Tis the Season For Strawberries Sweet, juicy, fresh strawberries are in the peak of supply. Although the scarlet colored berries can be flound falmost any time of year, shoppers should see more and more in feed stores through June. May and June are considered peak months for

dark and the caps should still be on.

In contrast, smart shoppers will avoid dult, lusterless, shrunken, soft or wet berries. A stained box is a tipoff to such overripe berries as these.

Size has no relation to flavor or other goodness of strawberries. While large berries sometimes are desired for "looks," consumers should remember that a box holds fewer of these than smaller sizes | Also, some large varieties have white centers; others are hollow!

Since strawberries lare very perishable, they should be used within a day of two of purchase. Store berries unwashed in the refrigerator or other cool place.




