## Businessmen Taken to County Projects

Neb. State Hist. Soc. 1500 R St. Lincoln 8, Nebr. 68508

A bus tour of Wayne county conservation projects planned just for businessmen will be made Thursday, July 13. A bus has been chartered to leave the ASC office in Wayne at 1 p.m.

Sponsored by the Wayne County Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service and the Wayne County Soil and Water Conservation District, it is called "The Wayne County Businessmen's Conservation tour."

Farm officials find some farm programs receiving adverse criticism, mainly from those not familiar with the benefits. Since conservation benefits town and farm people alike, SCS and ASCS men hope to show on this tour how businessmen benefit.

Conservation projects to be observed will be terraces, waterways, dams, recreation areas, road structures and native grass projects. Stops are planned at the farms of Wayne Kirzimo, Alvin Wagner, Harry Heinemann, Merle Ring and David Reese.

All business and professional men are invited to join the ASCS and SCS men on the tour. Refreshments will be served at the lake before returning to Wayne by 4:30. Advance notice of plans to attend is asked to be phoned to either office by Monday, July 12.

## Fast, Economical Gains Being Made

Fast, economical gains are the happy combination for cattle fattening in Northeast station experimental lots at Concord. Several lots have gained over three pounds daily during the 112 days they have been on grain feed.

These steers, started as calves last fall, gained 1 1/2 pounds daily during the winter on a corn silage and supplement ration. About 2700 pounds silage and 80 pounds supplement produced 100 pounds gain. Their supplement contained soybean meal, minerals, vitamins and different amounts of urea.

In March corn was added to the ration and alfalfa hay replaced silage as the roughage. The protein supplement was stopped. Different vitamins and minerals are being fed along with stillbrestol. No protein supplement is needed since the corn is over 16 per cent protein and additional protein is supplied by four pounds alfalfa daily, researcher Walt Tolman said.

Even analyzing to per cent protein does not seem unusual. The year judging by tests of 14 corn samples, furnished by feeders, which ran from 9 to 11 per cent protein.

So far only about seven pounds of feed have been needed to put on a pound of gain, Tolman said. We expect gains to be slower and more expensive as the cattle get fatter and the weather warmer, he remarked.

A lot of heifers on brome pasture are studying the value of stillbrestol implants and an antibiotic. The fastest gaining group, implanted with stillbrestol, gained 2.7 pounds daily during a 42-day period, with no other feed than pasture, mineral and 3 pounds of rolled corn daily.

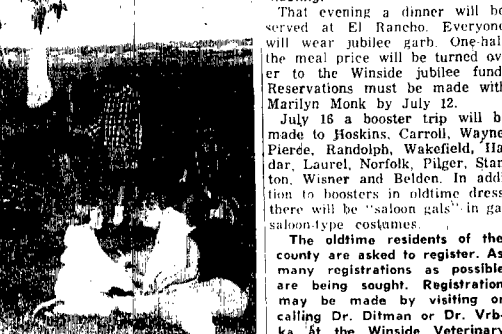

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## New High School Building's Plans Call for Two Full Stories

Plans for making the new Wayne high school building a split-level affair have been abandoned. Plans approved at a meeting of the board of education Tuesday night call for the entire structure to be two-story.

Ellery Davis of the architect explained the plans and board members went along with the changes since they make use of the money available for the most economical type of structure.

The square footage of the office area was reduced in an effort to economize. A terrace was added on the north side of the building to make the two-story plan feasible.

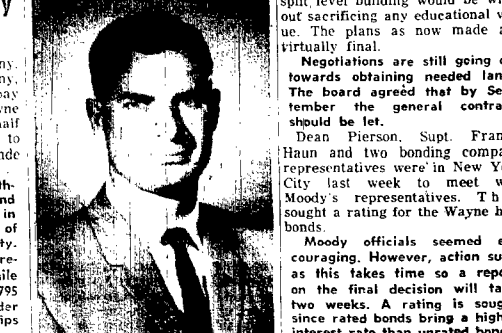
Going to a two-story plan makes the building more compact than a split-level building would be without sacrificing any educational value. The plans as now made are virtually final.

