EQUIPMENT

In choosing a casting, spinning or fly red, he sure it's one with lots of backbone that will give you power for distance, power to drive the hook home and tip action to help detect the strike. Backbone simply means a rod that is rather tiff from the handle to about a foot or so from the tip. When choosing a casting reel, be sure you get one that is precision built. A free spool and star drag or clutch to help play a heavy fish is the best choice. In some cases, the closed face spin-casting reel is preferred.

Above all a good line is absolutely essential. The best rod and reel in the world won't handle a heavy fish unless—the line is dependable. Whether you are casting or spin fishing, use the monorisament line. This particular line has made it possible to fish in freezing weather.

Choosing the right lure can be a groblem also. One that imitates minnow, crawfish or frog is usually excellent; and sometimes e plastic worm or the jig and set are real kullers, lift you are wing trouble selecting the proper lures remember these points. If the fish are feeding on shad, dee a lure with a grey finish; If they are feeding on shad, die a lure with a grey finish; If they are feeding on shore minnows, a stick balt of one that les upright in the water is good; c) if they are feeding on crawh, the Bass-Buster is almost a sure bet. 



One might live on a Wake-eld route, the other on an Allen route, hey'd visit and items would come in om both Allen and Wakefield on the sit—yet they might live on adjoin-te farms!

It undoubtedly was news 50 years ago when Sam and Effic got in the bugyx and drove from Sholes to Carroll to
veit. Later when Zeke and Myra drove
the fir lizzie from Hoskins to Wakeféld
t was news. Nowadays such short-distance visits are so commonplace they are no more newsworthy than a visit to

tance visits are an are no more newsworthy than a visit to the bathroom.

The Herald still wants news of long-distance visits, but not visits to neighboring towns. No more items are solicited about attending a ball game or church in knother town, going fishing (unless it's a long, long trip to an unusual spot), sight-seeing drives on Sunday or similar rounts.

Still wanted are items about special parties such as anniversaries or birthdays even if just local area people are involved. Also wanted are those trips to distant towns, vacations in other parts of the nation or visitors from a distance. News about servicemen mywhere is always welcome.

It is hoped the new policy will meet your approval. Confidentially, it is not an innovation with us—most weeklies have followed such procedure for years. Most recent change was in the Custer County Chief, Broken Bow, with 50 correspondents and one of the biggest papers in a Nebraska small town.

Some of you are bound to be offended, claiming the paper does not want your news or subscription. Circulation figures show that it works otherwise—more people buy the paper when it contains real news than when it is filled with neighborhood visits.

You may find other papers do want these visits as news and it is suggressed. wanted are items about special

Horse Shows May Spread Disease

Concentrations of horses in shows trail rides and judging events may promote the spread of horse diseases.

Diseases spread through all classes of animals as well as man because some individuals harbor live virus or bacterial infections that are transmitted from animal through contact or contaminated feed or water.

Diseases

People have a tendency to pat their horse and also their neighbor's horse and let the animals nuzzle their hand. This simple act could be the direct means of transmitting disease.

Equine influenza and rhino-pneumonitis are horse diseases caused by viruses, and are readily transmitted from animal to animal The disease. "Straugles," commonly called distemper, is caused by a bacteria-complicated with a virus, and also is readily transmitted.

Another disease of horses caused by a virus and spread by mosquitos or possibly other bitting insects is encephalomyelitis or sleeping sickness.


