The system picks up a signal high in the air, amplifies it and sends it through cables and more amplifiers so every commercted home gets perfect reception. In other words, no fringe area reception. In SSC the cost will be about \$25 to connect to the cable and about \$6 a mogth for the service. But the city will pet lease money from Sioux Electronics, the schools will have educational television and the selection and reception will be amazing.

It is possible the cost will go down, but even at the above prices South Sioux City residents will have a bargain. It's simpler to get cable TV here than to move to SSC. The next move is yours please don't make it to SSC. — CEG

The reapport ion ment bill, which now goes to the floor for full debate, decreases the size of the Unicameral from 49 to 47. It does not cross county lines.

The measure establishes districts ranging in population from \$5,777 (Hall County) to 27,248, (11 west-central counties), based on the 1960 census. It tosses six freshmen and two weteran law, makers into the same districts.

The latter feature is sure to cause considerable controversy. State legislators traditionally are against any effort to place them against a colleague in the next election.

The Legislature has passed a bill eliminating the long-standing \$200 exemption on household goods. It will take effect next year. **Exemption Repealed**

The chief sponsor of the legis lation, Sen. Jules W. Burbach Crofton, estimates it will swel state and local tax rolls by \$1.5 million. The state would gair \$245,000 yearly.

2,4-D Damage Evident
We have had more than the usual number of reported instances of damage to corn, sorghum and soybeans from 2,4-D
University agronomists report that these crops are most susceptible when growing conditions are good. They recommend that herbicide dosage be decreased when excellent conditions prevail.
2,4-D should be applied to sorghum when the plants are four to 12 inches tall. If plants are smaller than four inches, root development may be retarded. If plants are more than 12 inches. smaller than four inches, root development may be retarded. If plants are more than 12 inches tail, an over-all spray may impair development of heads. Drop nozzels should be used on sorghum over 18 inches tail and corn over 18 inches tail to avoid getting 2.4-D into the leaf whorl. In the case of corn and sorghum, ester forms of 2.4-D should be applied at 1/2 the recommended rate of amine forms.

Spraying is a precise operation and the use of hapha z a r d techniq u e s such as not calibrating the s prayer, too much herbicide applied, and overlap—frequently causes mishaps.

Don't overlook the possibility of wind-drifted spray. Soybeans frequently show 2,4-D damage one-half mile or more from sprayed areas.
Livestock Shade Pays
An artificial shade is still one of the simplest things that can be used to keep all types of livestock cool during hot weather.

A good shade will reduce radiation from the direct heat of the sun by one-third. Hay or straw are among the most effective materials need to be replaced frequently unless some method is devised to keep them from blowing off.

Other more durable materials are galvanized iron painted white, aluminum or snow flence. When snow fence is planned as a shade, a double layer should be used.

Shades should be located some distance from buildings and fences, to assure plenty of air cir-

es, to assure plenty of air cir-culation and to take advantage

Those planning a new corral fence should consider using cable, which does not restrict natural air movement. Cable fences are being used at the Northeast Experiment Station with excellent results. Such fences also prevent drifting of snow in the winter, and allow lots to dry up much quicker in the spring. The Price, of Change

Prevent Mildew

Mildew, that thin whitish mold that grows on cothes and household labrics can become a problem in homes after a few days of muggy summer weather. Homemakers should take special precautions to prevent mildew, for once it gets started it's difficult to control.

Mildew is a fungus which can grow on fabrics, leather and household goods. Soil on articles can supply enough food for mildew spores to start growing when moisture and temperatures are right. Mildew first causes stains. Continued growth causes fabrics to weaken and rot.

Since mildew feeds on dirt and soiled articles, the first prevention step is cleanliness. The second preventive step is to get rid of dampness. Air conditioners and dehumidfiers will rid homes of dampness, but windows and doors must be kept closed so the appliances can condition the indoor air.

Heat can also be used to force out dampness. In closets or other small areas an electric light

Heat can also be used to force out dampness. In closets or other small areas an electric light may be burned continuously. The heat will be sufficient to prevent mildew if the space is not too large. \In cases of extreme dampness the thermostat might be adjusted so that the furnace operates for a short time. This could be done in the evening \$\frac{w}{r}\$ early morning when outdoor temperatures are lower.

Adequate ventilation is another

temperatures are lower.

Adequate ventilation is another precaution against mildew. Open closets and dresser drawers occasionally to allow natural ventilation. Use an exhaust fan in rooms such as kitchens, bathrooms and laundry rooms, where excessive moisture accumulates.
