Found my neighbor dragging her grandma's wicker love seat outside; got paint-up cues as she sprayed it new. Paint only if there's no wind and no rainclouds. Put down papers; don't risk paint on pretty greenery. Painting with a brush? Let size of surface guide you. Walls need big, wide brushing; wicker, a slim brush to reach into curlicues. Use an old nylon stocking to strain paint lumps. And never paint the house when the temperature's past 90! (Neither you nor the siding can stand it.)

COOLER CUES
Steamy days seem breezier when things on the table look frosty! Trot out glass plates and papers; pop them into the refrigerator to chill before dinner. Embellish them with crisp salads, frozen desserts, cold blender-soups. Start your meal with canned maddene or consommé, chilled to jelly consistency and piled in tall, cool glasses. Serve it with long ice tea spoons, thin lime and lemon slices.

FRANK-STUFFED CABBAGE ROLLS
Separate 8 large outer leaves from fresh cabbage, wash well. Parboil till tender. Drain; fold leaves in half. Wrap each around one of 8 frankfurters. Place seam-side-down in shallow baking dish. 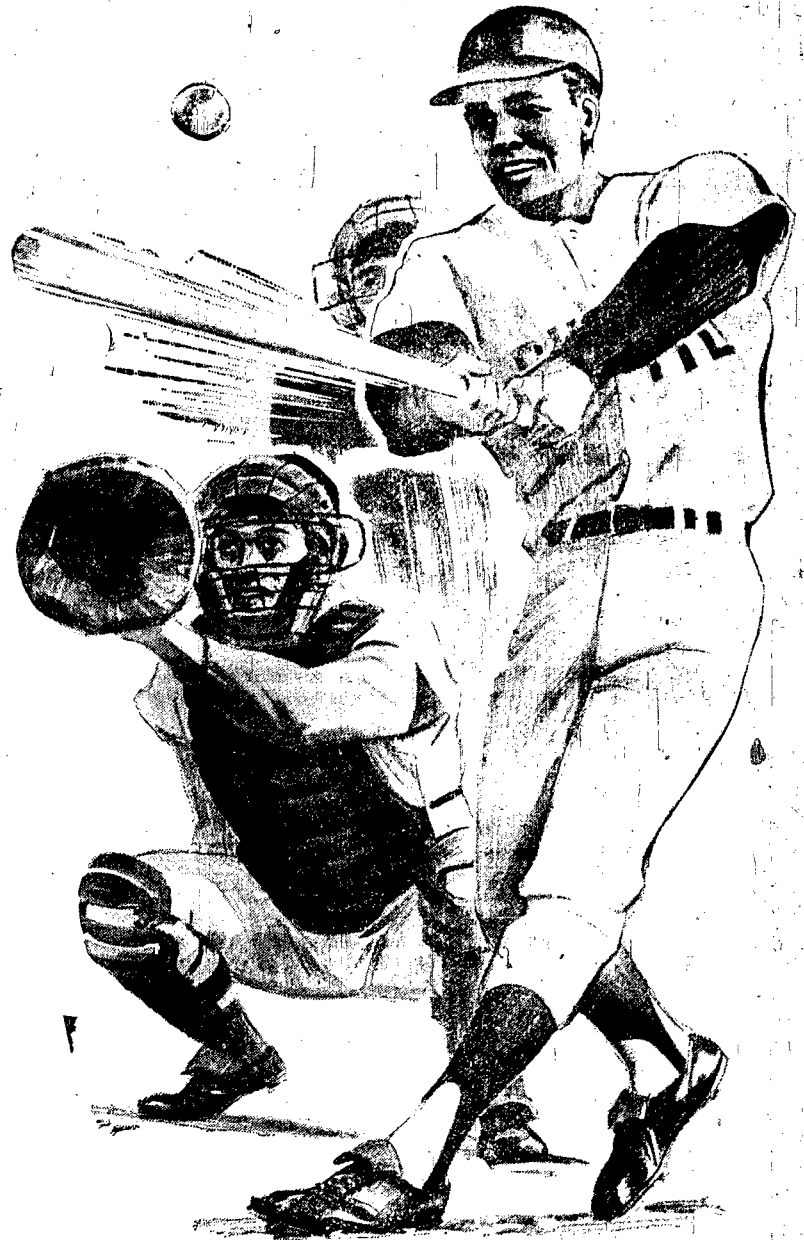

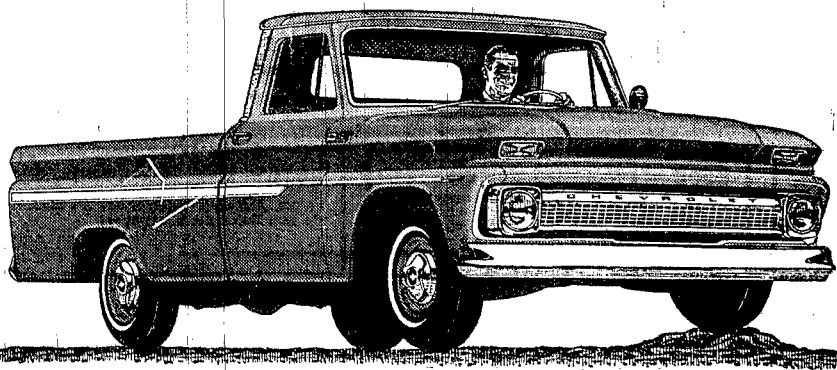
