

## Kiwanians and Jaycees to Hold Vehicle Safety Check

Working together for the safety of the city, the Wayne Kiwanis club and Wayne Jaycees are co-sponsoring a two-day vehicle safety check on a basis set up for similar checks throughout the nation. Sunday, June 20, and Sunday, June 27, have been set for the checks.

Plans call for Kiwanians and Jaycees to be at the Sav-Mor Drug-Arnie's parking lot from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. each of those Sundays to give ten-point checks to vehicles. Everyone in the area is invited and even those just passing through town will be welcome.

Safety lanes will be set up for checking ten points. Brakes, all lights (front and rear), steering, tires, seat belts, exhaust system, glass, windshield wipers, mirrors and horn.

After passing all tests will get blue safety check stickers. Those that do not pass can have the faults remedied and be brought back for another check and a possible safety sticker.

This check is not made through the police department so no tickets will be given where defects are found. It is set up solely for the purpose of making sure everything is in working order before needed. Accidents can be prevented in this way. The Wayne police have offered to help direct traffic those two days but otherwise it will be a Jaycee-Kiwanis project.

The nation's auto industry, safety groups, Association of State Safety Coordinators and Look magazine are sponsoring the check-ups. Locally the two organizations are represented by Larry Westerman of the Jaycees and Alan Cramer of the Kiwanis club as co-chairmen.

A similar safety check was held here several years ago and at that time potential accident causes such as faulty brakes, defective tires, loose steering and other defects were found. It is hoped this check this year will be even more successful.

Further details will be given in next week's paper.

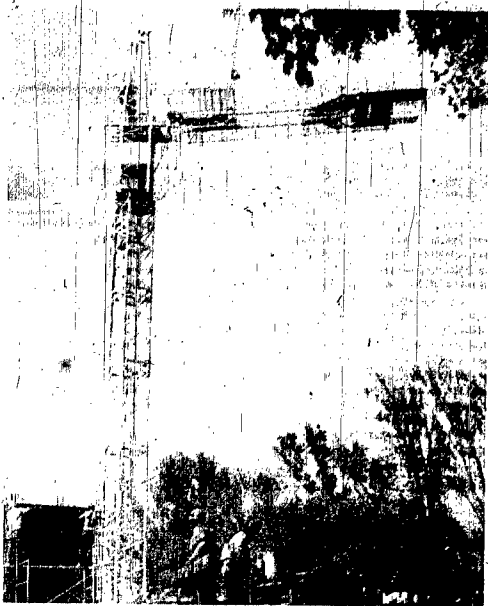

## Betterment Group Gives Wayne Complaints Airing

Meeting Thursday afternoon in the Professional building, the Wayne Community Betterment committee devoted much of its meeting to complaints about the city which might affect the city's chances in the state betterment contest.

Chief of Police Garth Dawson met with the group to give his advice on some of the complaints. He said some are ordinance violations and tickets could be issued to offenders unless the practices cease.

Parking cars on sidewalks was a complaint. It is bad enough that some people drive up on terraces to park but some leave autos blocking sidewalks and risk the danger of being given a ticket.

Burning of garbage is regulated by city ordinance. Anyone burning at times other than those specified may find themselves fined. Leaving garbage cans uncovered can also be an invitation to a police ticket.

Blind corners created by tall shrubs or bushes create a traffic problem. Because of the danger, the city may be asked to do something to make the town a safer place to drive.

Trucks blocking streets, alleys and sidewalks have been a source of annoyance in the city. They are not supposed to block normal traffic patterns of the city, according to ordinances.

Jaywalking was discussed but the solution of this is not in sight; cars parking so as to obscure stop signs pose a hazard and pointing curbs to prevent parking within 20 feet of stop signs has been suggested; an overpass for school children on 7th street was brought up; litter baskets for downtown Wayne were discussed.

On the betterment front also, camping for travelers is provided north of the ball park. Another site was also suggested as a point where the city might make space available for a mobile home parking site. A report on this will be given at next meeting.

### Heads Wayne State Unit

Dr. Lyle Skov is the new president of the Wayne State Education association, local chapter of the Nebraska State Education association. Serving with him in the coming year will be Dr. Harvard McLean as vice president and Mrs. Ruby Pedersen as secretary-treasurer.

An informal meeting of representatives of cities on a north-south line across Eastern Nebraska was held in Fremont Thursday at which time a resolution was passed endorsing a new north-south interstate highway route through the Lincoln and Fremont areas.

The route endorsed enters Nebraska near Chester, angles toward Lincoln and at the capital city turns north to follow a route pretty much east of Highway 77. No specific location was named but a general area to be served was emphasized.

In this area the route would be west of Pender but either east or west of Wakefield. It would go out of the state near Elk Point, S. D., and would serve such cities as West Point, Wayne, Fremont, Wahoo, Wakefield, Pender, Ponca, Scribner, Concord, Dixon, Beatrice and Fairbury.

