teenagers who had been fighting. No charges were filed but one youth did wield a switch-blade knife which the other said had been pulled on him. Again no court case is involved so names are not printed.

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# Former Educator, Former Wayne Resident To Direct University School



## Former Educator, E. J. Huntmer, Dies Sunday

Funeral services for E. J. Huntmer were held Wednesday morning at St. Mary's Cathedral, Grand Island. Huntmer, former member of the Wayne State College faculty and architect of several campus buildings, died Sunday at Grand Island after a lengthy illness.

Survivors include his widow, Claire; a daughter, Mrs. Maurice (Marcella) Lernas, Humphrey, and five grandchildren. A son was killed during World War II while serving with the Navy in the South Pacific.

Huntmer, who was professor of manual training and consulting engineer at the college from 1908 to 1938, charted the design of future campus buildings when he did his first sketches of the present science building, which opened in 1912.

Working with President U. S. Conn, Huntmer envisioned a unity in campus architecture of red face bricks with simplified ornamentation. The first designs for the administration building and the physical/industrial building were done by Prof. Huntmer, as well as the island of the Willow Bowl, originally designed as a sunken garden.

A man of many activities, Huntmer also coached Wayne State's first basketball teams, in 1912 and 1913 (winning 13 and losing 1 in the two seasons.) He was a 1910 graduate of Stout Institute and a 1933 bachelor's degree graduate of Wayne.

Huntmer last visited the campus in 1961 and later wrote "President Brandenburg of his enthusiasm over campus developments. In recent years he had been associated with a Grand Island architectural firm.
