Four Injured in Accident North of Winside Thursday

Four area young people were injured, none seriously, in a two-vehicle collision at the intersection of Highways 98 and 35 four miles north of Winside at 1:45 a.m. Thursday, May 27.

Most seriously injured was Sherry Glistler, Wayne, who suffered a broken right ankle, cuts and bruises, possible back and other injuries. She was hospitalized in Wayne following the mishap.

Dwain Longe, Wayne, driver of one vehicle, was hospitalized with cuts and bruises. Alan Johnson, Wakefield, and Glenda Meyer, Wayne, were dismissed after being treated for cuts and bruises.

According to Trooper Marvin Adams of the Nebraska State patrol, the mishap occurred when Longe, eastbound on Highway 98, failed to stop at the junction. Raymond Heck, Sioux City, was driving a 1965 mail truck west and was making a left turn when the front of his vehicle was struck by the Longe car.

Longe's car rolled over and came to a stop on its wheels in the borrow pit on the south side of the road. Heck's vehicle was heavily damaged but the driver was uninjured.

The local youth was scheduled to appear in court Wednesday of this week on charges arising from the collision. Sheriff Don Weible, who assisted Adams with the investigation, was scheduled to attend along with the patrolman.

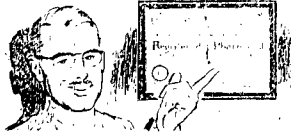

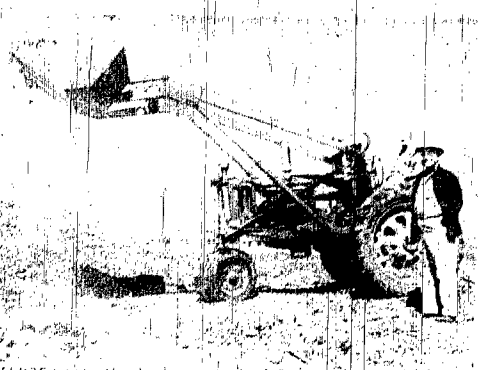

Piles of Cobs on Farms Could Some Day Be in Milady's Hose or Father's Steak

When do the piles of cobs on farms disappear? Some call the cobs a "dinosaur" steak which is used for making hot dogs.

A Milady's man operates the Kirsch Cob Co. While it is not a glamorous, sounding name, the end result could be more glamour for milady's legs or a more glamorous steak for dad's dinner.

The cobs and sons, Doug and Greg, of the cob company the year around. They have hauled as many as 10 tons of cobs in one day and a night as it is, that's a lot of cobs.

The cobs process the cobs, clean them, but had them to others who are good cobs go to cattle feeders and add minerals and other essential to make a good cut of meat with the same protein content as a steakh. Cattle feed this to the animals and wind up as the hamburger.

Australian Youth Student at WSC

An Australian who has been a naval officer, teacher, and student, and has met some of the world's prominent personalities now is a student again at Wayne State College.

Attracted by Wayne's trimester third term, where he can hurry on to degree sometime next year, Steve Ferrier says, "It's about time I earned a degree." This seems paradoxical, coming from one who has traveled much of the world as a sailor and a student.

He joined the Australian Navy at the age of 14, spent four years at the Australian Naval academy, six months cruising the South Pacific, then attended Dartmouth Naval college in England, the equivalent of our Annapolis and the alma mater of the Duke of Edinburgh.

Ferrier's education at Dartmouth included cruises which took him to numerous interesting ports. Among others, he visited the Spanish Naval academy where he met Prince Juan Carlos. During one summer vacation he toured East Berlin. He also spent four days at Westminster Abbey in London, by arrangement of his roommate's uncle, Sir William Mackie, organist at the abbey.

After graduation from Dartmouth, Ferrier returned to Australia for further naval training and later became an electrical officer on a carrier.