The general feeling indicated is that this route is competing with two other routes for a north-south interstate designation. One route would be through the Hastings, Grand Island area to St. Paul, Bartlett, O'Neill and Spencer. The other would be from Chester north by way of York, Columbus, Norfolk and Yankton.

Lincoln Chamber of Commerce committees have been working on the idea and praise was generous for the work that group has done. Further action to promote the route for top consideration is anticipated in the future.

No one needs to get too excited, for no north-south interstate work is anticipated until after the east-west route is completed, and that is thought to be seven years away. However, work has to be started now if the route favored is to get the best consideration.

Representatives from most towns involved attended the meeting in an unofficial capacity. Adon Jeffrey, John Einung and Chas Greenlee were Wayne representatives attending.

## School Census for District 17 Begun

The annual school census required by state law is underway in District 17. Supt. Francis Haun reports, Mrs. Julia Haas is in charge of the census which is scheduled to be completed by July 15.

On the basis of the census, the state will apportion the school money. For this reason it is important that everyone in the age group prescribed be counted.

Counted are those who are in the age group from 5 through 21 inclusive. Newcomers are especially important in the count for they can increase the total number counted in apportioning.

## Native of Wayne Gets High Honor

Dr. Robert C. Wright, a native of Wayne, is the new grand president of Pi Delta Epsilon, a national non-professional honorary journalism fraternity.

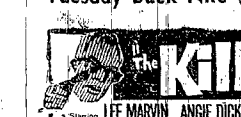

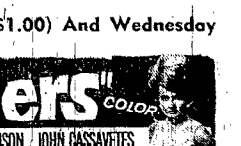

(Continued from page 1) route. Bus transportation for all pupils not living in District 17 will be \$2 a week, double what it was last term. Supt. Francis Haun discussed L.B. 301 which would permit formation of 19 educational service districts in Nebraska. He had met with legislators and representatives of the proposed districts and explained that the units would provide services, such as speech therapy, service for visually and audio handicapped, adult education and other aids now available only in Omaha and Lincoln.

Proposals by the architect were discussed. They concerned changes in the lecture hall and acquisition of land. The architect is to meet with the board Thursday, June 10, at which time the changes will be discussed again and survey reports will be available.

The fiscal agent is preparing forms for a Moody's rating of the bonds of the district. If the rating is secured, the bonds will bring more money to the school fund here.

General funds of the district are now in the State National bank and will be left there two more years. From now on the funds will be transferred every three years from one of the two

Wayne banks to the other. The First National bank is the depository for the school building account.

Other items taken up: Milk bids for school lunches will be called for June 21; the Chamber of Commerce plans a welcome for district and college teachers who are new Sept. 13; the fire department asked for a junior fire patrol program when the first fire drill is held in the fall; and District 72 sent word that it appreciated use of the Carroll facilities when the schoolhouse in that district burned — and that the district would contract elsewhere for schooling next year.

And anyhow, he had no defense to make. They couldn't get a word out of him. So he got strung up. Never would have happened if he'd stayed where he belonged.

## Appeals Still Planned On Latest Redistricting Act

LINCOLN — The Nebraska Legislature has voted against appealing from the Federal District Court decision holding the latest legislative redistricting act invalid.

But the issue is far from settled. Supporters of the appeal movement say they will try again to receive senatorial approval of their proposal. They say some minds may be changed by an unexpected dissenting opinion in the case.

Chief Judge Harvey Johnson of the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals made public his reasons for disagreeing with the May 12 findings of District Judges Robert E. Robinson and Robert Van Pelt.

Johnson said the Legislature did the best job possible without crossing county lines in passing the new redistricting act. He said it should be allowed to stand.

The State Justice Department has advised the lawmakers that the Nebraska Constitution prohibits the crossing of county lines in setting forth new districts.

Judges Robinson and Van Pelt said there is no way the Unicameral can retain its constitutional maximum of 50 senators unless county lines are crossed.

Income Tax Valid  
The State Justice Department has advised the Legislature that it can find no constitutional objection to the proposed state income tax bill.

Sen. Hal Bauer, Lincoln, principal sponsor of the legislation, said he will offer clarifying amendments. He said the bill should be in as near perfect form as possible.

Committee Suggests Hike  
The Budget Committee has recommended an additional \$1.2 million from the state general fund be added to University of Nebraska and the Institutions Department.

Switches Stand  
The Legislature has switched positions and axed a proposal to hike aid to dependent children (ADC) payments an average of 20 per cent.

Numerous Agencies  
Nebraska has some 60 boards, commissions and councils at the state government level. Some have only advisory duties, others wield strong executive and administrative powers.

