His clientele is limited but he is willing to take on any assignment calling for use of his artistic ability. In spite of the fact he is just in the eighth grade, he has already made inquiries about college or art school training.

His artistic talent came out in the open a few weeks ago when a friend decided he didn't like a plain sweatshirt and asked Steve to paint a picture on his. That one no sooner appeared than others wanted pictures on their sweatshirts too.

Since then around 25 sweatshirts have been painted in all sorts of colors. Some are painted on the front only, some on the back only and some on front and back.

Steve's work had previously been limited pretty much to the drawing all young people do in school although he knew he liked to draw. He has painted posters and billboards since and is willing to take on assignments large and small.

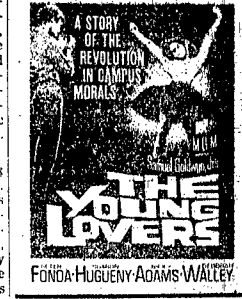
Preceding him in death was his father May 8, 1964.

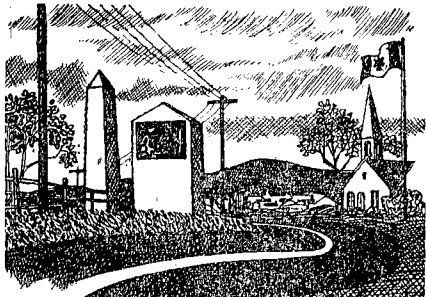
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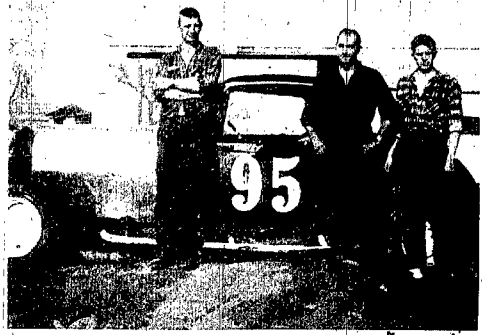
The Great Wall around China—traditional symbol of contention between nations.

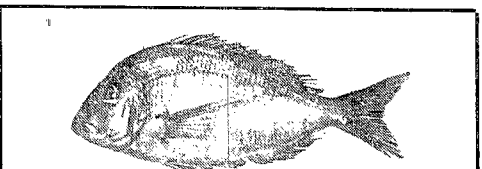

Wayne's "Dog Pound Hilton," the ultimate in accommodations for dogs, has been remodeled and is now ready for pickups—dogs picked up, that is. The cleaning and repainting work has been completed.

Chief of Police Garth Dawson reports. Officer Scott Thompson, at whose place the accommodations for dogs are located, has painted them. He also took them in for a complete steam cleaning and disinfecting to insure the utmost in sanitation.

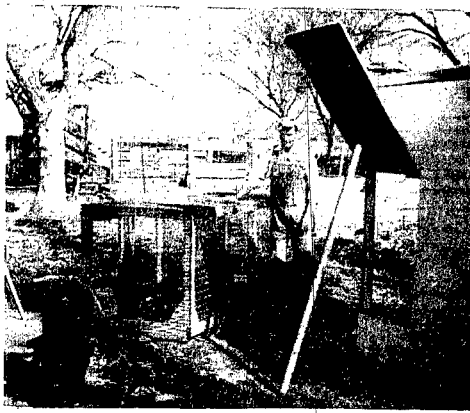

Business matters included appreciation for The Wayne Herald's newspaper coverage of Holy Week, Good Friday and Easter, reference to The Herald's editorial of Apr. 22, ministerial representation on the Chamber of Commerce, college census cards, membership fees, constitutional revisions and other matters.

The following item by Rev. Richard Burgess, Laurel, concerned advertisements opposed to a fair housing bill. Each minister will personally do as he wishes about the matter concerning presentation of the matter to congregations.

Entitled, "Is Selma, Ala., Any Different than Here?" the article by Rev. Burgess reads as follows: "We deplore American citizens being deprived of civil rights when it happens somewhere else. But what do we say when the shoe fits here at home? The April 8, 1965, issue of the Morning Shopper carried an ad attacking LB-661, a Fair Housing bill pending in the Nebraska State legislature.

"The discrimination most resented by Nebraska Negroes is the denial of opportunity to secure residence on the basis of their desire and ability. The governor's Commission on Human Rights has prepared this Bill No. 661 to forbid discrimination in housing. Christian leaders in our state are backing this bill. It is morally right.

"Some real estate brokers oppose it. They say that this bill will take away from the property owner his right to sell to the person of his choice. That's false: unless you are a racial bigot, and then we would have the answer to the question in the title above.

"This bill means that if you want to buy a home, you won't have to prove that your ancestors were Anglo-Saxon, or that you are a Roman Catholic, before you would be permitted to buy it. If it is wrong to discriminate against you for any reason, then it is also wrong to discriminate against others for similar reasons."

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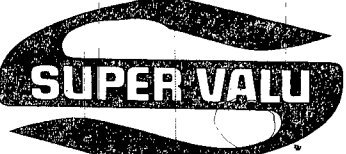
Two Will Attend Meeting
