Decker Cites During Cornerstone

Freeman Decker, coordinator of state colleges, cited growth of Wayne State college in curriculum, personnel, education and physical plant at the cornerstone laying ceremony for the new nine-story dormitory Monday afternoon.

Louis Sylvester, grand master of the Masonic lodge in Nebraska, and local Masons had parts in the program along with state and college education dignitaries.

The cornerstone contained among other things, a copy of the student newspaper, Wayne States, last week's issue of The Wayne Herald, Masonic state, regional and national by-laws, the Bible, WSC catalogs and bulletins and other items.

This was the seventh cornerstone laying ceremony in the last decade at the school. Yale Kessler, Raymond Schreiner and Clifford Wait, three Masons on the faculty, found it a familiar rite as they are all veterans of more than two decades at the school.

Ralph Carhart, Wayne, past grand master, relaxed. Two years ago he presided at the cornerstone laying for the Fine Arts center.

In his speech, Decker pointed out that most WSC students will seek careers as teachers. He cited three obligations they have: 1) To the children that come into their classrooms; 2) To the parents of these children; and 3) To the taxpayers who provide the place to teach and materials to use in the profession.

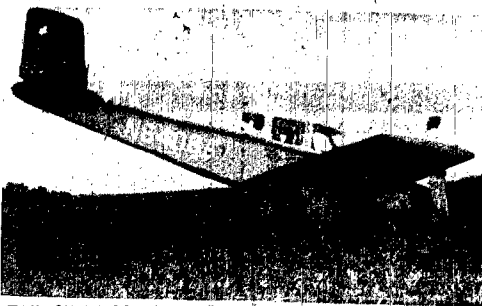
He said pupils often have teachers as ideals and "want to grow up to be like teacher"; parents need to be understood for they send teachers their most precious possessions—their children; and a teacher needs to feel obligated to give a dollar's service for each dollar paid him.

Decker also said teachers have an obligation to the profession, a noble and exciting one made up of sincere and dedicated individuals. To those who find they are not happy as teachers, he urged getting into another field.

Corn Rootworm Reported Threat to Area Corn Crop

Area farmers should check their corn fields for corn rootworm infestations immediately, according to Gene Schwartz, agronomist at the Northeast station. The rootworms are hatching and severe infestation was observed in the Wakefield area this week.

Most stalks dug up at the severely infested field had more than 10 worms per corn plant and in one root system more than 40 of the white larvae of the corn rootworm beetle were found. Root damage was observed on all plants that were removed from the soil and more than 50 per cent of many root systems were damaged.

Since the weather has been cool and the soil moisture supply adequate at the present time, it is very easy to overlook a root worm infestation unless some corn plants are pulled up and inspected. If it was dry or we had a few dry hot winds the plants with their root systems eaten away by the worms would be wilted and easily visible.

The field near Wakefield was treated at the recommended rate for rootworm control at planting time, but much of the material's effectiveness has probably been depleted by now. In addition, the hard rains in the area may have reduced the length of effectiveness of the chemicals used at planting time either by leaching, decomposition, or erosion.

If more than 8 to 10 worms per corn plant are found and more than 50 per cent of the root system has been damaged, emergency control measures should perhaps be considered. An emergency treatment can be made now by applying granules (applied at the same rate as at planting time) at the base of the plants, and cultivating to throw as much soil as possible over the insecticide. If you spray, use 1 pound actual diazinon (1 quart of diazinon AG 300) per acre in 15 to 20 gallons of water, and again cover the insecticide with soil. Granules or spray materials should be applied as a split broadcast application for best control.

Emergency treatments will not kill all rootworms present because the insecticide will not penetrate the soil. It will help reduce future injury by establishing a barrier between rootworms and developing roots.

Field inspections should be made every two or three days because the worms will still be hatching for several weeks yet. An emergency treatment before the corn is laid by will provide a better opportunity to cover the insecticide with soil.

The concert starts in Bressler park at 8 p.m. in the bandstand. Listeners are welcome to sit in their cars but those bringing seats or blankets to sit in the park will find the music in the air even more enjoyable.

Numbers include "Stars and Stripes Forever" by Sousa; a Negro spiritual fantasy; one of Offenbach's famed "Parisian numbers"; "Mississippi Suite" by Ferde Grofe; highlights from "My Fair Lady"; "Syncope Clock" by Leroy Anderson; a jam session; and "El Capitan" by Sousa. Anyone playing a band instrument will be welcome in the city's summer band. College kids, home or those attending summer session at WSC are especially welcome.

History of Carroll, Need for Museum Discussed at Historical Society Meet

The history of Carroll and the need for facilities for a Wayne county museum were prime topics at a meeting of the Wayne County Historical Society Friday night in the Carroll auditorium. Around 100 attended the meeting.