Carl Curtis

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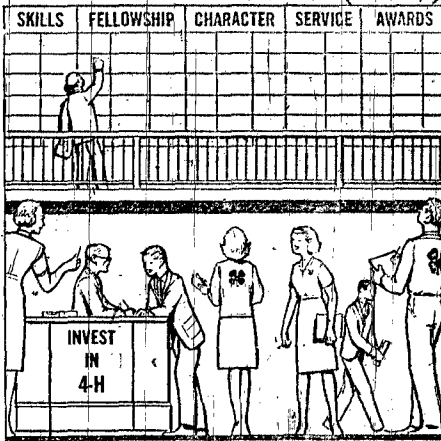

## Carroll's Old Style Crank Telephones, Voices with Smile Will Be Replaced

The old-fashioned crank telephones, and the friendly "voices" of the operators are doomed to be victims of progress. By the end of the year work should be started on a new dial system for the old area.

At present, party-line patrons using people on their own lines with the almost-forgotten "two keys, two phalls" type of ring. Any other calls must go through the operators who are on duty around the clock.

Blair, owner of the exchange, has four senior operators and two chief operators, in Carroll. Two months from other towns served by the company do service work for the exchange.

Mr. Dan Stolz is the employee with the most years of service, having worked for the first as an operator over 12 years. Cora Jenkins is the chief operator and Mrs. Mark Drake and Mrs. Levada Harmon are operators. Mrs. Patty Oswald and Mrs. Lillian Kenny are relief operators.

Lou Paril, Ponca, comes once a week or when called to do service work. If he is not available, Earl McCloskey, Wausa, services the exchange.

The watchboard in Carroll has been in use since about 1902. There are between 275 and 300 subscribers in town and rural lines out of town.

If you ring for the days when an operator was so helpful in locating a place, forest, etc., Federal regulations provide that the operators ring the number called and if no one answers, that's that.

Most people remember operators getting a call, "Dr. Jones just called from the drug store. You can probably catch him there" or "Mrs. Smith is helping out at the grocery store today. I can ring there."

These little assists are taboo. Operators are supposed to act as if they don't even know who is calling who — indicating federal officials just don't know small towns. However, if someone is going to be out of town, the operators do not have to sit there and keep ringing — if informed a person is to be out of town, they

can tell callers that much. When the power goes off, everyone seems to want to make a telephone call. And when the power is off, operators have to crank the numbers so the telephones will ring. Once they had to do this for four hours straight during a major power outage.

Service is offered around the clock in Carroll with the telephone office in the Jenkins home where she is able to take the midnight to 6 a. m. shift. There just aren't too many calls during those hours, most of Carroll's business being transacted from 5 a. m. to 10:30 p. m.

Operators handle local calls, long distance calls and information calls. In addition, they take care of collections when people come in to pay their bills. Considering only one operator is on duty at a time, it can become hectic at times.

Edna Nebraska serves Belton, Bloodfield, Center, Creighton, Crofton, Nebraska, Osmond, Verdigris, Walnut, Wausa, Wymoreton and Carroll in this part of the state. Many of the exchanges are dial and Carroll will be one of the last to make the changeover.

The last stand of the friendly operator is being in Carroll. A year or more this statement can probably be made in the past tense.

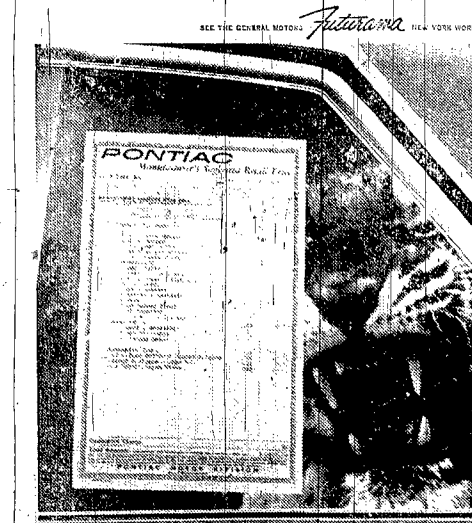

All orange-colored 1933 Chevrolet coupe is a colorful entry from Wayne at drag races around the area. Three young men, all with mechanical experience, have worked to get the vehicle ready for drag meets this summer.

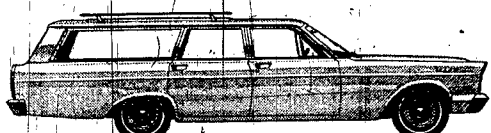

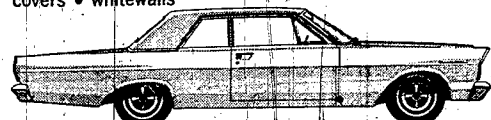

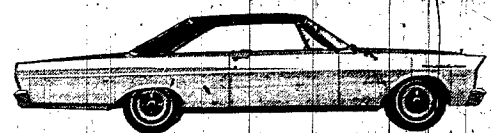


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
