
Why Not Produce Grass Sod?

Various studies have been made without finding specific answers to the problem. The most plausible explanation offered is that abfifidant rainfall and fayorable weather conditions. trees.

Later as weather conditions vary, the tree will adjust to moisture and nutrient supply hy shedding its leaves prematurely. Stain-Resistant Fabrics
Just how stain resistant are these special treated fabrics? The National Institute of Dryclening has made a study of the most popular finishes and they report the following conclusions.

The protection a fabric finish gives depends on what you spill on it. The degree of spotting also depends on how long the staining substance stays on the fabric, the temperature of the substance, the fiber content of the fabric and the care with which the finish is put on in the mill.

About 75 per cent of all spots and stains are waterborne; that is they dissolve in water. Content of the substance of th

and stains are waterborne; that is they dissolve in water. Coffee, tea, soft drinks, and fruit juices are examples. Other stains are oil-borne like those caused by cream, chocolate, butter, and other greasy substances. Some fabric finishes resist only water-borne stains. Examples include Zelan, 'yl-mer and Cravenette. Others such as Zepel and Scotchgard resist both oil and water-borne substances. You might have wondered why

some raincoats, which repel water-borne stains solf-so easily at the neckline and culfs. The institute reports that some of the water repellent finishes actually attract off-type stains.

All the finishes tested were rated excellent when new, but none of them held up under cleaning. A Zepel-treated cotton-Dacron blend got the best rating, Scotchgard finish on cotton poplin fared sasisfactorily.

Zepel and Scotchgard were the only finishes tested that gave any resistance to olly strins, but repeated dry cleanings dimished the resistance.

The Institute gives this reminder. Even after a fabric has been releaned several times, a dry cleaner can almost always make it as water repellent and stain-resistant as new by retreating it. The do-it yourseff aerosol-can method of retreating was not highly recommended.




