Suddenly you see there is also another vehicle, a tractor without lights going the same way you are. Maybe you have time to stop and maybe you don't. Your choices are to pull to the left and hope your car doesn't overturn in the borrow pit or go straight ahead and hope the impact is not too great. There's no time to debate; the decision has to be made and acted upon. Farmers can help by making sure their machinery is not on county-roads or highways after dark or leven at dusk or sunrise without lights. Going to a field in full daylight and quitting before the sun goes down might lose time but could save lives. If farmers are going up a hill, they

sun goes down might lose time but could save lives. If farmers are going up a hill, they should glance back to see if a vehicle is coming in their lane and could catch up with them over the crest of the hill. If it's possible they could, the farmer should pull off the road over the crest to give the driver a chance to miss him or should stop before he reaches the crest of the hill so he knows he will be seen in time. Motorists will have to realize every hill is a hazard. It may be hard to re-member this every time you come to one of the county's numerous hills. Fillows can and should be laundered. The methed of laun-dry will vary with the type of pillow filling. It's best to remove the filler and place it in a loose-ly woven bag or liner and stitch it shut. Most licking is so close-ly woven that it keeps suds and water from circulating. Feather, down, arcitan, Dacron and Orlon pillows can be vashed in the machines. For best results launder two pillows at the same time or add turkish towels to bal-ance the load. Pillows tend to float, therefore they should be turned several times during the washing period. Most pillows need only a two to five minute washing. Thorough rinsing is important. 
