A school is teachers, who want to share what they know, who exult in sec-ing a personality develop --- not the mind alone, but the total personality.

A school is parents, you and me, Dad and Mom and Grandad and Grandmom, too, who see that educa-tion, next to a vital religious faith is the most important value they can pay for and work for as they see their offspring grow in mind, spirit, and body.

body. A school is something to learn, Yes, ve want our children to learn what it means to be responsible citizens, lo move from being dependent upon us, to be-coming self-sufficient, reliable, and cap-able. We want them to do the best theorem

able, We want them to do the best they can, to understand the world around them, the people in it, and the forces that move people in it, and the forces that move people. We want them to be able to get along with people, to give to people, to need people in a creative balance. We want them to learn all these things and more. A school is a building. Certainly it is that. It is obvious that many children require bigger or a greater number of buildings. But what kind of building is it going to be? A building that represents our world? Our ideas? Our yalwa? Our goals? Is it a building that will say education is a joy, a happy experience? What will it teach? Every building does you know. A building that will say education is a a dwat we think and believe. Do we have a vision? Are we afraid to look into the future? Is the world something we are afraid of? Do we keep our buildings up to date? Are they filled with equipment that lifts the mind and the taient or deadens it? Yes, our school buildings teach. Most of all they teach our child about ourselves, whether the high ideals we spout fith our lips are really a part of our very personality, and whether we are willing to match dollars with ideals.

If a building is properly insu-lated and vented but the fan just doesn't seem to be moving air the way it should, you need to check it regularly to keep all parts clean and oper-ating properly he said. The things to do, include: 1. Clean the fan. Fan blades covered with dirt deliver 30 per cent less air than clean ones and 2. Clean and oil (ift necessary) the motor. A coating of dust special electric motor oil--but special electric motor oil-but sparingly. 3. Clean grills, screens, filters and shutters. Feed dust can clog them and the problem can be increased in winter when moisture freezes on exhaust ducts and grills.