Negotiations are still going on towards obtaining needed land. The board agreed that by September the general contract should be let.

Dean Pierson, Supt. Francis Haun and two bonding company representatives were in New York City last week to meet with Moody's representatives. They sought a rating for the Wayne high bonds.

Moody officials seemed encouraging. However, action such as this takes time so a report on the final decision will take two weeks. A rating is sought since rated bonds bring a higher interest rate than unrated bonds.

The board also took up these matters: Accreditation in a Class A rating with no warnings or advisements has been received from the state accreditation committee; school opening day is Aug. 30; and a teachers' workshop will be held Aug. 26-27-28.

## Gas Company Will Pay \$6,755 to This County

Peoples Natural Gas Company, through its parent company, Northern Natural Gas, will pay \$6,755 in property taxes in Wayne county this year. A second half payment of \$3,376 was paid to County Treasurer Leona Bahde this past week.

The money comes from Northern's transmission lines and Peoples' distribution system in Wayne and in the portion of Wakefield in Wayne county. Wayne county schools will receive \$3,588 of the total while \$91 will go to the state and \$795 to the county. The remainder will go to cities, townships and other units.

Northern and Peoples will pay over \$14 million in Nebraska property taxes this year. Peoples serves Wayne and 35 other Nebraska communities while Northern is one of the big gas companies of the nation and operates 1,900 miles of pipeline in Nebraska alone.

## Five Teenagers Killed in Weekend Auto Mishaps

Tragedy, heartache and shock entered the homes of several area families just before the fourth of July when five teenagers were killed in two accidents barely 15 miles apart.

Killed Thursday night were John Morrison, 14, and Danny Pokett, 15, both of Wayne. Saturday night three Laurel girls, Janice Sanders, 15, Sue Ann Sanders, 16, and Karen Jones, 16, were killed in a two-car crash.

The three Laurel girls were killed, three Wayne boys injured and a Wisconsin couple injured in an accident less than a mile north of Laurel Saturday night. Three remain hospitalized at this writing.

Janice Sanders and Karen Jones were killed instantly. Sue Ann Sanders died early Sunday in a Sioux City hospital.

Trooper Roy Van Winkle, Plainview, said Tuesday night, Keith Rohrke, 15, Wayne, was in the extreme care ward of a Sioux City hospital in a semi-coma following brain concussion. He had been unconscious much of the time following the accident.

According to the patrolman, Mrs. Joseph Kiekbusch, 66, La-Crosse, Wis., and Rohrke were both in critical condition that night. Mr. Kiekbusch was in fair condition with a punctured lung, broken leg and facial lacerations.

Two other Wayne boys Melvin Meyer, 15, and John Barr, 19, were out of the hospital, having suffered lesser injuries. Meyer had been taken to a Norfolk hospital and Barr to a Sioux City hospital.

The patrolman, who investigated along with the Cedar county sheriff, John Rube, said Tuesday night it still had not been determined who was driving the Louis Meyer car at the time of the accident. Further investigation is to be made to determine who was driving.

According to Van Winkle, the Kiekbusch car was southbound. A truck was northbound, apparently slowing down to make a left turn into a dehydration plant drive.

As near as could be determined, the trooper said the accident occurred in the southbound lane with the local car being struck almost broadside on the right side by the southbound Kiekbusch car. Exact determination of how the accident occurred. See LAUREL DEATHS - Page 6

The other case that day was one in connection with an accident in Carroll. Ronnie Billehimer, Stanton, was fined \$50 and \$21.50 costs for driving with an alcoholic content of over 15 per cent in his blood.

## County's West Side Has Three Mishaps

The west side of Wayne county had three accidents investigated by Sheriff Don Weible last week. An accident in Carroll and two cars overturning west of Winside were the mishaps.