Mrs. Dave Theophilus, Wayne, told of the start of the museum and described some of the 900 items on hand but stored mainly because there is no way to display them. She pointed out that visitors from 18 states have looked over the museum presently occupying space in the courthouse and inaccessible due to being locked much of the time.

She told of a wooden pump which even the state historical museum would like. Other items include wedding gowns, wooden corn planters, old clothing and household items. More would be given the museum if a building could be obtained to display it.

The history of Carroll and its churches occupied a major share of the time. Interesting bits of information about the town from its establishment in 1886 when a depot was put in to its present day were offered by various individuals.

Carroll was the first town in the county to surface its main street, getting its brick street a little before Wayne did. It was incorporated as a town in 1893 and grew to more than 500 but has shrunk to around 200 now.

Three more cars that were not moving were damaged in Wayne the past week. It makes a half dozen stranded vehicles that have been damaged in two weeks.

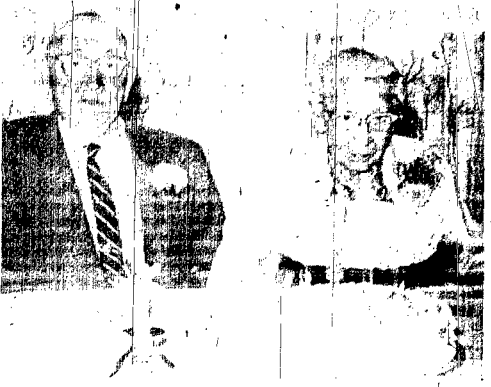

Soil Survey in This County Being Conducted by SCS

The soil survey of Wayne county is being continued. This is part of the national cooperative soil survey with the soil conservation service which hopes to get all of the United States surveyed, Soil Scientist Don Kerl reports.

Since the Wayne county soil survey was started last year, Sherman precinct has been completed. Farmers in this area who would like to have copies of the aerial photos with the soil survey of their individual farms should contact the SCS office.

Some work was completed last year in Garfield precinct and work will soon be started to complete this precinct. About two-thirds of Deer Creek precinct has been surveyed this year and will be completed this fall.

The soil survey consists of digging holes in the soil to determine texture, thickness of surface soil, color, structure, depth which lime occurs, erosion, slope and drainage. This information is listed on the aerial photo with different soil names for certain soil characteristics.

Soil survey and land capability maps have many uses. Their main purpose is to provide information to a farmer and a

conservationist so that they may be able to make an agreeable erosion control plan for his individual farm. Erosion control measures and tillage recommendations are tailored to fit each soil type as nearly as is practical.

A project of gathering management and yield information by soil name is being carried on, which give us more information for each soil type such as fertilizer needs and other management practices.

The soil survey of Washington county was just published last winter. The Thurston county soil survey has been completed and will be published shortly.

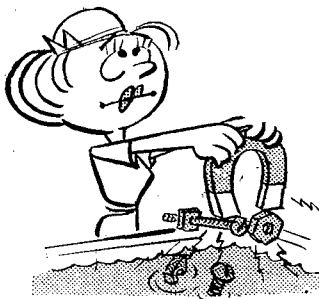

Duane Wehrer Gets All-America Honor

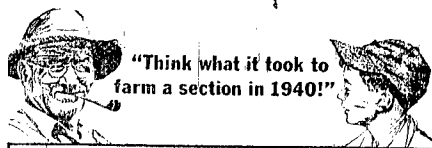
Duane Wehrer has another honor for his baseball performance on Wayne State's 1965 conference champion team. He rated second team All-America recognition from the NAIA.

Previously, the senior first baseman from Wisner had been cited on the District 11 all-star team and had won his teammates' election as most valuable player.

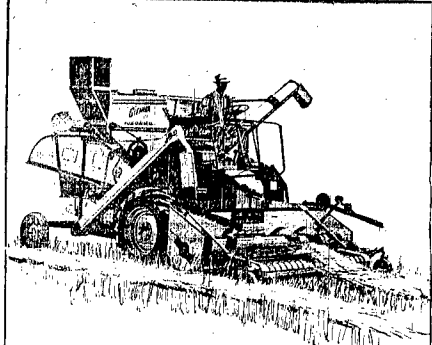

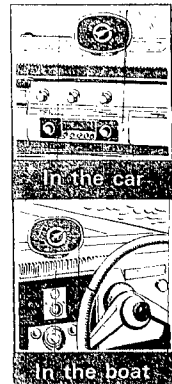

Farmers Advised to Keep Records on Farm Helpers

Wayne county farmers and work crew leaders are advised by J. M. Buglewicz, Norfolk social security district manager, that records should be kept on all farm hands who work for them in 1965. Reports on wages paid help are due each Jan. 31.

A farm workers' wages must be reported if he is paid \$150 or more during the year or works on 20 days or more in a calendar year for wages figured on a time basis. Crew members who employ crew members must keep records of earnings of members unless he has a written agreement stating he is an employee of the farmer.

