



The a single knot in the leader about 5 inches from endraw it tight. Pass end of leader through eye of lure by the back parallel with running leater. Bend terminal down around, forming a circle below parallel strands. Pass end and through circle in leader twice. 

Heavy engine loads and dusty conditions can result in carbon in the crankease which must be kept from sensitive moving parts. The oil filter directly determines how long your engines will last and how many, or few, overhauls they will need, Lane said. His advice is:

—Change oil regularly on schedule even though you change the filter takes out only solid materials, not liquid contaminants such as unburned fuel, condensed moisture and products of oil deterioration.

Sludge formed from these ma-

Sludge formed from these materials can plug an oil line or pump screen and result in a burned out bearing.

—The purpose of the filter is to maintain the quality of the oil between changes. Small solid particles missed by a dirty filter can lodge in and around bearings and prevent proper lubrication. Change the oil filter as often as recommended.

—Don't guess at whether or not it is safe to delay changing oil or oil filter. Follow the manfacturer's recommendations. Enfacturer's recommendations.

Check Pressure Canner

Check Pressure Canner
It is not too early to be getting that pressure canner in readiness for summer canning.

The dial type pressure gauge attached to the lid registers the pressure within the utensil. It is wise to have this gauge checked each season to see if adjustments in pressure readings are needed. Most gauges Ican be checked at your local county extension offices without charge. If an adjustment in the reading is much over 5 pounds, a replacement in the pressure gauge is necessary to insure safe canning procedures.

Another part of the canner needing attention is the gasket which is made of rubber or rubber-like compound. If it is slack, dried and cracked, it needs to be replaced. Check with your local hardware or department store carrying your particular make of canner for securing agasket. A good fitting gasket insures against pressure loss.

The opening in the jet-tock on the lid can be cleaned with a pipe cleaner.

Be sure to read the instruction book carefully before using your pressure cooker-canner, especially if you do not use it frequentity enough to be thoroughly familiar with it. If the directions for your canner have been lost, write the company for a new set being sure to state what model number your canner is.