June 26 at 10 p.m. in Carroll, Ronnie Billehimer, Stanton, struck a parked car belonging to Merlin Harmeyer, Norfolk. The sheriff reported heavy damage to the parked car and light damage to the other vehicle.

Almost five miles west of Winside June 29, Claire Bleich, Winside, lost control of a bus-like vehicle in which she, Mrs. Walt Bleich and four children were riding. The bus overturned on the gravelly county road and landed on its top in the ditch. Bruises were the only injury and damage to the bus was most extensive on the top and one side.

July 1, 1.3 miles west of Winside, Nancy Fler, Hoskins, lost control of her car in gravel. David Fler, 5, was with her. Neither was injured although the vehicle was a total loss as it rolled into a ditch and into a field before stopping on its side. It had turned 180 degrees in the road and then turned over 134 times.

## Concert by Baritone Free to the Public

One of the nation's foremost baritone singers will come to Wayne State next Wednesday, July 14, as the third in the summer special program series. He is Eugene Holmes, rising young concert performer who has inspired enthusiastic response from reviewers and lay listeners.

The public is invited to attend his free concert at 8 p.m. in the Administration building auditorium.

Holmes has sung successfully in concert, opera and with orchestra, and in February, 1964, was chosen to sing the national anthem for President Lyndon Johnson during his visit to St. Louis for its bicentennial celebration.

He currently is a graduate assistant at the school of music at Indiana university, where he is teaching and singing leading roles with the Illinois opera theatre. He recently won the national championship on the Ted Mack television show.

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## Allotment for Winside's Lagoon Receives Approval

Word has been received by the village board of Winside that an allotment has been approved in Lincoln for a sewage lagoon. Actual construction is not expected to start for several months.

Mayor D. L. Dittman said surveyors had been in the area and had selected a site on the south side of Logan creek south of town. He said there is considerable work to be done before the council can proceed.

At present, Winside dumps raw sewage into Logan creek. This practice has been ordered stopped in many cities and towns where streams are being used for sewerage disposal.

Dittman said the town will have to buy a little over six acres for the lagoon. He said he anticipates use of the new facility late in 1965 or early in 1966.

## More Rainfall Received

The July Fourth weekend usually brings storms of some type and this year, it was no exception. Wayne received 17 of an inch of moisture the Fourth and 64 the next day for a total of 81 of an inch. The rain Sunday afternoon was accompanied by a strong wind that blew the rain sideways much of the time.

## Attends Tulsa Meeting

Merlin Wright, Wakefield Christian church pastor, attended the North American Christian convention in Tulsa last week. Over 19,000 attended meetings designed as educational workshops in all levels of learning and evening worship services. Greetings came from churches both sides of the Iron curtain. Pastor Wright also consulted with a publishing firm on pre-publication work on his second book, "Basics of Christian Personality."

Morrison and Pokett along with Charles Schultz, 17, were coming toward town from the drive-in theatre. All three were struck by a car driven by Robert Reed, 17, Wayne, who had come from the drive-in theatre.

Trooper C. L. Howell, Norfolk, said there was no indication of speeding on the part of Reed. He also said other drivers traveling in both directions at the time said they had not seen the boys on the road.

Reed had the presence of mind to pull into the Russell Johnson driveway, rushed back to tell them to stop the boys and run to the Orville Ertel's home to call for police and ambulances. He told officers he remembered seeing the "24" on Pokett's football-type shirt but had no time to stop.

According to Howell, Schultz was hospitalized with concussion and abrasions. Schultz told the trooper later that he had looked back, saw the other two on the highway and the next thing he remembers he was in the police car.

The two Wayne boys killed were (left to right) John Morrison, 14, and Danny Pokett, 15, both of Winside. They fell in football and Morrison was one of the best golfers in the teenage group here.

Howells was assisted by Sheriff Don Weible and Attorney Charles McDermott at the scene. Wayne city police directed traffic which was unusually heavy due to stores being open.