Details of the requirements may be obtained from the social security office or from any internal revenue office.

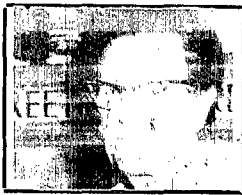

E. A. Larkins is proprietor of the "New Restaurant Barber Shop." He advertised: Fancy line of canned goods, tobacco, cigars and soft drinks, lunch at all hours; for a clean shave and stylish haircut, call on us; agent for Fraser Steam Laundry.

Clark General Merchandise said: "Carrie Nation, if she comes to Concord, will be invited to inspect my store and tell the people that it will pay them to trade with me."

E. O. Smith & Son, the Concord Blacksmith, advertised plow, wagon and buggy work; M. B. Friend advertised for painting and paper hanging work; J. T. Schinkel advertised plastering and steam scroll-saw work to make brackets, posts and ornaments; J. G. Clotz & Son advertised bicycles sold, rented and repaired.

Alexander & Son advertised lumber, grain, machine oil, twine, millstuffs and machinery; Isaac Brantman featured furniture and undertaking plus a full line of wallpaper in the latest designs and lowest prices; Edwards & Bradford had lumber, coal, paint, storm shed and hardware; McIntosh Bros. ran a lively stable;

The Concord State bank had paid up capital of \$30,000 and undivided profits of \$3,866 with James Paul president, J. Paul vice president and D. A. Paul cashier; and the Great Northern Railway advertised an excursion trip to Sioux City, round trip from Dixon, \$1.

News items included these gems: Mrs. Cooper was a passenger on the road last Saturday; Alpha-betah Smith loaded around town most of the week; Mike Conway and Pete Bennett were selling cows in town Tuesday night; During the storm Thursday night the creamery building was moved about six feet to the east;

The editor of this paper has been appointed Nebraska agent for the latest thing out, a musical cigarette box which plays "Nearer, My God, to Thee," every time you take a cigarette out; The two Misses, Anna Christensen and Mame Ecker walked over from Dixon to hug "The Kid"; and A. B. Emery's cow was run over by the train last week. The town is in crops.

Editor Eckler also printed an item from "The Wayne Republican" citing him for his "Carrie Nation Story" which was carried throughout the nation and made Concord famous. It also said he had another story about two mothers keeping the dates their daughters had made with two boys and then "cow-hiding" the boys. Neither story was true. The Republican declared.

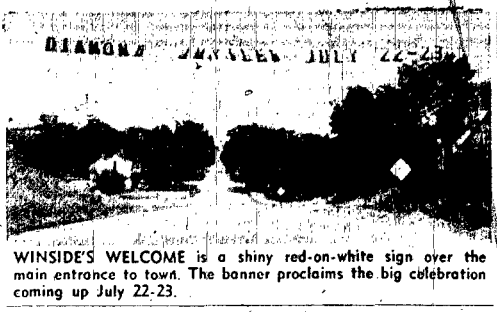

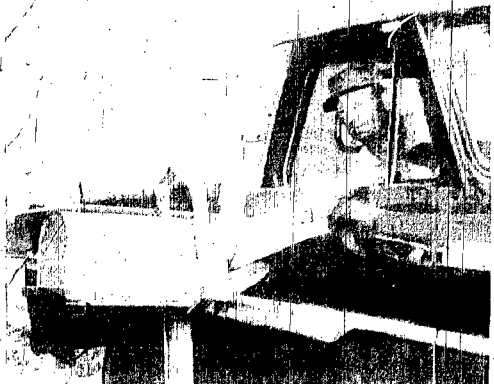

than ordinary interest. Owned by the Lawrence Rings, it presents an intriguing sight with a cable and rope running from it up a steep embankment.



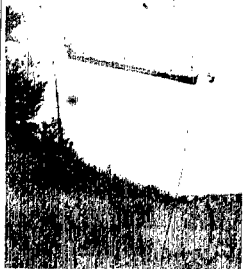

Their driveway extends for a block east to the end of the cut, a long walk, especially in mud. In front of the house the mail box would be close but the embankment was too steep to walk up and down.

Steps were considered but they were too expensive. Then the idea of a device similar to a ski lift was hit upon. It was tried, it works and it has been in use ever since.

Anchored down by a post, the mail box sits suspended in a ring, which is appropriate considering



It is the Rings' place. A rope attached to the box is also tied to a post just in front of the Ring house.

When the mailman deposits mail, Mrs. Ring steps outside a few feet reels in the rope and the mail box "rides the cable" to the top of the bank where she takes the mail out and lets the weight of the box return it to its proper place.

Some trouble was experienced by vandals at first but kids nowadays are more thoughtful or the device is less of a novel so there's no fun in cutting the rope. A landmark, the mailbox is used in locating farms, like, "You know where the mail box on a rope is? Just go two miles