Leaving the navy, he taught mathematics in Brisbane for a time, then decided to travel again on his own. He sailed for Greece, spent Christmas on the Isle of Ithaca, home of the legendary Ulysses, visited Egypt and journeyed on to Canada, where he enrolled in the largest French university, the University of Laval, Quebec.

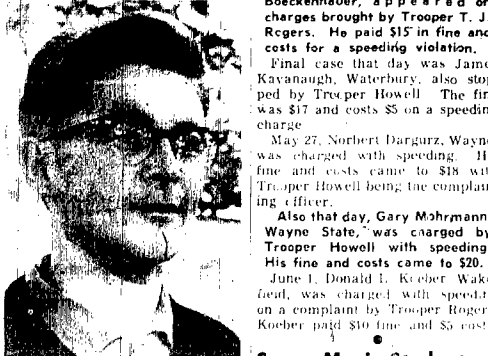
His course of studies included Latin, French and philosophy ("I seemed to be forever in the language lab"). But the language emphasis enabled him to teach English at the well-known Berlitz school.

America beckoned for further education and he landed at Wayne State—because it seemed most attractive among the trimester colleges where he could enroll at this time of year. Before coming here, however, Ferrier indulged in a different type of education, going on a coast-to-coast tour available to foreign students.

He finds the Wayne area much like his native Australia, the western part of it, that is, except that Australia, being in the southern hemisphere, has reversed seasons. Its mild climate—not so far south as Nebraska is north—permits outdoor activities the year around. The beach is popular much of the year.

College life, he reports, is more demanding in Australia because of the competition. There are fewer colleges, all of them state operated because the law does not permit private colleges. The demand for higher education, however, is encouraging the development of new colleges and the broadening of some existing schools (engineering, technical and agricultural, to grant degrees).

Although he has seen many of the world's loveliest scenes, Ferrier naturally holds Australia in special favor. To Americans who

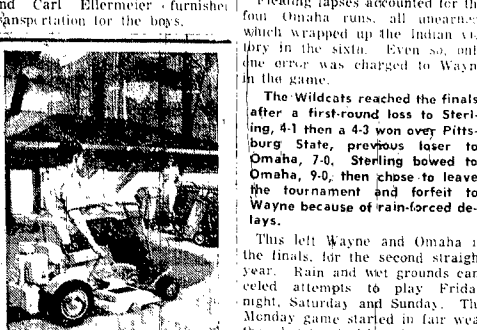

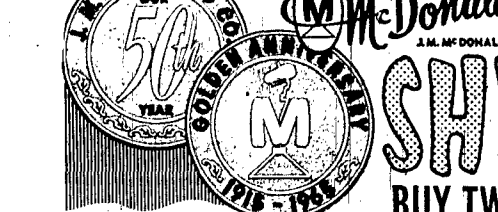
Wayne State All-Sport Conference Champion

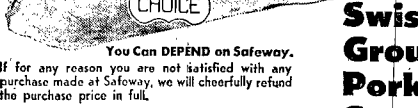

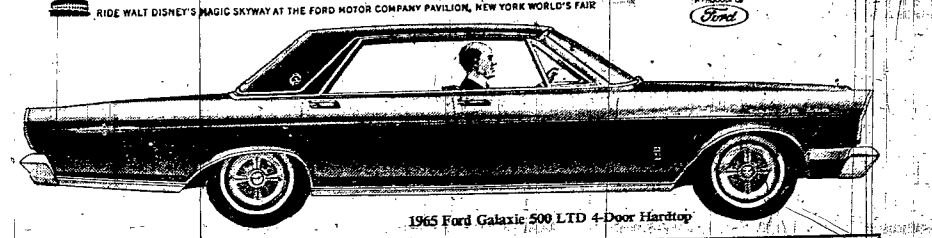

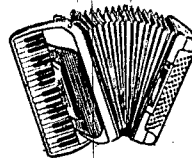
Women of Winside Plan Two Jubilee Projects