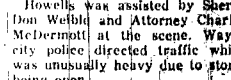
## Allen Woman Does Not Get Big Check

His morning appearance at 10:50 will give him full opportunity to explain the problems of state finance. His afternoon session at 1:30 will be devoted to questions from the audience.

Few if any men in Nebraska government have fuller knowledge of state finances than Senator Marvel, who is credited with putting state fiscal operations, especially budgeting, on a more orderly basis than ever before, according to Dr. Gerald Hansen, director of the institute.

Although the budget committee recommendations presided over by Senator Marvel have received heated opposition, they have usually survived legislative debate intact and won strong majority votes.

The third and last speaker for the institute will be Senator Ross Rasmussen, chairman of the legislature's education committee, coming July 20. His morning and afternoon schedule will be the same as Senator Marvel's.

**'Nebraska Unicameral Best of Legislatures'**

Nebraska's legislature is the most and best of what a legislature should be. This opinion came from Hugo Srb, the legislature's clerk since 1937, as he talked to the legislative institute at Wayne State college Tuesday.  
One of the most ardent supporters of the unique unicameral Srb listed a string of superlatives to describe it:  
— Most representative, based on population, unlike bicameral legislatures which have at least one house representing area.  
— Most deliberative; no time limit on sessions, as many states require, thus forcing hasty action.  
— Most orderly; decorum and attendance of its senators are excellent; when last checked, average attendance for votes was 41 of the 43 senators (before the number rose from 43 to 49).  
— Most economical and efficient because of the small number of senators and single house.  
— Most responsible; rules prevent passage of a bill in less than five days (some legislatures can do it in one day), thus giving time for the public to react; any senator can call for a roll call vote on any bill (it often happens).  
— Most prestige for members; there are fewer senators than in other legislatures, and everybody is somebody.  
Srb also declared that the unicameral procedures excel all others. He cited one study of legislative procedure which suggested 12 desirable practices, "and our Legislature already had all 12 of them," he said.  
"Nobody has ever challenged me about our procedures when I have talked at all sorts of meetings of government officials." And he is frequently called to explain the Nebraska system in other states.  
Why, then, has it not been copied? Srb's answer is that many states do not offer the constitutional right of citizens to initiate legislation by petition — as Nebraska does. No legislature is likely to vote a lot of its members out of office, he said.  
"The legislature's non-partisan character also drew Srb's praise.

Most of the legislation is non-partisan and non-controversial; major controversial bills usually affect all citizens alike, he said, and should be considered without reference to parties.  
Senator Peter Claussen, who introduced Srb and also answered questions, added his endorsement of the non-partisan feature, saying "As it is, every senator is responsible for what he does and can't blame a party."  
This session of the legislative institute was the first this summer. Senator Richard Marvel, chairman of the legislature's budget committee, will be the next speaker, Wednesday, July 14.

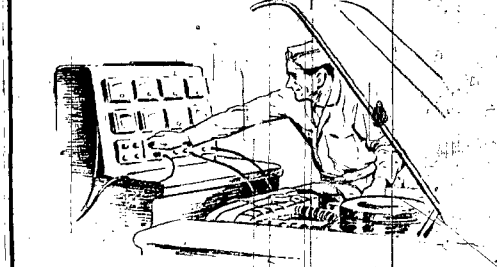

**Mert's Econ-O-Way Brings You — FISHING TIPS . . .**  
By VIRGIL WARD  
World's Fresh-Water Fishing Champion  
**EQUIPMENT**  
Whether you're a beginner or an experienced angler, equipment is important. To start with, one should have a tackle box, rod, reel, line and lures. Tackle boxes come in assorted sizes, colors and materials. Buy a quality box, one that won't leak or fly open and spill the contents everytime you pick it up, one that opens up flat! The plastic tackle box meets all the above requirements as good as any on the market. It is light, strong and leakproof! A metal box has the disadvantage of rusting out.

