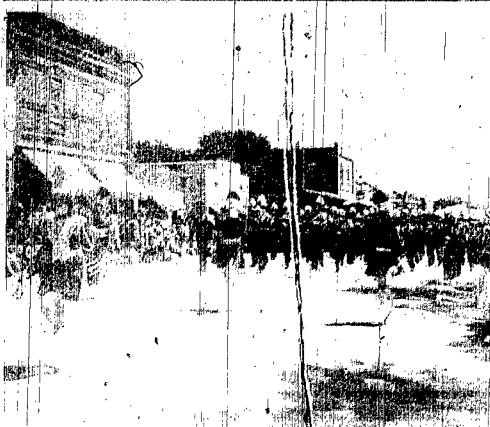

Between 600 and 700 attended the annual Nebraska Herford association field day at Hervale Farms Saturday. Officials were well-pleased with the turnout.

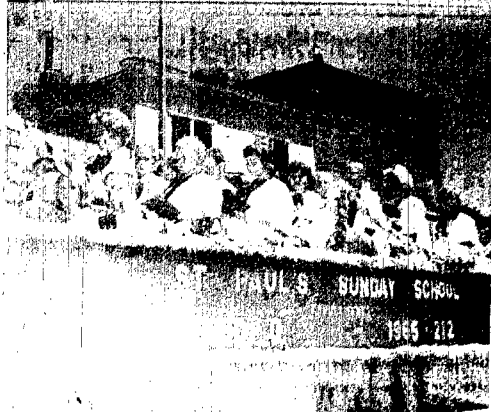
Jim Paulson, Valley, won the calf and trophy for being named the all-around champion junior judge.

### School Census in County Completed

Mrs. Julia Haas has completed the school census in Wayne county and reveals there is an increase over the previous year. This is a reversal of the situation a year ago when a downward trend was indicated.

According to Supt. Gladys Porter, there are 1501 youngsters in the county between the ages of 0-20. A year ago there were 1444, showing an increase of 57. From 1963 to 1964 the census figure had gone down.

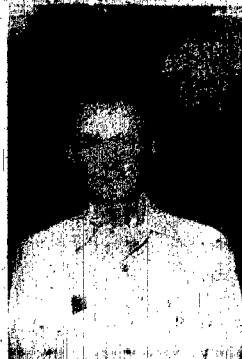
A school census is compiled to determine free high school tuition

**Violations Different, I See By The Herald**

**Fine and Costs Same**

Three court cases involved three different violations the past week but Judge David Hamer lined each one the same. All were traffic violations.

Regardless of the growing interest in plug casting and fly fishing, more angling is still done with natural bait than any other method.

The most popular bait of all is the common garden worm found almost anywhere in North America where the soil is black. There is hardly a fish that won't bite on a worm.

Worms should be kept in an open or ventilated top can or jar with plenty of good dirt. As you will notice, worms are apt to coil and bunch around each other, so it's well to shake them up at least once a day if they are going to be kept for any length of time.

When casting a worm be careful not to give it a sharp jerk, or you will snap most of the worm off the hook. With practice you can cast a worm considerable distance.

### Teachers Signed for 34 County Schools; Most Will Have to Take Water With Them

Teachers have been signed for 32 rural schools and two parochial schools in the county school system. Supt. Gladys Porter reports teachers at 20 of the schools will have to carry water and 25 teachers will have outdoor privy facilities.

According to Supt. Porter, only seven of the 32 rural schools have indoor plumbing and five have outside wells. This leaves 20 with no water so teachers will have to haul it to school.

Schools in Districts 72, 47 and 70 are closed for the first time this year. District 72 closed because the schoolhouse burned; Districts 47 and 70 closed because only two school age children live in each district. District 22 school was dissolved and annexed to District 45, Randolph.

The salary range for Wayne county rural school teachers is \$3600 to \$5200. The average salary is \$455 a month on a nine-month basis. No emergency permits for teachers are required this year.

Mrs. Porter reports schools will open Monday, Aug. 30. Pre-opening day work will be handled Friday, Aug. 27, at 8:30 a.m. in the county courtroom.

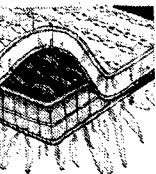

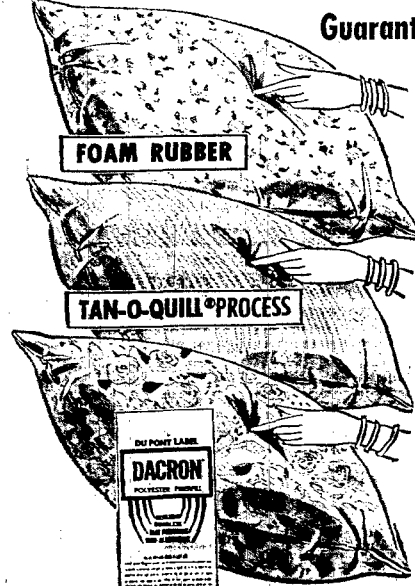

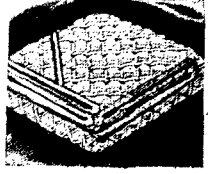
