



Little-Read Riding Hoods

The curse of the car plus the curse of television plus our continued, prosperity have helped bring about a generation of youngsters informed far beyond their years. Much of the unrest around the country is their doing.

Instead of being well-read, they are little-read, many of them dropouts and some just barely making grades. They are riding in cars searound their own communities and to other communities, often getting into trouble. They are the little-read riding hoods.

The big bad wolf in the story is a policeman. He tries to keep them from their destination, which is not granny's house but "excitement center." They want to be doing and what they want to do often does not make sense.

Metropolitan areas have had major disorders and Wayne county people join other rural Americans in shaking their heads at such goings-on. But lately there have been disturbances in our area, Arnolds Park, Ia., beaches in Missouri and other nearby points.

The Pierce County Leader's feature story last week concerned youngsters breaking out windows and tail lights on Pierce county cars at a Norfolk drive-in. Editorially, the Leader took everyone to task for failing the young people and bringing such situations about.