In choosing a casting, spinning or fly rod, be sure it's one with lots of backbone that will give you power for distance, power to drive the hook home and tip action to help detect the strike. Backbone simply means a rod that is rather stiff from the handle to about a foot or so from the tip. When choosing a casting reel, be sure you get one that is precision built. A free spool and a star drag or clutch to help play a heavy fish is the best choice. In some cases, the closed face spin-casting reel is preferred.

Above all a good line is absolutely essential. The best rod and reel in the world won't handle a heavy fish unless the line is dependable. Whether you are casting or spin fishing, use the monofilament line. This particular line has made it possible to fish in freezing weather.

Choosing the right lure can be a problem also. One that imitates a minnow, crawfish or frog is usually excellent; and sometimes the plastic worm or the jig and eel are real killers. If you are having trouble selecting the proper lures remember these points:  
a) If the fish are feeding on shore minnows, a stick bait or one that rides upright in the water is good; c) if they are feeding on crawfish, the Bass-Buster is almost a sure bet. Choosing the right lure is a lifetime job for any fisherman.

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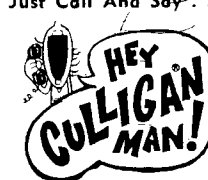

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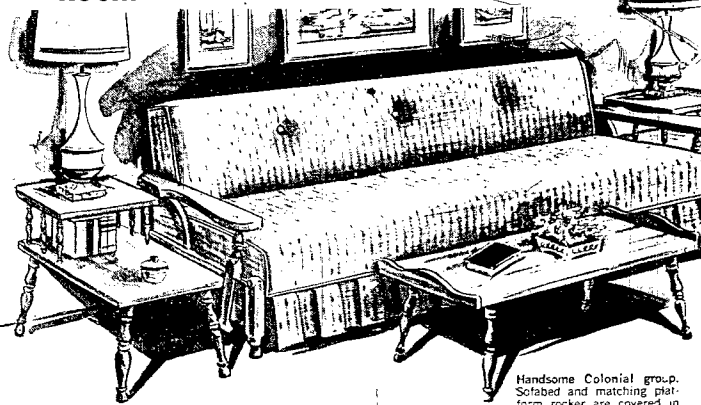

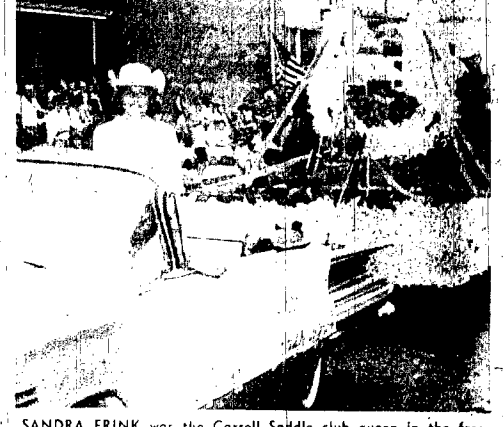

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a normal newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

Effective at once, The Herald has a new policy regarding the little "personal" items that have filled columns of the paper for 90 years. Correspondents have been advised of the change and have no alternative but to accept only items qualifying as "news" under the new set-up.

For well over 50 years, personal items have been the same. Week after week pages have contained hundreds of items about people in Laurel visiting in Dixon, Wayne people visiting at Winside, Hoskins people going to Norfolk and other such non-news items.

Worse yet, some people who have different rural mail addresses have had their items in as news because they visited each other. One might live on a Wakefield route, the other on an Allen route. They'd visit and items would come in from both Allen and Wakefield on the visit - yet they might live on adjoining farms!

It undoubtedly was news 50 years ago when Sam and Effie got in the buggy and drove from Sholes to Carroll to visit. Later when Zeke and Myra drove the tin lizzie to Hoskins to Wakefield it was news. Nowadays such short-distance visits are so commonplace they are no more newsworthy than a visit to the bathroom.

The Herald still wants news of long-distance visits, but not visits to neighboring towns. No more items are solicited about attending a ball game or church in another town, going fishing (unless it's a long, long trip to an unusual spot), sight-seeing drives on Sunday or similar reports.

