Researchers say hay crops lose feeding quality at the rate of about one percent daily, after the early blocm stage. Beyond this point, the digestibility of the hay and the cow's intake drop bif rapidly.

The scientists say the combined loss of digestibility and reduced intake account for the quality loss of later-eut hay crops. They explain the lowered intake of the late-cut crops results from their higher fiber content. The highfiber material is harder to digest, so the cattle stay full longer and have to cut down on intake.