Still wanted are items about special parties such as anniversaries or birthdays even if just local area people are involved. Also wanted are those trips to distant towns, vacations in other parts of the nation or visitors from a distance. News about servicemen anywhere is always welcome.

It is hoped the new policy will meet your approval. Unfortunately, it is not an innovation with us - most weeklies have followed such procedure for years. Most recent change was in the Center County Chief, Broken Bow, with 50 correspondents and one of the biggest papers in a Nebraska small town.

Some of you are bound to be offended, claiming the paper does not want your news or subscription. Circulation figures show that it works otherwise - more people buy the paper when it contains real news than when it is filled with neighborhood visits.

You may not agree with an editorial - but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## The Art of Fence-Straddling

A new kind of the fence-straddlers has to be chosen. Heir-apparent to the throne is Nebraska's governor, Frank Morrison. Aiming at getting a senate seat one of those years, he has played politics to a hilt. Never saying anything offensive, he appears to be determined "to let the people decide" everything when he's the man elected to do some of the decision making.

What was his stand on daylight saving time? He took no stand. We're against it, but we'd like to at least have the governor say he's for or against it. Worse yet was his lack of guts when it came to the income tax bill. He indicated he was against it but rather than alienate those boosting it by vetoing it or offending those opposed to it by signing it, he let the bill become law by just letting it lay until it was automatically approved.

This is the man who wants to take Carl Curtis' place in the United States Senate. With no firm beliefs of his own, he wants to take over the office of a man who has made his feelings known over the years and who has been elected to office because of what he stands for and because of what he opposes. If Morrison were sent to Washington, he would be pressured from every side and could sidestep every issue, giving Nebraska no representation where people want and need representation.

Gov. Morrison was "against" the income tax he said. That ought to win a few votes. He would have won even more if he had taken a stand one way or the other.

From the little he is doing as chief executive in Lincoln, it is obvious he is becoming a figurehead. He's not needed in Lincoln and we dread the day we need fence-straddlers like him in Washington.

## Sign a Petition

Ever signed a petition? Do you sign all petitions? Here's hoping you soon get a chance to sign another one.

Our governor chose to let the income tax bill become law without his signature. He said he wanted the people to make the decision. The way to decide now is to get it on the ballot and the way to get it on the ballot is to petition for it.

There will be some who oppose the petitions. They don't want you to have a voice in the final decision. They know how you feel about it, and yet they voted the opposite of the way the majority opinion lies.

Sign a petition asking for a vote by the people on whether or not we have an income tax bill. Our Iowa friends will probably agree that we do not need it or want it. Then when we get the issue on the ballot, let's get rid of all the senators who are so determined we'll have an income tax whether we want it or not!

Meyer received the annual Louis E. Wyman award in the group's annual convention in Texas. It is given to the attorney general who has done the most to advance the objectives of the national association to help make the United States a better place in which to live.

Meyer has served as head of the State Justice Department since 1960. He is a noted constitutional lawyer.

## Over Payment Made

In the fiscal year ended last week, Nebraskans may have paid about \$1.3 million more than was necessary to meet the state's spending commitments.

The State Treasurer's office closed the fiscal year showing a general fund collection of \$2,690,927 from the property tax. Advance estimates said only about \$2,234,554 was needed.

Horse Shows May Spread Disease

Concentrations of horses in shows, trail rides and judging events may promote the spread of horse diseases.

Diseases spread through all classes of animals as well as man because some individuals harbor live virus or bacterial infections that are transmitted from animal to animal through contact or contaminated feed or water.

People have a tendency to pat their horse and also their neighbor's horse and let the animals nuzzle their hand. This simple act could be the direct means of transmitting disease.

Equine influenza and rhinopneumonitis are horse diseases caused by viruses, and are readily transmitted from animal to animal. The disease, "strangles," commonly called distemper, is caused by a bacteria complicated with a virus, and also is readily transmitted.

Another disease of horses caused by a virus and spread by mosquitoes or possibly other biting insects is encephalomyelitis or sleeping sickness.

Practicing veterinarians can advise as to necessary immunizations to protect horses from getting these diseases.

## Horn Flies Building Up

Hornflies suck the blood of cattle and are usually seen hovering over their backs or feeding on their backs and bellies. They cause livestock to lose weight and dairy cattle to fall off in their milk.

They can be controlled with backrubbers, especially in pasture and rangeland. The backrubbers must be kept in good shape and filled, with insecticide.

There are a number of materials and mixtures recommended for backrubbers for beef cattle. They are:

Methoxychlor 25 percent, 1 part to 4 parts of oil.  
Deltath 20 per cent emulsion concentrate, 1 part to 20 parts oil.  
Toxaphene 60 per cent emulsion concentrate, 1 quart to 4 gallons of oil (toxaphene cannot be used within 28 days of marketing a slaughter animal).

Korlan (ronnelat) 24 per cent emulsion concentrate, 2 pints to 5 gallons of oil (it cannot be used within 56 days of market).

One ounce of soluble oil, obtainable from oil tank drivers, some sprayer companies or machine shops, can be mixed with each gallon of water.

Hay Fever Area

Nebraska lies in the heart of the hay fever area of the United States. And for that one Nebraskan in 20 who suffers from this allergic disease, this statistic is not one that is happily proclaimed.

Hay fever starts when pollen or mold comes in contact with antibodies produced on the cells of the breathing passages. The allergy develops in certain individuals over a period of time.

Rayweed is at the top of the list of weeds whose pollen causes hay fever. Wild hemp is second in importance as an offender. Others include cocklebur, kochia, pigweed, and marsh elder.

Spraying and cultivation can help to control such hay fever weeds. However, this must be done over a wide area if control is to be effective. Entire communities can best work towards this goal.

Correct identification and control of Nebraska Hay Fever weeds are given in a bulletin by this title available at every County Extension Office. Simply ask for Nebraska Hay Fever Weeds, E. C. 174.

## Carl Curtis CAPITOL COMMENTS

Of growing concern both to financial houses and Congress is the large number of consumer bankruptcies.

During the year ending June 30, 1964, there were 155,182 cases filed throughout the United States compared to 139,174 the previous year. No simple cure has been found for the bankruptcy problem.

The average consumer, a study shows, who is forced into bankruptcy is 30 years of age and has completed at least two years of high school. He most likely is a factory worker, has a family of five, an income of about \$4,600 and owes between \$5,200 and \$2,800 to twelve to sixteen creditors.

Another financial problem that isn't being solved but which greatly affects this nation's economy involves the balance of payments.

The balance of payments brings together both government and private payments to foreigners against payments received from foreigners.

Exports, imports, tourism, foreign loans and investments, income from investments abroad, foreign aid and military expenditures abroad have an effect on our payments position.

When amounts owed by United States residents and our government to foreigners exceed those owed by foreigners to the United States, a deficit for the year exists.

The deficit in our balance of payments in 1964 amounted to 2.3 billion dollars - up from 2.6 billion the previous year. These paid to constant drain on our gold supply.

Nebraska is among 18 states that pay more in Federal taxes than it receives in Federal aid.

Total Federal aid to state and local governments from Uncle-Sams amounted to 5.7 billion dollars last year. It is expected to rise 9.2 billion dollars in 1965.

It has been argued for many years that poverty and unemployment are the basic causes of crime.

Yet it is a fact that the Federal government has spent more money for welfare programs - on the theory they will eliminate poverty and crime.

From 1933 to 1963, the population of the United States increased 50 per cent; crime rates increased 1,231 per cent and government spending, about half of which has been used for welfare programs, was liked 1,215 per cent.

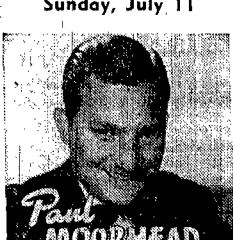
